Jiited Brockville Woman Drowns Herself.

She Loved Unwisely but too Well-Her Ungallant Swain Sent a Policeman After Her.

Brockville, Oct. 10. - Mrs. Rogers, oung widow, committed suicide last night by jumping into the river. The body was recovered at daybreak this morning. The circumstances leading up to the tragedy were as follows:— Mrs. Rogers' husband died about six years ago, leaving her with a baby boy, in straightened circumstances. About four years ago she opened a boarding house, and among those who came to lodge with her was a man named Hamel from Toronto. Hamel soon commenced to pay Mrs. Rogers marked attention, and it was understood that they would marry. However, a short time ago Hamel transferred his affections to another Brockville lady, and it was announced not long since that he was about to long since that he was about to marry her. When the news reached Rogers she was heard to remark that she would shoot Hamel rather than see him marry another woman. Hamel called at Mrs. Rogers' house yesterday afternoon. They had a heat-ed discussion, and she finally drew a revolver and threatened to shoot him He immediately raised a window near which he was standing, and leaped out, and forthwith sent the police to he house. It is supposed that Mrs. Rogers on seeing the police coming towards her house became frightened, and, fleeing out of a back door to Mathan's wharf, which is near the house, jumped into the river. An inquest will be held this afternoon.

as South Africa an Object Lesson.

London, Oct. 10 .- The vastness of Great Britain's military preparations -seemingly out of all proportion to the work in hand in South Africa-was not fully-realized until the war office announced that 25,000 reserves office amounced that 25,000 reserves had already been summoned to rejoin the colors. As a matter of fact, Gen. Sir Redvers Buller will have command of twice as many British soldiers as the Duke of Wellington. The reason back of this lavish display are probably a fear of a native rising, and possibly a conviction of the advis-ability of showing to Europe that Great Britain is prepared to resent any action resulting from the preva-lent continental ill-will. In this condepartment of state, and the friendly statements of President McKinley and Secretary of State Hay, published here, are heartily welcomed as a happy re-turn for Great Britain's refusal to sanction continental intervention in the war between the United States

NOT ENOUGH WIND

To-day's Yacht Race was not Even Started.

Breeze was Blowing Less Than Three Miles an Hour-May be Sailed

Wednesday. Special to The Planet.

New York, Oct. 10, 11 a. m.-Today's scheduled race between the yachts Shamrock and Columbia has been declared off owing to the unfavorable weather conditions.

Early this morning the wind blew at six miles an hour although the fog was quite dense. A feature was the reversal of the betting which last night and this morning was 100 to 75 on the Shamrock, while the Columbia end was demanding even greater odds.

At ten o'clock the wind had dropped ed to less than three miles an hour and the fog seemed thickening. The committee boat accordingly bulletined the announcement that to-day's race was off. It is proposed to sail it to-morrow if all parties are agreeable.

Girl Went up in a Balloon at TURONTO ROMAN CATHOLICS.

Archbishop Orders Them to be Sized up as Good, Bad and Indifferent.

Toronto, October 10 .- In the course of his discourse in St. Basil's church. Father Brenan announced that it was the intention of the archbishop to ascertain how many parishioners in the diocese of Toronto were Catholics, and how many were Catholics in name only. Father Brenan then went on to say that some days ago, the deanery of Toronto had con-vened, and there were forty clergy in attendance. The archbishop had then instructed the priests to compile a census of the Catholics in their parishes, and to make notes in their parishes, and to make notes in the lists so compiled, setting forth the merits of their parishioners as Catholics. RAILWAY SUIT FOR LOWER FARES.

The state of Michigan is to begin a suit against the Wabash Railroad Co. to compel it to reduce its rate of fare. Under the general railroad law any company earning less than \$2,000 a mile may charge three cents a mile, but when the earnings increase to more than \$2,000 a mile they are to charge only two and a half cents.

In the last report of the Wabash to the railroad commissioner, it was shown that this company's earnings had passed the \$2,000 mark, and Railroad Commissioner Osborn notified the company by letter last spring to reduce his rate of fare.

It appears that the company has paid no attention to this letter, and has gone right along charging the old three-cent rate. Railroad Commissioner Osborne brought the matter to the attention of the attorney-general's office, and Deputy Attorney-General Harry S. Chase came to Detroit to look into the matter. He went to the ticket office of the company and tendered money for a ticket from Detroit to Adrian at the rate of two and a half cents a mile. The agent of the company refused to accept the money, and Mr. Chase now says that he will begin suit against the company.

QUEEN'S COUNSEL.

The appointment of a batch of nearly eighty-one lawyers as Queen's counsel is absolutely opposed to the Liberal policy as laid down in April, 1897, when, by a solemn act of parliament they declared that only five Queen's counsel should be appointed in any one year, or twenty in four years. We publish that marvellous act in full so that the public may see that when they say one thing, no matter how solemnly they assert it, they mean another, and a wholly different thing.

Further, it will be observed that by this wonderful Hardy act, no lawyer was to be made a Queen's counsel unless he had been ten years at the bar.. Yet they appointed fledglings, hardly five years at the bar, among the recent batch.

The fact that the act was not to come into force until so declared by proclamation does not affect the question. The act shows the policy at the time it was passed in April, 1897. The following is a copy of the Act in

"An act respecting the appointment of Queen's counsel, assented to 13th

"1-(1). From and after the time this act shall be brought into force, no appointment of Her Majesty's counsel learned in law shall be made by the Lieutenant-Governor in council beyond the number of five in any one year, or twenty in four years, save and except in the following cases:

"(2). That of any person who may be appointed attorney general or soficitor-general of Canada or attorneygeneral of this province.

"(3). That of any person who may be appointed one of her Majestyis counsel learned in the law by the Governor-General in council for the federal courts, and who has not theretofore been appointed as such counsel by the Lieutenant-Governor in council. "2-Except in the cases mentioned



FASTING IS FATAL.

Loss of Weight Below a Certain Point Brings Death

Strange Case of a Woman who Succombed After 43 Days of Patient Suffering.

During a long fast the daily loss of weight becomes gradually less and less. Death comes when the total loss has reached a certain percentage, which percentage varies with the original weight. Fat animals may lose half their weight, thinner ones perhaps two-fifths.

A man or woman of rather spare habit, weighing 143 pounds, could, therefore, lose about 55 pounds before succumbing. Heart action, respiration and blood pressure remain unaltered during starvation, but the temperature of the body falls nearly a degree in most cases. The secretion of gastric juice ceases, but saliva and bile are still formed. The duration of life depends upon the extent and activity of the physiological processes.

Children die after a fast of from three to five days, during which they have lost a quarter of their weight. Healthy adults, however, have fasted 60 days when water has been taken.

Dr. Schaeffer, a German physician, notes the case of a woman, aged 47, who died after a fast of 43 days, during which she drank water freely. Her weight, which was 143 pounds a year before her death, was reduced to 99 pounds. It was a case of suicidal melancholia, and the woman patiently carried out her horrible undertaking so quietly as to scarcely attract the notice of her family and died at last calmly and peacefully without complaint or apparent evidence of suffering.



> n the Fall, Sowing Rye and Pasturing the Rye and Second Growth Oats 1 hat Fall.

An Iowa farmer writes: The hest pasture we ever saw in this locality was made by disking oat stubble in the fall. sowing rye and pasturing the rye and second growth cats that fall. In the spring after the ground was dry mammoth clover seed was sown at the rate of one bushel to eight acres and stock turned in. When the rye headed, it was clipped with a mower set as high as possible. This made a mulch for the clower, and also thickened it, and it was a good pasture all the season. The next year it was still better, the cows wading to their bellies in clover. The Origin and History of the lead Pencil.

Interesting Facts About a Most Popular Instrument.

The lead pencil, the most common or all writing implements, is somewhat over 200 years old. The term "lead pencil;" ogical sense, there is not a particle of lead in its composition. The lead pencil originated with the discovery of the graphite mines in England in 1664 during the reign of Queen Elizabeth. As graphite so greatly resembled galena, the German name for which was bleiglanz, it was given the name of blei, or lead.

In the early days of lead pencil making the graphite was sawed into thin sheets and cut into strips smaller and smaller until they were of a size to be covered with light wooden slips and thus serve as potency, varicocele, shrunken organs, land were considered of inestimable value emissions, premature discharge, necessary and were protected by law and were protected by law. was great waste-first, in digging, tor any of the pieces were too small for cutwing, and again in the mander of cutting graphite, which was so crude that

First, the wood had to be cut away and the graphite heated over a light to soften it, after which it was drawn to a point with the

In 1795 Conte, a Frenchman, came on the idea of using pulverized graphite and binding clay. This discovery resulted in pencils of varying hardness, according to the amount of binding clay added, and each pencil was of exactly the same hardness throughout its length. Soon after this discovery improvements followed in mixing, rolling and shaping the graphite composition, which was cut into lengths, placed in a warm oven to harden and finally incased in wood, as seen to-

It has Worked Splendidly at New York

Supplying News of the Yacht Contests off Sandy Hook.

New York, Oct. 10. - The multitude of yacht enthusiasts are delighted with the work done by Marconi and his wireless telegraph. While "extras" of 'papers that didn't patronize the wireless messages were flying around town on Thursday, distributing "news" that ultimately proved absolutely untrue, Marconi was sending to the Herald brief, but accurate statements, that told the plain facts about the race. Many thought Marconi's wireless machine would prove a fine fizzle, but it is a splendid success.

Here's an example of the benefit of this system in sending news from sea. A rumor thrilled all New York, that the Grand Republic, loaded with human freight, had gone to the bottom as a result of a collision. Friends. ashore were in a frenzy. The rumor reached Marconi. This was his answer: "Sunk, is she? Well, no, not this time. She is following in the wake of the Gen. Slocum." And thousands in this city were happy again.

Signor Marconi conquered the elesignor Marconi conquered the ele-ments by overcoming the obstacles of haze, fog and smoke clouds and kept the anxious public informed of the movements of the big yachts long af-ter they were beyond the range of vision of the watchers assembled on various telegraph station boats.

various telegraph station boats.

Marconi and his operators kept
hemselves informed of every move of themselves informed of every move of the yachts by getting to favorable po-sitions denied to those who were an-chored miles away. They knew what was transpiring. There was no guess work about the intelligence flashed across the hazy interval separating the observation boat and the receiv-ing boat. ing boat.

THE MARCONI SYSTEM. A technical description of the Mar signal system would nearly serve to bewilder those who are not learned in the mysteries of electricity, but the principle is comparatively simple. The signals are transmitted from one point to another by waves of influence. To explain this, it is but necessary to remind the reader of the effect of a stone thrown into the centre of a mill pond. A series of waves are set up which go on expanding until the un-dulations break upon the farthest shore. 
