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Wolfville Boy Writes Interestingly From Front.

The following letter is from W. C. Atchbald, Jr., son of W. C. Atchbald, of Wolfville, now serving with the McGill hospital unit at the front.

My Father, — Just a month since I left Canada, such a month of interesting experience. I injured my right hand so have been able to do very little writing.



I have talked with many wounded Princess Patricia's and summing it all up no body of men can surpass the Canadians. They always make conditions better (advantage over Britishers) and are afraid of nothing.

I have often wished to get right into the trenches and still think so, but perhaps I can help best in this way.

I visited Canterbury, of the world wide interest and historic fame, Saltwood Castle, Dover Castle, over looking the noted Chalk Cliffs, Caesars' Camp, Old Hythe Church, Langgate Camp and many others.

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so much my visit to Canterbury, at which place one could spend weeks and always have some new interest. I sum up the beauty here as a civilized kind of beauty in contrast to the wild natural beauty of Canada.

Regarding military affairs. London and the country here, as I see it, are not yet actively awake to the extreme seriousness of the situation.

Regarding the affairs in France and at the front I will sum up my view up in these few words; that conditions there are far, very far from the successful state which perhaps you all on that side are lead to believe.

In Reply to Mr. Adams.

To the Editor of THE ACADIAN:

Let me frankly confess my complete surprise that Mr. Adams should have replied to my recent letter in your paper on apple prices. I little expected to draw fire from a man who could lie down so quietly under the much more extended charges contained in my communication to the 'Berwick Register,' of April 21st. However as he has seen fit even at this late hour to give us a fairly courteous presentation of his side I shall endeavor to reply in the same spirit.

In answering criticisms I think Mr. Adams relies altogether too much upon his system of bookkeeping and the reputation of his auditor. Important as these things may be there are many other things of much more importance in the conduct of a large business to which the auditor is very properly utterly indifferent. I have never heard the arithmetic of the 'Central' office questioned and the time spent in defending it is so much time wasted.

No matter how correctly 'Central' may conduct his business it can never divert itself of responsibility for the forty or more subsidiary companies scattered throughout the Valley.

These companies I have heard severely criticised, not only for the conduct of their business, but for their book-keeping and auditing. And if Mr. Adams had read my letter of Apr. 21st carefully, he would have found there given the chapter and verse from his own remarks showing the 'deplorable' condition of affairs in the majority of these sub. companies. One of the auditors confessed like a man (see page 26, line 40-1914 report) that 'he knew as much about auditing as a fiddler knows about playing a piano, but he charged nothing and they were satisfied.'

Mr. Adams deserves some credit for trying, both last year and this to get some uniform system of book-keeping and auditing among these fruit companies, and he would probably welcome my little assistance if it were not so publicly given. In the meantime the fruit grower must join one of these 'deplorable' sub. concerns in order to partake of the benefits distributed by the impeccable 'Central.'

My purpose in attacking the U. F. Cos. as I have is simply to defend myself from their monopolistic tendencies and from their unwholesome campaign to shame all growers into the 'Union.' I do not wish to go in, I cannot afford to go in, and I object to being told that I should be ashamed of myself or that I am a traitor to the cause of my fellow fruit growers.

I know very little about the returns of the average grower in the Valley as a whole, and I suspect that Mr. Adams knows but little more than I. All I claim is that any man who sprays, picks, packs and ships his own fruit, giving his undivided personal attention to every part of the business, is in a position to do as well or even better than I, and that I have the Co-operative company out of sight. If a grower is not prepared either for good or bad reasons to do this, I advise him to join the U. F. Cos. at once.

All my account sales are on file and open to inspection. But in return I would expect the privilege of examining ALL the account sales of the U. F. Cos.

Mr. Adams asks if I am willing to produce account sales for six boxes, the worst of the year. Perhaps I should have said in my previous letter that I shipped only to the London market per Furness boats. Of the three Furness London boats mentioned I have account sales for two only, the third, the 'Sagamore,' sailing on Apr. 14th after my crop had all been shipped. (My luck again.)

I am more than willing to produce these account sales and herewith give the prices I obtained on these bad boats. 'Rappahannock,' (Oct. 11th), Gravenshain, no. 1, \$1.00; no. 2, 77. 'Start Point' (Jan. 22nd), Baldwin, no. 1, \$1.92; no. 2, \$1.68. (Co-op. average for whole season on Baldwin was only \$1.76 and \$1.58.)

I made a partial error in stating that the expenses of two organizations had to be deducted from the Co-op. prices I am sorry I made the mistake. It was not only an arithmetical but a strictly logical deduction. Their prices are published at various times months previous to the end of their business year; the number of barrels packed is unknown till the last apple has gone out; their total expenses can only be guessed at before May 31st; so it never occurred to me that as I know number of dollars could be divided by an unknown number of barrels and give a known number of cents per barrel. I accept Mr. Adams' claim that this has been accomplished at 'Central,' but as he takes good care to say nothing about the much higher charges of the Sub. Cos. I take it that the mathematics of these companies is still in a too 'deplorable' condition to grapple with a problem of this kind and that almost any old amount from four cents to forty may be safely deducted by the co-op. fruit grower from prices published before he begins to figure on the necessary business of life. I insist that the actual cost of handling a barrel of apples can never be properly reduced by such devices as rebates, appropriation of members' calls, or diversion of profits on other business conducted with members' capital or credit, etc.

There is room in the Valley for speculators, independent or co-operative. If the attempt of the U. F. Cos. to establish a monopoly should even partially succeed, it seems to me the net result could only be to close the road to the English market for

the independent grower and leave him with no alternative except to sell to a combine of speculators or submit his apples on faith to the judgment of a few possibly well meaning enthusiasts. In the broad generalization of Mr. Adams' closing paragraphs he is so at home that I hesitate to follow him and in reply would simply refer him to the very wide spread dissatisfaction among the Co-op fruit growers, always excepting of course the paid officials who, strange to say, do all the tooling for the company. Something is wrong somewhere. There

may be, and probably are, too many salaried positions but I do not wholly agree with the popular explanation that far too much is paid to salaries. If the work were well done the salaries are some of them not large enough. The troubles lie deeper. Some may be cured by the growth of a better spirit among the members. Other, and very serious difficulties are inherent in the business and the losses incurred thereby must be borne by the members in return for indirect consideration which may or may not appeal to me or to my neighbor.
