



DE VALERA SEES ADVANTAGES IN

Prefers Two Irish Armies to One Divided Within Itself.

SINN FEIN SPLIT

URGES CONTINUANCE OF BATTLE FOR REPUBLIC

Declares Ireland Entitled To Be Accorded Dignity of Mother Country.

Dublin, Feb. 21.—Eamon de Valera, apparently regarding a split of the Sinn Fein party as inevitable, openly advocated such a division in addressing the Ard Fheis, the national Sinn Fein convention at its extraordinary ssion today, saying it would be better for Ireland to have two armies each ready to assist the other if the country were imperilled, rather than ne army divided in itself.

Mr. de Valera's speech was the outstanding feature of the morning session of the Ard Fheis, which had only begun the discussion of the party's future policy for or against the Anglo-Irish treaty, when the luncheon adjournment was taken at 1:40 p.m., until 3 o'clock. Speaking to his resolution urging the Sinn Fein party to continue the fight for a republic, Mr. de Valera won hearty applause at numerous points he made his address.







If for my own satisfaction I ask for information on the hydro railroads in the United States, I find very few of the electric roads are able to earn any considerable dividend, excepting the roads that are directly operated by some other road and used as feeders to that road, where the overhead is reduced or absorbed very materially by the parent road. That is a fair state-

If these are the conditions, MR. HAY contends that the government should pass legislation to enable the municipalities to own and operate their electric roads, and then say to them: "We have gone a long way, and now we will give you certain expensive information, and we will make the machinery so that you may build your own roads, on your own responsibility, and operate them."

Commenting on this, the Brantford Expositor says that "it is difficult to understand how any opposition can be taken to this course, except by those who are interested in securing the backing of the provincial credit for these roads. 



SEWING has begun for the new War Memorial Chil-dren's Hospital. A definite start has been made on the long, long trail of towels and other linen and supplies that will be required before the institution is equipped all ready for opening.

To Kintore Women's Institute belongs the honor of tak-ing out the very first allotment of material to be made up, in this case towels (60 of them), 150 covers for hot water bags, and supplies to be used in the operating room.

The institute has not been requested to do this work, but has made more than one urgent appeal to the committee to be allowed to perform the service. Now the materials have been bought (the institute also insisting upon paying for them), and the patterns have been sent out, approved by Miss Elizabeth Ross, lady superin-tendent of Victoria Hospital.

In order that there may be uniformity of supplies for the new hospital, just as uniformity was required for Red Cross work in the war, so all materials are to be bought by a central purchasing committee, which will also be required to send out the patterns and samples to organizations undertaking work.
