





In respect of the 25 industrial diseases which come under the Act, compensation was paid in 27 cases of death and in \$,233 cases of disablement. The bulk of these (90.8 per cent.) occurred in the mining industry. Of the remainder 569, or 6.9 per cent., were cases of lead-poisoning.

Only a very small proportion of the claims under the Act became the subject of litigation. The total number of cases taken into court was 10.208, Many of these, however, were applications for dealing with

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
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WHERE TO FIND TRADE.





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

Problem For the Allies.

The Allies are fighting the whole of the mobilized strength of Germany with perhaps less than one-third of their own strength. The problem of the war for the Allies is to bring the remaining two-thirds of their resources and strength into the fighting line at the earliest possible moment, and this is largely though by no means entirely, a question of finance. Russia is in a different position to either Britain of France. She is a prodigiously rich country in natural resources, food, raw material-she produces practically every commodity. She has a great and growing population, a virile and industrious people. sources are overflowing. She has the labor to develop them in abundance-Russia has since the war began enormously increased her resources by supsing the sale of all alcoholic liquors (cheers). is hardly realized that by that means alone she has increased the productivity of her labor by something between 30 and 50 per cent. (renewed cheers). It is as if she had added millions of laborers to her labor reserve, without even increasing the expense of main taining them.






