

## KAISER PLOTTING WORLD-WIDE WAR

Gambler Joins Others Who Making Morocco His Excuse to Breed Strife.

LOSSES \$2,500,000 OR MORE DELCASSE STANDS IN THE WAY

Office Means Much Towards Continued Peace.

London, April 24.-Two or three times within a dozen years Europe has been unaware of the imminent danger until the crisis has passed. There was such a moment when Lord Rosebery delivered an ultimatum to France in the Siamese dispute. There was another such moment in the Fashoda incident. Yesterday a similar peril menaced European peace, and today the crisis is still unsolved, although diplomacy takes heart again from the news that M. Delcasse, the French Minister of Foreign Affairs, has withdrawn his

resignation.

New York, April 21.-Plans were completed in Wall street by which funds for the construction of the Western Pacific Railroad are absolutely as-A syndicate of Wall street sured. banking houses has agreed to buy \$50,-000,000 of bonds of this company, the proceeds of the sale of which will complete a line from Salt Lake, Utah, to Oakland, Cal. Three important banking houses, it is understood will participate in the bond issue. They are Blair & Co., Saloman & Co. and W. A. Reid & Co. Final conferences have been held in Wall street during the last few days. As is generally known, the Western Pacific Railroad will become an inpart of the Gould system, tegral stretching from the Atlantic to the Pacific. When the new line is completed for the construction of which the \$50,-000,000 bonds are issued, the combined system will be the first railroad in the United States, under one control, with terminals on the Atlantic and Pacific

Oceans. The Canadian Pacific now touches both oceans. The Gould system's western terminus at present is at Salt Lake, where the Denver and Rio Grande and the Rio Grande Western now end. These properties also terminate at Denver and Pueblo, where the great Missouri Pacific finds its western termini. This latter system carried the Gould properties as far as St. Louis where the Wabash, also under the Gould control, connects and brings business as far

east as Pittsburg. The Wabash is now building into Pittsburg through the Wabash-Pittsburg Terminal Railraod, from the presidency of which Joseph Ramsey, jun., recently resigned. The Lowest Percentage of Ballots

Spoiled in Many Years. Ottawa, April 22.-A return compiled by Mr. H. G. Lamothe, clerk of the crown in chancery, shows that the number of rejected ballots in the last Dominion election is the smallest on record. In other words, the ballot now in use is very much better understood by the electorate. It is well known that there is not a constituency in the country where individual voters have not purposely marked their ballots for more than one candidate as ; pretense at keeping promises made to rival aspirants for parliamentary honors. When an allowance is made for these cases the probability is that the number of ballots accidentally spoiled is very small, indeed.

The rejected ballots in the general election of November last numbered 6.090 out of a total vote of 1,030,186 throughout the Dominion. In 1900 the number was 7,718 out of a total vote of 952,496. In 1896 the number was 13, 871 out of a total vote of 835,600. The decrease, therefore, represents over 20 per cent over the record of the preceding general election, which is a matter of considerable gratification to those who were responsible for the alteration



#### ARSENIC IN HOSIERY

Protest Against Use of Mineral Substances in Dress Material.

London, April 21. - At least 50 per cent of the cheaper forms of hesiery contain very distinct quantities of arsenic, the amount rising in some cases o as much as half a grain per pair of stockings.

This is the result of a series of tests made by the analyst for Nottingham Mr. S. R. Trotman, M.A., F.I.C. The arsenic is due to (1) the use of materials for finishing and dyeing, which are themselves contaminated, and (2) the "stoving" of the yarns with impure forms of sulphur.

In quoting these results the Lance objects strongly to the practice of loading dress materials with mineral sub-

"We have found quite a large number of the metallic oxides, known to chemistry, present in woolen garments and silk goods, and we suppose that there are very few of the silk ties worn chiefly by men which do not contain a very large proportion of mineral sub stances. These substances, of course give considerable weight to the material. Thus compounds of zinc, tin and aluminum are used, which, dissolved in perspiration, would, we have little doubt form corrosive salts.

"Although not highly soluble, this arsenic can be extricated by water and slightly acid solutions, and there is therefore a possibility, if not likeli-hood, of its being gradually absorbed





The carpenters are now being paid from 23 to 28 cents an hour, with a nine-hour day, and they claim that this is not sufficient, considering the increased cost of living, rent, food and clothing being much higher than a few years ago.
