4. Transient matter must be prepaid or charged double postage, or two cents for every sheet.

6. Bills for newspapers, and receipts for payments of subscribers' papers; but nothing in or on writing or printing, inside a package, except the address, under penalty of paying letter postage.

7. Exchanges between newspaper publishers free.

8. Books, bound or unbound, of not more than four pounds each, one cent per ounce under three thousand miles, and two cents over that distance.

9. Under this new law, the International Journal will go free to any part of the State of New York; to any part of the State of Massachusetts for 13 cents—and to any part of the Union for 20 cents per annum—International Journal.
