> Yesterday's wreck on the Grand Trunk, near Guelph, brought the deepest sorrow into two of the leading homes of Stratford.

Mr. John O'Donoghue, one of the victims of the accident, was one of the most prominent citizens of the Classic City, where he had resided for very many years. He had always taken a deep interest in municipal affairs, and served several terms as councilor, and later filled the mayor's chair with the greatest satisfaction, Mr. O'Donoghue. who was about 60 years of age, was exceedingly popular, and his untimely death will be regretted by all classes of citizens in Stratford and other places where he was well known. He leaves a family of grown-up children, one of whom, John O'Donoghue, is employed as a checker in the C. P. R. freight offices in this city.

Charley Rankin was about 25 years of age. player. Of late, however, he had been officiating as a referee for the Ontario hockey executive, and wherever he appeared he gave the ut-

Rankin had been conducting a confectionery business in Stratford some time. He is survived by his wife, mother, six brothers and one sister, Mrs. Frank Laymen, of Parkhill. One brother, H. G. Rankin, is employed in the offices of the Empire Accident and Surety Company, of this city.

Charley Rankin was married only ten days ago to Miss Bruce, of Toronto. The latter was in Toronto with her husband over Monday night, but returned home to Stratford on the morning train yesterday, her husband being unable to return until the afternoon, owing to a business engagement. Mrs. Rankin went to the Stratford depot to meet her husband, and it was while she was awaiting his arrival that a message was handed to her announcing his death. The young bride was prostrated by the news.

Rankin was a brother of Fred Rankin, who met a tragic end in Calgary ten months ago. His mother died about a year since.

Ottawa, Feb. 27.—The Dominion Government was advised by cable today that the judicial committee of the privy council refused the application of the Dominion to appeal on the case of the taxation of C. P. R. lands. A test case was submitted to the Canadian courts as to whether C. P.

R. lands in Manitoba and the Northwest could be taxed within the 20-year period specified in the charter. The Manitoba court was in favor of the C. P. R., with the exception of the taxation of school lands in the Northwest. The supreme court also decided in favor of the C. P. R. Crew of Freight Train That Did the Damage Give Their Testimony.

cause of the death of the late Engineer George Renton, who was killed in an accident in the G. T. R. yards recently, was opened last night at police headquarters before Coroner MacLaren. After hearing the evidence of Engineer David J. Henderson, who was in charge of engine No. 667, which collided with the engine attached to the express train on which Mr. Renton met his death, and also the testimony of Conductor W. H. Northey, who was in charge of the eastbound freight, the jurors found that an adjournment would be advisable in order to visit the yards and view the scene of the wreck. The inquest will

be continued on Thursday. Engineer Henderson's Story Engineer David Henderson, of engine No. 667, was the first witness called. He stated that he had been in the employ of the G. T. R. for four months. On the evening of the wreck he was taking his train out of the yards east of Waterloo street on the south track, but was afterwards switched onto what is known as "Walker's siding," which is used for through freights going east. His train, he thought, was going at about six or seven miles an hour, and was a light one, composed of eight cars. He followed another train which was just ahead. All went well until when between Adelaide and William streets he had to take his train across from Walker's siding to the main line for eastbound trains, which was the first track north, when the front end brakeman went ahead and opened the switch from the eastbound track to the next one north, which als lowed the freight to run foul of the track on which the International Limited was approaching. Just as engine No. 667 got past the switch and before he could stop his engine, the collision occurred. Engineer Henderson said he saw that the switch was thrown to the wrong track, and did all that was possible to stop his engine before it got foul of the track on which the ex-These figures comprise only standard press was coming, but could not accomplish his object.

#### Brakeman McDonald.

McDonald, the brakeman of the freight, left the engine between Maitland and William streets, and after turning the switch, gave the signal to go ahead

In answer to a question asked by Mr. Geo. C. Gibbons, K.C., Engineer Henderson said that none of the yardmen were near at the time, and therefore McDonald had to get out to turn the switch. Both the fireman and the engineer had jumped before the collision took place. The air cylinder had no in it, and therefore the brakes had allowed the train to slip about 60 feet.

Conductor Northey.

Conductor W. H. Northey was then called. He stated that he had been promoted to the position of conductor last October. That was the first trip he had made with McDonald. Brakeman McDonald had been given orders to turn the switches, so as to put the train on to the eastbound main line, and he thought all was going well until the train came to a rather sudden stop, and he went forward, to find that McDonald had turned three switches instead of two as he should have done. Witness immediately sent for help

In answer to questions by Mr. Gibbons, Conductor Northey stated that the rear end brakeman was less experienced than McDonald, but that both men had been required to pass an examination before they were allowed to

Switchman Busy Elsewhere.

The switchman stationed at Maitland street was supposed to cover the switches which McDonald had turned, but was busy further down the yard at the time as is often the case. He also stated that had the proper switchman been there instead of the inexperienced brakeman, the accident would

never have occurred. To Mr. Judd, who represented the G. T. R., Mr. Northey said that each orakeman had to make two or three trips with an experienced crew before being taken on a train. To the best of his knowledge, the engineer had used the brakes three times, and each time they appeared to be working all





In a recent speech at Harvard, President Roosevelt, an old Harvard athlete, publicly and energetically championed football and other games requiring courage and endurance. Here are some of the things he said:

"We cannot afford to turn out of college men who shrink from physical effort or from a little physical pain. In any republic courage is a prime necessity for the average citizen if he is to be a good citizen; and he needs physical courage no less than moral courage, the courage that dares as well as the courage that endures, the courage that will fight valiantly alike against the foes of the soul and the foes of the body.

"Athletics are good, especially in their rougher forms, because they tend to develop such courage. They are good also because they encourage a true democratic spirit, for in the athletic field a man must be judged not question. with reference to outside and accidental attributes, but by that combination of bodily vigor and moral quality which go to make up prowess.

"In a republic like ours, the governing class is composed of the strong men who take the trouble to do the work of government; and if you are too timid or too fastidious or too careless to do your part to be considered one of the governing you become one of the governed, instead-one of the driven cattle of the political arena.

"It is of far more importance that a man shall play something himself, even if he plays it badly, than that he shall go with hundreds of compan-

the combination car had been smashed in, exposing the interior, and there could be seen Mr. James Ryan, of Guelph, with his feet securely held in the wreckage. When the accident occurred Ryan was riding in the first seat next the door, and in the terrible mixup he was hurled from side to side. being finally pinned to one side of the car when the stop came at the bottom of the hill.

Ryan's sufferings were terrible to behold. He was finally taken out, the men chopping the timbers away before they could do so. He was very weak from the loss of blood, and today his life hangs in the ballance.

The scene was one of the most terrible ever witnessed at a railway wreck. The Grand Trunk did its best to get relief to the wreck at once, but It was about three-quarters of an hour before the auxiliary with its physicians and others put in an appearance. Happening as it did in the daytime. those who were in the wreck and had been spared had full opportunity to see

#### the extent of the wreck.

Injured Taken to Guelph Lying on wraps and coats along the fence were the bodies of the dead and injured. Brave men and women did all in their power to relieve the sufferings of the latter. Rushing from place to place were men and women with bloodstained faces, not thinking of themselves, but only of the good they could do for others not so fortunate as

themselves. One young lady, a trained nurse, from Stratford, distinguished herself by ministering to the wants of the injured. She tore her skirt into bandages, and bound up the wounds of the men and

women lying along the fence. When the relief train arrived, the dead were placed in a baggage car, and the injured were placed on board the coaches and sent to Guelph. Everything that it was possible to do was done by the company to ease the sufferings of the injured.

#### Cause of the Wreck

The cause of the accident is said to be a defective rail. The rail broke in two at a point which shows evidence of rust for an inch or more. The rail was located at the curve


