Those which were not consumed, owing to their detached or somewhat isolated positions, were: King's College, the cotton factory, the Church of England rectory and school, Edge Hill's school for girls, and the Dufferin Hotel.

An hour after the fire started the mayor began to summon outside assistance, the call on Halifax being responded to by two companies of the city fire department, which reached Windsor shortly after daylight.

The Halifax authorities adopted prompt measures to extend relief, and early this afternoon a trainload of provisions was dispatched. 

OVEREXERTION IN BICYCLING. A physician testifying at an inquest in England the other day, as stated in the Sun, said that the heart of the dead man, who had expired suddenly, was twice its natural size. "He had a bullock's heart," said the witness. The heart of the average man, he said, weighed from ten to twelve ounces, while that of the dead man weighed two pounds. When a juror asked him to state the cause of a "bullock's heart," the physician ex-plained that it arose either from want of exercise or overexertion. "Any bi-cyclist who scorches," he added, "is running the risk of having a 'bullock' A more dangerous form of exertion on the wheel than scorching which is of comparatively brief duration, allowing the heart to resume its normal beat of about 72 to the minute, is long distance riding when continud hour after hour without sleep. is always to be condemned as foolhardy, for the tax on the heart is such that sooner or later the effects will surely be felt, no matter how sound the physical condition was at the time of the ordeal. During the progress of an all day ride at a uniform speed of ten miles an hour, the heart will beat from 100 to 125 times a min according to the physique and condition of the rider. 

From every country in the kingdom and every corner of the empire, there are messages of love and respect on parchment, linen, ivory or paper, in every imaginable text and script, with every possible variation of decorative effect and goldsmiths' craft. Apart from the addresses there are 150 gifts selected for exhibition by the Queen. The Prince of Wales' present is a fine equestrian portrait of himself and the Duke of Connaught, by Detaille, with a Highland regiment in the background.

Among other royal gifts are a long chain necklet, with a crown and dates in diamonds, from the Queen's children; a large chrysophrase paper weight, superbly decorated, from Empress of Germany; a magnificent diamond brooch from the Princess of Wales and her children; a brooch with an open pendant heart of diamonds the Emperor of Russia, and a large silver vase from the German

The most interesting gifts are those from the Emperor of China, the dow-ager empress and the Chinese ambassador, consisting of superb porcelains, embroideries and sacrificial vessels, 1.000 years old. most fantastic object is a tiger's skull from Hyderabad, with an ink-stand in the mouth, and a clock and

barometer in the eyes. All climes and all conditions of wealth and poverty are represented in the collection. There are slik carpets of original design; curtains worked by Hindu widows; wheeling chairs from wardrobe maids, and bicycles from Coventry's mayor; walking-sticks from premiers and actresses, and a parasol from the oldest parliamentary veteran; jewels from cesses, silver flower baskets lady mayoresses, milking stools from old ladies, and photographs from working girls. It is a strange assortment of presents, but there is a silver thread which links them together-this is the feelings of profound respect and af-fection which the Queen inspires throughout the world.
