A Vote on Incorporation.

Sheriff Belcher has posted notices throughout the town during the week informing the ratepayers that he will hold a poll on Monday, Jan. 23d, at the store of James S. Moore, Esq., on the matter of incorporation. The poll will open at 9 o'clock a. m., and remain open until 4 o'clock p. m. The voting shall be by ballot; those desiring to vote for the incorporation of the town shall deposit one ballot with the word "For," either written or printed upon it, and those wishing to vote against the incorporation of the town shall deposit one ballot, either written or printed, marked "Against." The boundaries fixed by the sheriff for the proposed town are as follows:

Incorporation Again. Mr. Epton.—The Acadian of Jan. 16th last, contains short letters from the town clerks of Kentville, Parrsboro and Port Hawkesbury, relative to incorporation as applied to those towns. The information is certainly of great value to anyone who is studying the subject. The more knowledge of this kind, or of any kind that bears upon this subject, that you can place before your readers the better will they be prepared to act when called upon to vote for or against incorporation. The financial aspect of the matter is the phase of the subject in which most are deeply concerned. The letters referred to above make a fair showing for incorporation; but it should be borne in mind that two of these towns are two or three times as large as Wolfville. The main object of this letter is to place before your readers the objects to be provided for by assessment under incorporation, and some of the points of difference between assessment under incorporation and assessment for municipal purposes by the Act of 1883. The objects to be assessed for include:— 1. The salaries and compensation to the officers of the town. 2. The support of the poor and insane paupers. 3. The erection and repair of public school houses and the support of the public schools of the town. 4. The equipment and expenses of the fire department, the purchase of land for school and fire engine houses and the erection of buildings for fire purposes. 5. The maintenance of town courts, civil and police. 6. The laying out, opening, making, repairing and improving the roads, streets, lanes and bridges of the town. 7. The providing of town buildings, care of property, expenses of police, extra constables and watchmen, the lighting and cleaning of streets, the interest on debentures issued by the town, and all expenses incurred in the due execution of the different powers and trusts, vested by law in the town, its mayor, council and officers. The assessment for the foregoing purposes shall be made as follows:— 1. Every male resident of the town between the ages of eighteen years and sixty years shall pay an annual poll tax of two dollars, except active members of fire companies, &c. 2. All real estate and property within the town, and all such personal property and income as is hereafter defined, whether owned or received by individuals, co-partners or corporations, shall be liable to taxation. 3. Income shall be assessed at its actual amount, and such income shall not be subject to any deduction by reason of indebtedness or expense of living. The sum paid as a poll tax, two dollars, for all between 18 and 60 years, will considerably reduce the amount to be levied upon the property of the town. The income also serves the same purpose. The salaries of college professors and all teachers of ministers and clerks shall be assessed in full. The gross sum received annually by professional men in their various callings, the amount earned by mechanics and day laborers, the profits on any business and the products of any garden or farm shall be regarded as income and assessed at its full value. To make this plain: Suppose a farmer residing in an incorporated town has real estate valued at \$5,000, personal property at \$2,000 and the products of his year's operations on the farm at \$2,000 and income from other sources \$500. The valuation will stand:— Real estate, 5,000. Personal property, 2,000. Income from farm, 2,000. Income from other sources, 500. Total, 9,500. There may be cases like the following: A teacher rents a dwelling worth \$1,500. He has personal property worth \$1,000 and receives \$1,000 salary. His valuation will then be:— Real estate, 1,500. Personal property, 1,000. Income, 1,000. Total, 3,500. From the following it is apparent that income and the poll tax may reduce the assessment on property from 25 to 30 per cent. It will be seen that the difference the incorporation and the municipal assessment is in the poll tax and income tax. OEN OF THEM. "Another One" Again Heard From. EDITOR ACADIAN.—I observed in the last issue of the Acadian a lengthy article over the signature of "One of They," in which the writer endeavors to show that the effects of incorporation are so obscured and so little known generally that a committee of men of the best judgment should be chosen to get information from other towns similarly situated to Wolfville; and insinuates that "a few joint-stock companies and a few private individuals" are the promoters of the present movement in the direction of incorporation. It is well known to readers of the Acadian that such is not the case, as the subject of incorporation has been frequently referred to in your columns for the last four or five years, and the present move has come simply as the result of an educated sentiment in its favor. In a glance at the signatures appended to the petition asking that a vote be taken in the matter we do not recognize in any extent the almost every leading man of the town—men who probably know quite as much about the effects of incorporation as the

All ratepayers residing and holding property within the above limits are entitled to vote.

Wolfville Division's Anniversary.

On Monday evening last the members of Wolfville Division celebrated the 29th anniversary of the organization of the society. Their hall on that occasion was prettily decorated with notices and banners and was comfortably filled with invited friends of the members. The programme consisted of original papers by members of the Division, addresses, readings, etc. Papers were read by Messrs H. B. Davison, E. Blackadder and Clifford Jones, in which the Division's work, its position in and claim upon the community, the effects of intemperance upon the human system and in the world, were referred to and ably discussed. The meeting was addressed by Mrs. Tule, president of the W. C. T. U., who referred to the origin and traced the progress and work of that society in a pleasant and profitable manner—Mr. Jas. Elder, Professor Tufts, Mr. G. V. Rand and Mr. Saunders. Their remarks were excellent and much enjoyed by those present. Dr. H. Chipman, of Grand Pre, County Deputy, was expected to be present and give an address, but was prevented. Notwithstanding this and other disappointments, the meeting was a decided success. Wolfville Division enters upon its fortieth year in a healthy condition, and promises to do good work in the future, as it has in the past. Its present membership is in the vicinity of 120—with a good average attendance. They now occupy their own hall which is a credit to the town. Out of those who signed the charter at the time of its organization, Mr. G. V. Rand is now the only one who has continued his membership. Many who have been members are now occupying prominent positions in our Province and in the world. Wolfville is better for the work done by the Division in the past, and it has many friends who wish it continued prosperity.

Municipal Council Meeting.

The Municipal Council of King's met in the Court House, Kentville, on Tuesday last. With the exception of Mr. John L. Gettridge, (Ward 7) all the councillors were present and sworn in. After routine business was transacted the following officers were elected:— Warden—W. E. Roscoe. Deputy Warden—Leander Rand. Municipal Clerk—L. DuVal. Chipman. Treasurer—T. L. Dodge. The Mayor, in regard to the election of Municipal Clerk has been changed, and now enables the Clerk to remain in office during good conduct, and does away with the necessity of electing one each year. The following are the principal officers for Ward 8:— Rates Collector—C. E. Bishop. Assessors—E. R. Bishop and James Simson. Commissioners of Streets, Wolfville—Geo. W. Borden, Wm. Handwick and Lewis Murphy. Board of Revision and Appeal—Dr. Fuller, Stephen Taylor and C. R. Dickey. Overseers of the Poor for Horton all re-elected, with John W. Wallace re-elected in place of G. H. Wallace, resigned. Revisors—Ward 8, J. W. Caldwell; Ward 9, P. Chipman. It was decided by a unanimous vote that the services of Chas. I. Wolf, Scott Act Investor, be continued at the same salary, \$200 per year. A full report of the proceedings will appear next week.

Another Ratepayer Heard From.

Mr. Epton.—I see that Sheriff Belcher has issued notices for a plebeians of the ratepayers of Wolfville on the incorporation of the town. This is of course the outcome of the petition circulated for the purpose some weeks ago, and very largely signed by the business men and heavier ratepayers of the district. Now this is a very serious matter, and should be looked at from every point of view and thoroughly discussed before a vote is taken on it. We have already a heavy tax for water, a board of water commissioners and secretary, who are building for the section a large and expensive school-house which must be furnished and paid for; and we have also a board of street commissioners, who handle a large amount of road tax, (but our roads seem to get worse instead of better)—a stipendiary magistrate and a municipal councillor for the ward, to look after us all, and keep us in order if they can. I will give all those men credit for endeavoring to do their duty according to the best of their judgement, but as each board is independent of the others, and being human, each is apt to think itself of primary importance, and strive to get the largest amount possible to spend on the particular matter. The result will not, in my opinion, be satisfactory to the ratepayer as if the whole control were vested in one body, with one executive officer who can always be found at his post in business hours. Thus with a smaller number of paid officials your work will be better and more economically performed under incorporation than as at present, and you will have the satisfaction of controlling and getting the benefit of all the funds raised by taxation. We have made a great deal of progress during the past few years in population, buildings and improvements. We must endeavour to keep up the impetus thus gained by all legitimate measures, and to accomplish this, we must have better roads, better sidewalks, better drainage, street lights, and above all better order on our streets; and these are things that we could do satisfactorily through incorporation.
