A Little Instrument for Recording the Impurity of the Air.

A Little Instrument for Recording the Impurity of the Air. A more than a most has been invented by a scientis: named AitKen which en-harder the summer of the atmosphere in a room to be seen at a glanes. It is call-ed the "kinescope," and measures the amount of impurities which any given yourne of air contains.
