### IN NEXT ELECTION WOULD LEAVE RUSS PROBLEMS TO THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS

Winston Churchill Says British Will Not Send Conscript Army There.

London, March 26.—The military service bill passed through the report stage without amendment in the House of Commons today. The proposal to limit the operation of the bill to December 31, 1919, instead of April 30, 1920, was rejected by a vote of 252 to 70, and another amendment excluding liability to service in Russia from the scope of the bill was voted down, 281 to 48. In declining to accept the amendment, Winston Spencer Churchill, secretary for war, said the government had no intention of raising a large conscript army to be sent to Russia. "The general question of the Russian policy," he said, "is not a question for the British Government. It is a matter to which a league of nations, or a league of victorious nations, must address itself."
