MINERS ATTACKED BY PARISITES; OVER 20,000 MEN ARE AFFECTED

Disease So Far Has Baffled the Doctors and All Remedies Have Failed.

Berlin, May 6 .- The coal mining industry in Westphalia is being seriously hampered by sickness among the miners, which has recently spread so rapidly that the sickness has become almost universal. Twenty thousands men are affected. Some of the pits have 90 per cent of their workers disabled. The disease has hitherto baffled the dectors, and all remedies have failed. Temporary barracks and islotion hospitals are being erected to prevent the spread of the disease and to enable scientific investigation. The parasite, which is a worm, disables the person attacked for weeks and some times months. The crippling of the mines is affecting affiliated industries. Some days ago a Berlin dispatch reported an outbreak of a similar disease among the miners of Silesia.
