All revisions of the written co stitution to which the two parties of the Federal Assembly agree must be submitted to the referendum. When one of these councils agrees to such revision, but the other disagrees or when 50,000 voters denand amendment, the question of the sup cosed change must be submitted to a vote of the Swiss people. Under certain conditions the people can compel a popular vote on a federal law. In the cantons many important matters are submitted in the same way to the popular vote. The system, we are told by the historian, is not only popular, but has the practical effect of naking the people generally take a greater interest in public affairs.
