# TEUTON CRITICS GUESSING

Amsterdam, Aug. 27.-German war experts are hopelessly at odds in trying to explain the present situation on the west front. Twice each day, Gen. Ludendorff's communiques announce "vicdendorff's communiques announce "victorious repulses," but a glance at the map shows each successive locality mentioned as the scene of fighting lies a few miles further eastward.

This, says the Hamburg Nachrichten's military expert darkly, is "a bad sign for the enemy, because it shows that his attempts to pierce the German front have falled, and that he seeks to substitute width for depth." He further argues that "the earlier German thrust toward Amiens forestalled the enemy and now, even if the Germans are losing ground, it is no absolute gain for the enemy, but merely the recovery of earlier losses."

### MISTAKEN FOR SUB, IS SUNK BY FIRE FROM **U.S. STEAMER**

Guns of Allied Merchant Vessel Turned On U. S. Patrol Boat.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 27.—
American submarine-chaser No. 209, operating out of Philadelphia, was mistaken for a submarine by a merchant steamer off Fire Island, N. Y., early this morning and sent to the bottom. Seventeen members of her crew, ineluding the commander and the executive officer, are missing. The chaser was manged by naval reserves. Eight of the survivors, some of them wounded, have been landed at New York, and one had been landed at Lewis Del.

The merchant ship was the American steamer Felix Taussig. In the darkness her naval armed guard mistook the chaser for an enemy submarine and opened fire, destroying the little craft before the mistake was discovered.

#### WHAT BIG ALLIED DRIVE MEANS

London, Aug. 27.-Interesting comparisons between the results achieved on the British and French fronts in the Somme area with those of the first battle of the Somme are made by a military expert here. He points out that in four months, from July 1 to October 31, 1916, the British won forty-four square miles of land. In four days, between August 21 and 25, the British won 116 square miles, with casualties amounting to only 23,000. In other words, he says, between two and three times as much ground has been taken at an infinitely smaller cost. In the four days under discussion, the British we much more territory than both the British and French armies recovered in the whole first battle of the Somme.

#### HAIG'S FORCES HAVE PENETRATED THE OUTER DEFENCES OF BAPAUME

London, Aug. 26.—British forces in the great battle in northern Picardy are making progress toward the village of Beugnature, 21/2 miles northeast of Bapaume, according to the official statement issued at the war office today. There is hard fighting around

Since last Wednesday the British have taken 21,000 prisoners. "The British have pushed through the town of Montauban, three miles north of the Somme, and, capturing the wood near that place, have reached Longeuval," the statement says.

"Australian forces have made substantial progress toward Dompierre, south of the Somme, and east of Suzanne, north of the

"North of the Scarpe River Scottish troops renewed their attack against the Germans last night and have advanced towards

"Severe fighting took place on the field of the old Somme battle between Maricourt and Bapaume, and also north of the latter town, yesterday afternoon and evening. The enemy counterattacked repeatedly in strength, incurring great losses from the fire of our troops, but being unable to arrest our progress.

"English and Welsh troops pushed through Montauban and advanced along the crest of the ridge, capturing High Wood and reaching Longueval. In the village we were heavily counterattacked and forced back toward Bazentin-le-Grand and High Wood. On this line we broke the enemy's attack, and, again advancing, established ourselves well to the east of High Wood. "Early in the night, a second enemy counter-attack was driven

off by rifle fire before the Germans reached our position, "North of High Wood, the enemy twice counter-attacked in the neighborhood of Ligny and Thilloy, pressing back our advanc-

ing troops some 400 or 500 yards. There his infantry was stopped and driven back." "At Bapaume the New Zealanders, after fierce fighting, estab-

lished themselves in the northern outskirts of the town. "Further north English troops progressed toward Beugnatre, We have had hard fighting about Croiselles.

The text of the statement reads as follows:

"South of the Avre French troops accentuated their progress this morning in the region of St. Mard, after having repulsed a number of enemy counter-attacks. We have taken more than 1,100 prisoners during these combats. Of these 36 are officers, 2 of whom are battalion commanders.

"Between the Oise and the Aisne, German counter-attacks, west of Chavigny, broke down last evening. Thirty prisoners remained in our hands. In the region east of Bagneux we have advanced our line about 1,200 metres.

"During the night there were lively artillery duels between the Ailette and the Aisne."

## Clothes Psychology

HE FIRST THING that aviators and observers noted at the commencement of the last big German drive was that the great lines of enemy troops were clad in new uniforms. The German military officials knew that a large number of men would perish; they knew that half the new uniforms would not last the week out; they knew that it strained the resources of the nation, already heaped up with debt; they knew that the uniforms previously worn were still serviceable and that physically it made little difference in the soldier's efficiency whether his clothing was brand new or a year old. But they understood the feeling of alertness, courage and spirit which makes a man battle against odds when wearing new clothes and the impression it would make and did make on the Allies. That this impression was correct was proven by comments of high British officers, correspondents and press dispatches first sent out over the world. The German officers wanted their armies to appear prosperous and thereby feel successful.

If so much was expected from clothes by the German high command is it not worth while for the average citizen to provide himself with new clothes that he may have a greater earning power and thereby better serve his country?

If clothes give soldiers such courage and confidence men and women in civilian life should be careful that they wear clothing that will urge the men to give the best that is in



LIFE UNDERWRITERS' ASSOCIATION AND THE WINNING OF THE WAR.

The Life Underwriters of this continent have been very much in the lime light since the beginning of the war. In every campaign for the raising of funds they have taken a very active interest.

When the American Government required expert assistance to place its war insurance, it was to the national association that it looked for and received all the help required. During the first week of September, an international convention will be held

in New York City. The chief subjects to be discussed at the convention will be: First: "The contributions life insurance has made and will make towards Second: "How to develop the business of life insurance in spite of the war."

The headquarters of the convention will be the Hotel Astor. The Canadian part of the convention will begin at 10 a.m. Tuesday, and the International will commence promptly at 10 o'clock Wednesday morning, September 4th. The opening addresses will be delievered by President Woodrow Wilson and the Hon. Charles Fitzpatrick, chief justice of the supreme court of Canada. The speakers of the annual banquet, which will be held on the night of Sep-

mber 5th, in the grand ballroom of the Hotel Astor, are as follows: Hon. N. W. Rowell, president of the privy council of Canada.

Lord Reading, British ambassador to the United States. Hon. Charles E. Hughes.

Over three thousand rooms have been reserved for the delegates to this convention, and in point of attendance and inspiration, it will stand as the greatest gathering on this continent for the year 1918, and the results will help in the vinning of this world war and bind together, in closer bonds of brotherhood, the peoples of the two great nations on this continent.

The life insurance interests have over ten thousand men in uniform, and this factor will put enthusiasm into this great gathering.

T. B. Parkinson, president of the London Association, and member of the ominion executive, will be present at this convention as the representative of the local association

#### SHEEP IN SOUTH AMERICA.

Argentine sheep raisers saw what was coming when the war began in 1914, and they have almost doubled their flocks in four years, the English estimate being 43,000,000 sheep in 1914, and 80,000,000 sheep this year. Argentine has also added to its herds of cattle and hogs, and Uruguay is fast becoming one of the greatest cattle countries of the world.

Many people are wont to regard Latin-Americans as lacking in enterprise, but these records of live stock operations prove that they have both energy and foresight. Europe is denuded of live stock and peace will increase its demand, and ommercial requirements for both meats and live animals. These Argentine sheep raisers have invested in the surest thing that can be named. When they can get ships they can sell their wool at the highest prices ever known. They need not worry about peace because it will still further enhance the price of

Europe and America are bare of free stocks of wool. As soon as the war ends the markets will be free and wool and cotton will command high prices. Central Europe will absorb enormous quantities of both if they are procurable. While the war lasts wool will command high prices wherever ships can go for it. These sheep raisers run no risk in either case, but they can sell their wool faster after peace is declared and Government price regulations come to an end.

Canada, Mexico and the United States have equally good chances to make money in live stock. In trade circles the prevailing opinion is that fortunes await those who prepare to replenish Europe's flocks and herds to supply her after-war requirements for wool. South America will have a new crop of milin live stock. A flock of sheep doubles itself every year, and either the wool or the ram lambs more than pay running expenses, so the increase in animals is clear profit. Money so invested grows fast when the rate of profit is a hundred per cent a year compound interest. The ossibilities are limited only by the range of feeding ground.

#### THE COMING UNI TED STATES LOAN BY W. C. CORNWELL.

There is one operation which is of the utmost importance in facilitating the placing of the next great Liberty Loan, and yet which has received no effectual attention. This is the undertaking to bring the issues of the last two loans up to par. But these 3½s are held by a comparatively few people. The 4s and the 4½s are owned by from 17 to 20 million people, and it is to a large majority of these owners that the appeal for the new loan must be made. Their current holdings have been at a varying discount of from 4 to 5 or 7 points.

It is true that this decline is only temporary, and that these bonds after the

It is true that this decline is only temporary, and that these bonds after the war, will command a premium which in time will probably rise to high figures, and, aside from the reward of patriotic action, a substantial profit will ensue. But there can be no denying that the fact of these bonds ruling at a discount will be something of an obstacle in placing another and much larger amount of bonds bearing the same rate of 415 per count with the same poonle. bonds bearing the same rate of 41/4 per cent with the same people.

It would seem that the effort were worth making, before the next loan is announced, to overcome the discount at which the present issues are selling. A sinking fund was provided in the last loan for purchasing bonds in the open market. As far as known this has not been used. An attempt to do so might not succeed in restoring the selling price to around par, but it would seem as though with skillful management such a result might be brought about. That such operations are often successful with issues of stock is well known. It is argued that the volume of the Government loans are so huge that success would be difficult. Still an overwhelmingly great majority of the owners of these bonds bought them to hold patriotically and permanently. The very fact that they are quoted at a discount has induced some selling, and holding them near par would undoubtedly tend to keep many bonds from being offered for sale. It would seem as though the effort, to be conducted by experts, were worth making.

There is another way in which an approximation of the result could be attained. That is by the method in vogue in Canada. Trading in the bonds is abolished on the exchanges, and a government committee has been in operation through whom only transactions may be approved. through whom only transactions may be arranged. Any one wishing to buy or sell may do so only through this committee. Brokers are paid a commission which induces them to find purchasers for the bonds. The price is controlled and the bonds are kept thus at the subscription price or above. They have recently sold above par, while the issue price was 98.66.

PATRIOTISM WILL PAY A LARGE PART IN THE LOAN.

It is well to avail of every legitimate expedient which will make the loan an overwhelming success. That it will be a notable success in the end there is absolutely no doubt because of the splendid spirit of patriotism which prevails in every part of the country and is growing daily.

The date of the offering is set for September 28, and the rate of interest has been decided upon at 41/4 per cent. Whether or not there will be any new features attached to the issue has not yet been announced nor has the amount definitely been given out, although \$6,000,000,000 is the figure expected.






