Warlike Europe.

The events transpiring in most of the European countries, at the present time, impress the public mind generally, with the notion that a great war is not unlikely to break out before long.

Any one who has for the past year or so, read the American newspapers, must have perceived that they interested themselves very much in Canadian politics.

Our Republican neighbors, as a rule, never lose sight of the dollar, and are not likely to advocate any cause unless they hope, sooner or later, to reap therefrom some pecuniary benefit.

Our contemporary was slightly at fault. "Leading Conservatives" all over the Dominion, knowing the popularity of Sir John Macdonald's Administration rallied to its support on election day, and are now not a little amazed at the piteous wail sent up by the Chronicle and its confederates over their disappointment.

The Boston Journal speaking of the elections cannot conceal its ill-natured disappointment at the results. It expresses itself in the following manner:

"The victory of the Macdonald or conservative party in the Dominion, though not a sweeping one, settles for the present quite a number of important issues in which our people are more or less interested."
