The company may acquire all lands or beaches necessary to construct the tunnel under the provisions of the Canadian Railway Act.

The capital stock of the company is \$600,000, divided into chares of \$1,00 cach, with power to increase the same to \$1,000,000. No person shall be elected a director unless he holds 20 shares, and no call upon the capital stock shall be made exceeding 10 per cell, on the subscribed stock. The directors, at any general meeting at which two-thirds of the subscribed stock of the company is represented, may, under the authority of the shareholders, issue bonds not exceeding in amount \$4,000,000, which shall be secured by a mortage dead.

The company may receive aid in bounces of monage or debenures, or henceft of any sort, from any person or hody corporate, municipal or politic, and may enter into agreements for the carrying out of conditions attached to the giving of such bonness. It is also granted the power of transferring its franchise to or amalgamating its stock with any other railway in the United States or Canada.

All trains of railways using the sunnel shall have equal privileges. The Act provides that the tunnel is to be commenced within three years after May 4th, 1889, and finished within eight years.


