Mr. and Mrs. Justin Collins, 36 Blackfriars street, this city, were killed on Sunday evening when a New York Central express crashed into a derailed eastbound Michigan Central train at Porter, Indiana, 50 miles east of Chicago. Mr. and Mrs. Collins left London a week ago today to visit the latter's sisters in Chicago. They termed the trip as being their "second honeymoon."

Mr. and Mrs. Collins had only been married about four years, and both had lived in the city practically all their life. They were 41 and 38 years old, respectively. Mr. Collins was employed as a C. P. R. bridgeman and was well known throughout the city. They had no children.
