The *Dominion Philatelist* for March is composed mainly of C. P. A. and reprinted matter.

The March Chicago Stamp News contains some C. P. S. news, and—publisher's advertisements.

One Dime for March is on our table, composed mainly of notes and short items. It hails from Kossuth, Ind.

The *Philatelic Tribune*, now in its 70th number, commences with its issue of April 1st as a semi-monthly magazine.

We are in receipt of Nos. 1 and 2 of the *Philatelic Argosy*, published by Frank R. Hoyt, of Drawer 156, Buffelo N. Y.

The Stamp Collectors' Monthly is a bright little contemporary from over the water. Published at Kingston-on-the-Thames, England.

The Country Youth is an interesting monthly for country boys and girls, and contains a philatelic department. It hails from Milwaukee, Wis.

The Stamp Collector for March contains much interesing matter; well written editorials, and short articles. Published at 62 Ramsay Road, Forest Gate, England.

We have for the first time seen that peer of English Stamp Magazines, the *Philatelic Journal of Great Britain*. The editor has our thanks for two files of vol. 2, to date.

The publishers of that aristocrat of the South, the Southern Philatelist, have at last seen fit to place us on their exchange list. Many thanks for your kindness, Bro. Luhn.

We are pleased to see that *The American Philatelist* and *Collector* is typographically improving. The March issue now before us contains some short, interesting articles.

The Stamp News and Philatelic Record are both up to their usual fine standard of excellence, and we regret that space will not permit the review of the same. Theo. Buhl & Co., 11 Queen Victoria Street, London, E. C., are the publishers.

The *Philatelic Monthly* for April was the first April philatelic magazine to put in an appearance. Although there is but little reading in it, its promptness is a worthy feature.

We are in receipt of auction catalogues of the sales of :—C. H. Holden, Port Dover, Ont.; Albrecht & Witt, and Bogert & Durbin, of N. Y.; S. B. Bradt, Chicago, and T. S. Clark, of Belleville. The Cataloguers have our thanks.

We had given the New Hampshire Philatelist up as "dead and gone," but we had the honor of a visit from its January issue a few days since. The cause of the delay was the editor's serious illness. We are glad to welcome our little contemprorary back to the ranks again.

The Collector for March contains some interesting articles, and the size of the pages is further enlarged. Publishers who change the size of the page of their paper should only do so at the end of a volume, as such changes in the middle of a volume put a subscriber who wishes to bind his papers to great inconvenience.

We have before us the initial (March.15th) number, of the Long Island Philatelist. It is somewhat better than the former effort of Mr. Ashrorft, but a large portion of its space throughout the whole paper is devoted to back-biting The Rice Advertising Agency. A publisher ambitious of the approbation of the Philatelic public, should be a little careful.

The Eastern Philatelist for March, as usual, is full of interesting reading. It contains articles on "The designs of postage stamps;" "A Philatelist's Misfortune;" "Specialism vs. General Collecting;" "Philatelic Reminiscences;" "Philately's object," etc. It also contains a number of well written editorials. See advertisement of the publisher in this number.

Stanley Gibbons Monthly Journal for February is at hand. It contains editorial notes; a very large chronicle; "The Lametia Reprints;" (Reminiscences;" Some more information on the London Philatelic Trials;" "The Government Postal Issues of the Confederate States of America;" "Notes and News," etc., etc. Price, 4s. per year, post free. We have also received, in addition to those reviewed:—Skaudinavish Frimerke Tidende, The Eastern Stamp, Empire State Stamp Journal, The North Western Monthly, American Philatelist, Eagle Philatelist, Philatelic Fraud Reporter, Philatelic Journal of America, Post Office, Curiosity Collector, United Association Philatelic, La Echo de la Timberlogie. SPECIALISTS AND SPECIALISM.

Second Paper.

BY A SUBSCRIBER.

Have just received the March number of your esteemed paper, and notice there is an attempt at criticism of my short article which appeared in your February issue. One of the first things one who attempts to criticise should do is to keep to the truth and not to go contrary to it in order to carry a point. In the first place Mr. Bernstein admits that the older issues are going, but he asserts that specialism has nothing to do with the rise. He makes the assertion but does not prove it. I say most decidedly that specialism is the main cause of this rapid rise in prices. Why? Well, it is a well known fact that a

general collector (as a rule) does not go into the sub-varieties of a stamp as do the specialists now; the specialist will, in most cases, have at least three or four varieties of the same stamp of an old issue, general collectors one. Therefore it follows that if a specialist has need for three or four varieties of that certain stamp while the general collector uses but one, it shows clearly that specialism makes the demand for that stampfour times greater; it follows that the stamp itself must increase in value on account of the increased demand. So Mr. Bernstein errs in his argument (?) that specialism does not tend to aid the increase in value of the older issues. Secondly, he says, "Everyone with common sense knows it is certainly the older issues that advance. No one expects the new issues to advance." If my worthy friend had a little more common sense he would never have made such a statement as the above. All old issues do not advance; take our common 1d. red stamp of England. Is that not an old issue, Mr. Bernstein? Yes, most certainly, but is it increasing in value? By no means, they are scarcely worth their price as waste paper here in England. Further, Mr. Bernstein is far from correct in his statement that new issues do not become rare. He is far from correct, for had I space I could cite scores of examples of recently issued stamps which are now classed as rare. Thirdly, Mr. Bernstein asserts that when the specialist has gained a complete collection of any country he has gained nothing in knowledge, science, historical or geographical culture. I would venture to assert that the knowledge of a specialist at the end of ten years would be of more account and use to him than all my worthy friend B. could learn from his general collection in a like period of time. The specialist studies his stamps-searching out their minute difference, points of beauty, and historical relations. The general collector's collection is larger than that of the specialist, and he therefore can not give each stamp the same studious attention as does the specialist. He glances at this country, looks at that, 'here a little and there a little,' and as a result his knowledge is a scattered one. He knows no one thing perfectly, and such being the case what does it profit him? Take the specialist and his country, and you will find he has gained more solid, useful knowledge from his one country than the general collector has gained from his hundreds. It is just the same in Philately as in the outside

world, the "Jack of all trades" never learns as much useful knowledge as he who has the application to apply himself studiously to one thing. Mr. Bernstein states that "it is my belief that specialism is growing." It is here that he shows most stupendous ignorance of Philately at the present day. It is possible Mr. Bernstein has been under a spell the last few years, as in Edward Bellamy's "Looking Backward," One would think he had been absent from the field of Philately since darkened ages of Philately that have past. Specialism is on the increase; every department of Philately at the present day proves it. Has Mr. Bernstein ever attended a meeting of our great English or the large American local Societies? If so he would not have made such a statement. It is to the meetings of these Societies where the cream of our collectors resort; it is there it can be seen how large a following specialism has. Again, take the numerous publications that are being constantly published, dealing with the stamps of a special country only, this also shows the great and rapid increase of specialism. Before closing, Mr. Editor, I should like to cite one more example which shows Mr. Bernstein's great ignorance of this matter, and the increase of specialism. A publication of a large series of specialist's albums, numbering some hundred different books, for the use of the specialist. Could a firm attempt such a large undertaking if specialism were not on the increase? No! There are other remarks made by Mr. Bernstein, but none of them bear enough weight for me to waste your space, Mr. Editor, and my time in their criticism. I trust no one has been led astray by the thoughtless statements of Mr. Bernstein.

Thanking you Mr. Editor for having allowed me to so encroach on your valuable space I will close, trusting that this will reach you in time for your April issue.

MONTREAL NOTES.

Efforts are being made by one of us to have a Stamp Lottery in Montreal some time next autumn.

SIR Adolphe Caron, by refusing to reduce the rate of postage, has lost his chance to go down to posterity as the two-cent Minister.

The splendid collection of Mr. W. J. Trenaman, of Three Rivers, Que., containing about 3,000 varieties of stamps, issued prior to 1876, altogether with a few duplicates, was sold for the small amount of \$17.00 to Mr. Ant. R. Vallee, of this city. Mr. Trenaman offered his collection to well known American dealers, but none of them desired to make an offer. The vhole is catalogued at \$600,000, and a part of it was sent lately to Mr. A. R. Rogers, to be sold by auction.

At the fire which recently occurred in the offices of the Great North-Western Telegraph Company in this city, a quantity of the Company's FRANKS, of last year, which had been set aside for a certain Stamp dealcr, whose name is withheld pending inquiries from other dealers, was completely destroyed. These franks have always been scarce, and hard to procure, and in consequence of the loss referred to above, the value of those in circulation will be much increased. The new color of the franks for 1892 is olive green.

DEAR SIR,—The Association hereby warns philatelists against the following forgeries, which have been brought under their notice:

JAPAN.—I sen. brown, no syllabic character and "branches crossed"; 4 sen. rose, syllabic character; id.; 30 sen. gray; no syllabic character.

INDIA.—First issue, 4 annas with head inverted, the red portion of the stamp being forged.

Nova Scotia. —6 pence green, a dangerous forgery.

New South Wales, Victoria and Br. Guiana.— Various early issues, poor copies of unperforated stamps, cut close and falsely perforated.

MAURITIUS.—6d. green, (Gibbons type 1410), value altered to 1s. green but with Cr. and C. C. watermark.

BORNEO.—1863, 8c. black and brown, (Gibbons type 1631), with forged surcharge.

To the Editor of THE CANADIAN PHILATELIST:

DEAR SIR,-Our Philatelic brethren over the border have lately been urging the question of putting stamps on the free list, and in consequence a bill is going through Congress now to that effect. But we poor Canadian dealers and collectors are still being fleeced, and nobody seems to be doing very much in the matter. I will give one instance by way of illustration: A short time ago I sent to a dealer in the United States for a selection of rare Mexican stamps on approval. A few days afterwards I received a card from the custom-house authorities saying there was a parcel (?) held for duty addressed to me. I called at the office next day, and found they had stopped three sheets of stamps weighing about one ounce. I opened the letter and the clerk stands one office. The total value was about \$14.00, and he said, "Well, I guess we'll have to charge you 35 % duty on these—\$4.90, please." Of course I didn't pay the \$4.90, but sent the sheets head, and I guess they won't improve the dealer's back, and I guess they won't improve the dealer's opinion of the Canadian Government when he re-ceives them. This is a most decidedly outrageous state of affairs, and the sooner there's a row about it the better.

We are informed by Mr. J. Bernstein, jr., that the publication of *The United Association Philatelist*, the official organ of the United Philatelis Association, has been discontinued; the Society expect to obtain *The Washington Philatelist* as their official organ. It is possible that this Society will amalgamate with the P.S. of C. in the near future. Negotiations to that effect are now under way.

The Sons of Philately are still in a prosperous condition; each month brings in many new applications, mostly those of young collectors. The official organ, The Collector, has again been enlarged.

According to the March *Philatelic Journal* of *Great Britain*, the International Philatelic Union seems to be in a flourishing condition; 8 new members, and 6 applications are published, and there are about 255 members on the roll.

A. and smaller societies, but owing to the independence manifested by some of the latter, it is our opinion that but little will come of the matter.

To Members of P. S. of C .:

I have to report considerable progress this month; I have got the agreements and sheets all sent out, and have had promises from many advanced Canadian Philatelists to put their best duplicates in the guaranteed circuits, and in view thereof, have written the various Exchange Managers of the American Philatelic Societies to obtain membership, and circulate good U. S. stamps for the benefit of Canadian Collectors, as follows:

DEAR SIR,-I beg to draw your attention to the fact that the Exchange Department of the Philatelic Society of Canada (Incorporated,) is now in working

For the persual of your society, I beg to enclose one of our agreements; clauses 3, 4, or 5 can be struck out to suit the wishes of the member as to which branch he desires to participate in.

We have two circuits, a guaranteed and unguaranteed or juvenile one. All members have to sign an agreement as enclosed, with this exception, that the juvenile branch get their sheets on an agreement without the guarantee clause.

All members sending in sheets must state which circuit they wish their sheets circulated in, which will be carefully followed.

There are several members of your society already members of the P. S. of C., and trust more may speedily join, as they will find it greatly to their advantage

Owing to this guaranteed circuit, I have received requests for exchange sheets from many advanced Canadian Collectors who state that they are going to place the better class of old Canadian stamps (especially the New Brunswick and Nova Scotian issues)

in circuit, and they also are anxious to obtain the same class from other places.

With the object of giving them the best exchange, I take the liberty of calling your attention to the above facts, and ask you to place this letter and the enclosed agreement before your society, and request all those who are members of the P. S. of C. to apply to me for sheets and agreements at once, and I will place their sheets in AI circuits on the guaranteed agreements, and will, on receiving an agreement duly signed by applicant and guarantor, forward them AI exchange sheets from Canadian members.

At the same time, I would also have you draw your attention to the fact that they can place their cheaper stamps in the juvenile branch, which I hope to carry

on successfully

I trust many of your members will immediate!y join the P. S. of C., and send in sheets for exchange.

I also have that all P. S. of C. members of your society w form a branch and appoint you or some other manager. I will take the members of the P. S. of C. in the branch as guaranters of their manager.

We have no trouble in getting stamps through the Canadian Customs, and as professional duties often call me to Detroit, I can personally pass the sheets going on American circuits through the U.S. Customs,

I hope this will secure for the Canadian Collectors good U. S. exchange.

It must be borne in mind that the member who sends sheets in himself (and not I) selects whether his sheets go in the guaranteed or juvenile circuit, and I hope the members will, when sending sheets in, be sure and fill up the places on the sheets so as to designate the circuit they wish their sheets circulated.

I would like to receive a good number more applications than I have got, and wish to get sheets filled and returned so I can circulate before May 1st, if possible.

Let the younger members remember that they can put in and receive the juvenile sheets on signing an agreement without the guarantee.

Owing to the formation of the Juvenile Branch, I am revising the rules of the department, but they will not be materially changed. Yours truly,

RULES OF THE SALES AND AUCTION DEPARTMENT.

1. Sales will be advertised each month, All lots for advertisement must be in the hands of the Exchange Superintendent on or before the 10th of the month.

2. Any person may bid on lots, but only members of the Society can place stamps

in sales.

3. Each member sending in stamps for sale must send a self addressed envelope with postage, either for return of lot if not sold or remittance of cash if sold, otherwise stamps will be held or postage deducted from price.

4. Bids will be received for stamps till the 15th of the month following the date of advertising, when, if not sold, stamps will be

returned to owner.

5. Promptly on the 15th of the month following advertisement the highest bidder will be notified, when he must send the amount of his bid, with a self addressed envelope and stamped, within five days, when the stamp will be forwarded to him, and if not returned so as to reach the Exchange Superintendent by the 20th of the same month, the money will be remitted the owner. In case of a refusal to receive or neglect to remit, the next lower bidder will have the option to purchase on same terms.

6. All persons sending in stamps for sale must give a reserve price, at which the stamp will be held and not sold below the same. If, in the opinion of the Exchange Superintendent, the price fixed is exorbitant, he may

refuse to place in sale.

7. The fees provided in By-laws will be deducted from purchase price when remitting owner.

EDITORIAL.

After careful consideration, we have decided to drop for the present our Chronicle of New Issues, in order to make room for more interesting matter. A large percentage of Philately papers have these chronicles, and we can say without fear of contradiction that not one fourth of their subscribers read it entirely through. We have therefore decided to drop it for the present only. After our first volume is complete, it is our intention to enlarge to 32 pages, and we shall then, in all probability, renew our chronicle. Any new issues of particular interest will be reviewed under the Editorial column.

Messrs. H. A. McMillan & Co., of Kingstonon-the-Thames, England, have our thanks for forwarding us one of the new one penny red card, which were put into general circulation on April 1st. The design is a unique one, and consists of a fulllength portrait of the Queen standing in a room of the palace, facing to the left, in an oval frame; around this various ornamental frames, "Postage" in scroll above, "One Penny" in scroll below. It is the best and most unique card of the general issue ever issued by England.

The Publishers of this magazine have undertaken a work which they feel will meet the approval of their patrons-that is, the publication regularly of a series of Philatelic "Hand-Books." The work is one of great value to the collector, as it is by far the best and most accurate ever published. Paper covers. 25 cents, postage free. Send your order at once.

Nos. 2, 3 and 4 of our Philatelic Hand Books are now in course of active preparation, and we desire the co-operation of all our Canadian patrons to make No. 2 a success. It is entitled "Canada and its Stamp Collectors," and is a directory alphabetically arranged. S. of C. for membership, but was refused on above ground. We were somewhat surprised, on looking over the March Dominion Philatelist, to see that he has been admitted to membership in the C. P. A. Queer, isn't it?

We had no idea of the number of collectors in this city, before opening our new office. Since that, we have made the acquaintance of scores of collectors whom we never before heard of. Philately is experiencing a boom here, and a brisk one at that.

Our worthy official collector, Mr. L. Miller, took a run up to London some days since to endeavor to collect an account placed in his hands against the British American Stamp Co., and found them to be four or five irresponsible boys, who had not called for their mail since October last. Mr. Miller's department is in A I order.

Our subscription list is rapidly growing, and now most of the prominent collectors of America have sent in their subscriptions. We shall be pleased to receive yours.

Collectors please note! We have discontinued to send sheets to agents, etc. Lack of necessary time on account of rapid increase of the sale of our packets and mixtures. At a recent English auction, a Canadian 12½c, green unperforated, sold for £2.6. The Cataloguers classed it as an error. We are enclined to doubt the authenticity of this so-called error. It is in all probability a clipped specimen. We have occasionally come across this stamp with very wide margin, and it would be a very easy matter to clip off the perforation, leaving a seemingly unperforated specimen.

Mr. J. Bernstein, jr., (Vice-President of the P. S. of C. for Quebec, and Vice-President of the United Philatelic Association,) has removed from his late residence at Montreal; and intends to reside in this city in future. We welcome him to our ranks.

Sets of prepaid newspaper stamps are at present in use by Dominion and Canadian Express Companies. Size about 1½ by 3¾. As far as artistic engraving goes, they are not much to look at; most of them being coarsely engraved.

All subscriptions to this paper must commence with current number; back numbers are very scarce, and can only be supplied at the following prices: Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 8, are 10c. each; No. 7 is 20c. These numbers are only supplied to our subscribers.

We note with pleasure the rapid increase of the auction business with Philately. Auctions, as a rule we believe, prove financial successes. The prices obtained at auction for a stamp is a more reliable estimate of its value than any priced catalogues are. We find the larger part of the auction business done in England, where high prices are realized.

The Philatelic Literature of this continent on the average, is not near up to the standard of that we receive from Europe. Take, for instance, such large, high-class, newsy papers as the Stamp News, La Echo de la Timbrelogie, Philatelic Record, Stanley Gibbon's Monthly Journal, Philatelic Journal of Great Britain, London Philatelist, etc. It is also noticeable, that there are none of the small, trashy papers which sometimes appear on this side of the water; such papers deserve no support.
