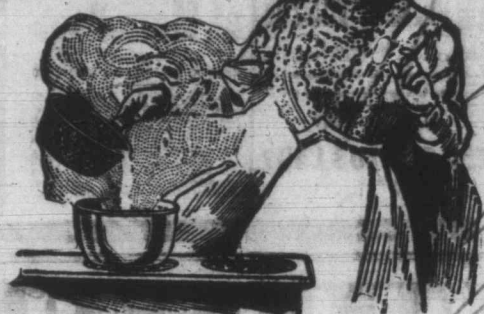

The many Halifax friends of Captain Horace Dickey will learn with regret of his death at the front.

Captain Dickey, who was a son of the late Hon. Arthur Dickey, of Amherst, enlisted at Edmonton but later was transferred to a Nova Scotian battalion and was adjutant of that regiment.

Private Gilbert James Bartlow was admitted to No. 1 Convalescent Depot at Boulogne, September 10, suffering from shrapnel wound in thigh.

Private Bartlow left Halifax last winter with the 64th Battalion, but he was transferred to another battalion at the front.

J. E. Fielding, 26 Honover Street, Halifax, received official notification that his son F. N. Fielding has been wounded in action, shot through the left arm, on September 17.

C. H. Cahan, K.C., has received a cable stating that his son, Captain John F. Cahan, First Canadian Pioneer Corps, is in No. 7 Stationary Hospital, Boulogne, with a wound in the lower part of the spine, and that his condition is serious, though comfortable.

Lieut.-Col. Flowers, who left Halifax as second in command of the 64th Battalion, but was subsequently assigned to duty with another Nova Scotia battalion, has been slightly wounded in action.

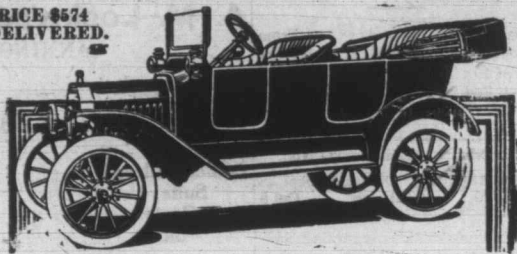

## BOOSE DESTROYED

The Liverpool Advance, says: Two commercial trunks filled with flasks of "Scotch," and several barrels containing ale and porter, seized at the railway station by P. McAuliffe, Inspector under Nova Scotia Temperance Act, a few weeks previous to the Provincial Election, and placed in the County Jail for safe keeping, were yesterday taken to the Inness' dock, and the contents destroyed. There were 720 bottles of ale and porter, and 250 flasks of whiskey. A large number of people were present to witness the destruction of the liquor.
