# In the Death Chair. HYMAN'S RECORD

Sing Sing, N. Y.

How the Substitute for the Gallows Does Its Work.

The Victim Subjected to Two Separate Shocks of 50 and 36 Sec-onds Duration.

Sing Sing, N. Y., Feb. 8.—At the execution of Charles McIlvaine to-day there was a quick, convulsive jump of the subject following the application of the current. A livid shadow crept into the hollows of the digns at the sides of the nose, the lips became purple, the wrists were ashen first and then welts of purple color showed around the edges of the straps. Meanwhile the current, alternating 230 times each second, was beating at the nerve cells and exhausting the oxygen from the blood corpuscles. There was no movement in any part of the entire frame. "Close!" commanded Dr. McDonald, and the small leader at the switch-board was pushed back to its place and the current was cut off. The hour was 11:12:49 a.m. The power of 1,600 voits of electromotive force had been busy 49 seconds with the life centers of the silent, motionless figure. Dr. Ward reached down into the cell on the right side of the chair and was feeling for pulse beats, when from the livid lips of the subject there showed an exudation of

Dr. Ward reached down into the cell on the right side of the chair and was feeling for pulse beats, when from the livid lips of the subject there showed an exudation of mucus, and almost at the same instant there came from the lungs, which had thus expelled the last inhalation taken in at the last moment as the condenned man nerved himself for the death stroke. Then came a shorter gasp, which was cut short in a gurgle by the reapplication of the current, which at the moment was flowing at 1,500 volts and 10 amperes. The hour was 11:13:15 a.m.

"Stop!" again ordered Dr. McDonald, and the little lever cut off the current from the subject. Dr. Ward again advanced to test the wrists for possible pulse beats. There were none. The mask on the purple face was lessened so that the action, if any, of blood in the jugular vein might be observed. Dr. Ward retired. Dr. McDonald tested both at the wrist and neck, and then the other physicians did likewise. But there came no more of tremor or of action anywhere. The subject gradually relaxed from the terrible strain under which it had labored at the moment the shock entered. The neck relaxed, the head slipped down, and the entire frame gank down an inert, senseless substance.

Electrocution of McIlvaine at Testimony of the Free Press Support of the People's Candidate.

> Mr. Carling's Organ Completely Answered from Its Editorial Columns.

HYMAN, WHO HAS PRESIDED OVER THAT BRANCH OF THE PUBLIC ECONOMY FOR THE PAST COUPLE OF YEARS O ACCEPTABLY, MADE A STATEMENT WHICH CANNOT FAIL TO BE REGARDED IN A REASSURING SO ACCEPTABLY, MADE A STATE-MENT WHICH CANNOT FAIL TO BE REGARDED IN A REASSURING SENSE. DURING HIS TERM OF OFFICE SOMETHING IN THE NATURE OF A REVOLUTION HAS TAKEN PLACE IN THE MODE OF CONDUCTING OUR FINANCIAL BUSINESS. The mixed and muddled state which has prevailed under the ægis of former councils for many years in succession has given place to a systematic control, so that where the old auditors groped in a state of bewilderment, we are assured that the least skillful now finds a straight path, and is able to trace with accuracy the course of income and outgo. This in itself is a great step gained. Along with the confusion in the ordinary accounts, Mr. Hyman and his associates found a floating debt in the shape of an overdraft at the bank amounting to over \$100,000. This debt has been consolidated by the issuance of debentures, carrying a much lower rate of interest than the open account did. THUS A LARGE SAVING HAS BEEN EFFECTED IN THE CURRENT OUTLAY in that behalf, while the liability, instead of harging over the city like a

By the time it matures it is fair to assume that the city will have made large progress in wealth and population—it is too much to hope that it will be doubled. In that case the payment would fall with corresponding lightness, supposing the new generation would be called upon to pay up in full. But it is well for the present ratepayers to feel that no such injustice is in contemplation, that they are not intending to shirk their fair share of the burden, as they were made to seem to do under the former regime. Men Guilty of or Aiding and Abetting in Public Plunder Should Be Driven From Power.

The leading newspapers in Great Britain, without regard to political predilections, have condemned in the strongest terms the wholesale corruption that was laid bare at Ottawa during the last Parliamentary session. They have also condemned the crookedness exposed at Quebec. For the plundering of the people of Canada, to the extent, we believe, of millions of dollars, the men in power at Ottawa must be held responsible, and the people of the Dominion, by their votes, must punish them. As for the boodling in Quebec, the punishment of those guilty of wrongdoing must be left to the people of that Province, just as in Ontario the Provincial Government, when put on trial, must be condemned or indorsed by the people of this Province by their votes at the polis. Seeing this is the state of affairs, it will do no harm, and may effect much good, to reflect upon the views of the great English papers after studying the disgraceful exposures at Ottawa, which, by the way, will have to be resumed when the House reassembles this month. The Five Day Week Scheme Among New York Printers.

New York Typographical Union, No. 6, has formulated a rule that the compositors whom it controls shall only work five days in the week, in order to give a chance for steady employment to a greater number o union men than have been able to find worl This course, undoubtedly, will be anounced as an undue interference with the rights of the men by those who are opposed the rights of the men by those who are opposed to union among laboring men, and who think they know better than the latter what laboring men want. Leaving out of consideration the question of the wisdom of this step it must in justice be pointed out that the men who have influence in the union, and whose counsels have brought about this change, are not those who will profit by it, as they are not men who lack regular work. The new rule will at first meet with displeasure of the foremen of composing rooms, pleasure of the foremen of composing rooms, who like to select a set of men and keep

who like to select a set of men and keep them. It is certain, however, to strengthen the printers, as it will enable them to keep in the ranks of the union a large number of men who, through lack of work, might be forced to accept work at low pay and to strengthen the non-union offices.—[Arthur Brisbane, in New York World.

No Tangible Results Expected to Ensue —First Meeting of the Bering Sea Joint Commission.

First Meeting of the Bering Sea Joint Commission.

OTTAWA, Feb. 8.—At 2 o'clock to-day Sir John Thompson, Minister of Justice; Hon. M. Bowell, acting Minister of Customs; Hon. George E. Foster, Finance Minister, accompanied by Mr. Parmalee, assistant commissioner of customs, and Mr. Douglas Stewart, private secretary to the Minister of Justice, who will act as secretary of the delegation, left to-day for Washington by special car by the Canada Atlantic Railway. West Shore and Pennsylvania Railway. A meeting of the Cabinet was held this forenoon to complete the arrangement for the trip, as Mr. Foster did not arrive in time on Saturday to attend the meeting.

It was gathered from conversation with the Ministers that they expected no actual results from their visit. They meet President Harrison and Secretary Blaine on the 10th inst., and will first, as a matter of course, call on Sir Julian Pauncefoote. Sir John Thompson stated that the most they expected to do was to make arrangements for what could be discussed on a date to be named at a future time, When it was pointed out to one of the Ministers that it was little use going to Washington if the Government was still wedded to the idea that they would only accept a treaty in natural products, he replied that the Government was not tied to anything in particular as far as discussion went, and that there were a variety of things such as transportation in bond, the complaint of the States in regard to discrimination against them in respect to canal tolls, which the Government did not admit, and numerous other questions. He repeated the old yarn about having reciprocity in anything if it was thought necessary which would not discriminate against Great Britain.


