LIVE STOCK MARKETS.
CHICAGO, Aug. 16.—An unexpectedly large supply of cattle was received today, and prices fell 1/2 to 1c, buyers holding back for reduction; good to choice cattle sold at \$5 50 to \$6 40; common grades, \$4 40 to \$5 55; stockers and feeders, \$3 50 to \$4 75; bulls and heifers, \$3 50 to \$5 50; Texas steers, \$3 75 to \$5 25; and calves, \$4 to \$7 50. The hog market was weak, and further reductions of 5c to 10c were made; offerings were moderate, but buyers were reluctant to take hold; heavy hogs sold at \$4 15 to \$4 90; mixed, \$4 45 to \$4 90, and light, \$4 50 to \$4 90; pigs brought \$2 50 to \$4 75, and culled, \$2 25 to \$4 10. Another enormous run of sheep and lambs resulted in a sharp break in prices, lambs being 15c to 25c

lower, while sheep, except for choice western ranges, suffered similar reductions; sheep sold at \$2 to \$3 for culls, up to \$4 25 to \$4 50 for prime natives; lambs, \$3 50 to \$4 50. Receipts—Cattle, 23,000; hogs, 23,000; sheep, 27,000.
EAST BUFFALO, Aug. 16.—Cattle—The market offerings were a fair inquiry for good, fat butcher cattle the tone ruled full steady with Monday's figures; calves were in light supply, good demand and stronger; choice to extra were quotable at \$8 75 to \$10 to choice, \$6 50 to \$8 75. Sheep and lambs—The offerings were light, only 5 loads, the bulk being of the common order, and included heavy ewes, which were not wanted; top grade lambs were in light supply, good demand and firm; sheep were generally dull; lambs, choice to extra, were quotable at \$6 25 to \$6 50; good to choice, \$6 to \$6 25; common to fair, \$4 50 to \$5 50; sheep, choice to extra, \$4 50 to \$4 75; good to choice, \$4 25 to \$5 50; common to fair, \$3 to \$4. THE RISING OF THE NILE

Discoveries in the Soudan—Major Welby's Journey a Profitable One—Many Watered Valleys—Cattle 75 Cents a Head.

Cairo, Aug. 17.—The Nile is rising very unsatisfactorily, and up to date it is the worst rise in record, in respect to irrigation.

LONDON, Aug. 17.—This has been the driest summer on record here. Only 190 tons of water per acre has fallen instead of the usual average of 610 tons.
