



Tull Islands—Schooners have from 100 to 300 qts. Pack's Hr.—Very little doing. Long Island—Traps 50 to 100 qts. Grady—Traps 150 to 350 qts. Black Island—Traps 150 to 400 qts. Wolf Island—Nothing doing. Indian Tickle—Four crews here with catches of 250 qts. Others, no fish. Red Point—Traps 50 to 250 qts. Sand Banks—Six crews here with catches of from 300 to 400 qts. Domino—Traps 50 to 250 qts. Griffin's Hr.—Traps 150 to 400 qts. Black Tickle—Traps 60 to 150 qts. Sandy Islands—Traps 100 to 150 qts. Flat Islands—Fish just striking in; traps average 50 qts. Punch Bowl—Traps 50 to 100 qts. Webber's Cove—Traps 150 to 200 qts. Comfort Blight—Traps average 100 qts. Bolster's Rock—Traps 50 to 150 qts. Snug Hr.—A number of schooners here with catches of from 100 to 200 qts. Square Islands—No fish. Fishing Ship's Hr.—Traps 20 to 100 qts. Ship Hr.—Traps 20 to 50 qts. Battle Hr.—Fairly good work being done.

Portia's Fishery News.

By the Portia we learn that 16 vessels which were fishing in the Straits arrived at Bonne Bay, having done nothing. These vessels have gone north, beyond communication, and have not been heard of since they left. As regards the shore fishery, the voyage from Bonne Bay to Placentia is a remarkable failure. From Placentia here to St. John's, excepting Trepassay and the Southern Shore, for traps, the fishermen are well off and have an average voyage. There were eight or ten American vessels in Burgeo Saturday morning. Squid was very scarce and they picked up but slowly. There is only a small complement of squid to be had all along the coast down to Burin. These bait fishes are numerous in the water but will not jig. It is thought when the weather becomes unsettled that will be had in abundance.



Not having any notice of Cape Race's fog alarm being in position, the captain decided the horn he heard was that of Cape Race and after having run a reasonable time to the S. E. of it, he kept off E. N. E. down the Southern Shore. After running about six miles on that course he heard another whistle on his port bow and decided that it was another ship lying about in the fog. Feeling confident of his position he kept on a E. N. E. course when suddenly he found his ship in amongst the breakers. The order given from the bridge was hard a port; the ship answered the helm quickly but not swiftly enough to turn out clear of the "sunkers" close in at Cape Ballard. She ran up on the rocks forward and slid off again, and immediately the "torehole" was sounded and she was found to be making water quickly. Fifteen minutes later the captain, seeing that the ship was about to sink, lowered away his boats and abandoned her. The water-tight compartments forward bore the strain and kept the engine room dry for a considerable time. She then drifted slowly in Cape Mutton Bay and became a total wreck.

Cable News.

Special to The Evening Telegram: LONDON, Aug. 2. Head counting in the House of Lords over the Veto Bill has now been transferred to the Liberal side of the Chamber. Morley has written a letter to all Liberal Peers intimating that the Veto Bill will be again submitted to the Lords, probably during August. After referring to hostile intentions of the Halsburyites against the measure, he asks in view of this emergency whether he may count upon the attendance in the Chamber on Aug. 9th of each recipient. This move of Morley's is interpreted to mean that the Government is now confident of its ability to outvote the Halsburyites without the necessity of creating more Peers. It is estimated that sixty to seventy Liberals will respond to Morley's invitation to attend the session, while it is tolerably certain that Halsbury cannot muster forty votes. Further, it is still expected that several Unionist Peers will vote with the Government, although the bulk of them will follow Lansdowne's advice and abstain from voting at all. Under present circumstances, the question whether a divided union party will be able to close up its ranks becomes a subsidiary matter. The dinner given to Lord Standish was private. A feature of the function was the cordially displayed towards Mr. Balfour, who, contrary to expectation, did not allude to his speech on the constitutional crisis; whether anything of a conciliatory nature was achieved is not known.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, Aug. 2. Dock laborers, to the number of sixty thousand, went out on strike today. The seamen's strike, which was settled some time ago, convinced dockers that they could also obtain their demands by similar action. As a result strikes have occurred in various shipping ports in England and Wales. London has hitherto not been seriously affected, but the meat trade is seriously threatened now by the strike, and at least twenty steamers loaded with meat are unable to discharge. Police reserves were sent to the docks, but their services were not required. The men went quietly from steamer to steamer calling on their fellow workers to join the movement, and were successful in every case.

Special Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, Aug. 2. Combined in the same alliance that resulted in the passage of the compromise wool tariff revision bill in the Senate last week by the Democrats and Republican insurgents, that body has passed a farmer's free bill list. The compromise takes fresh meat products out of the free list, except such as come from countries that do not admit certain American farm products duty free.

Special to Evening Telegram. HALIFAX, Aug. 2. The condition of the cruiser Niobe at Charles Harbor is grave, in spite of all the pumps can do. Water is gaining and the Niobe is settling by the stern. Not more than two feet aft is visible above the surface. Arrangements are being made to beach the cruiser, if necessary. One of the holes, as a result of striking, is 25 by 10 feet.

Union Jack Banished.

CANADIAN NAVY WILL NOT FLY UNION JACK WHEN IT HAS CHARGE OF OUR WATERS—PART OF TEXT OF NAVAL AGREEMENT.

(1) The naval services and forces of the Dominion of Canada and Australia will be exclusively under the control of their respective governments.

(2) The training and discipline of the naval forces of the Dominion will be generally uniform with the training and discipline of the fleet of the United Kingdom, and by arrangement, officers and men of the said forces will be interchangeable with those under the control of the British Admiralty.

(3) The ships of each Dominion will be the symbol of the authority of the Crown, and at the jack staff the distinctive flag of the Dominion.

(4) The Canadian and Australian governments will have their own naval stations as agreed upon from time to time. The limits of the stations as considered desirable are set forth in schedule A for Canada, and in schedule B for Australia.

(5) The Canadian station will include the waters north of 30 degrees north latitude, and west of the meridian of the 40 degrees west longitude. The Canadian Pacific station will include the waters north of 20 degrees north latitude, and east of the meridian of 180 degrees longitude.

(6) In the event of the Canadian or Australian government desiring to send ships to a part of the British Empire outside of their own respective stations, they will notify the British Admiralty.

(7) In time of war, when the naval service of a Dominion, or any part thereof, has been put at the disposal of the Imperial Government by the Dominion authorities, the ships will form an integral part of the British fleet and will remain under the control of the British Admiralty during the continuance of the war.

(8) It will thus be seen that Newfoundland is within the Canadian Atlantic station, and that under clause V. the Canadian naval authorities can send their ships to Newfoundland without let or hindrance from the Admiralty and even without notifying them. Newfoundland will be under the EXCLUSIVE naval command of Canada.

Straits Complete Blank

The s.s. Diana arrived here at 5 a.m. yesterday from the Straits of Belle Isle. She brought along 170 men and 14 women from Blanc Sablon, Greenly Island, Forteau and other fishing stations, including Lance au Loup. The fishery is a total failure all along the Straits, and out of 17 traps at Blanc Sablon and Greenly Island there are only 20 qtls. of fish ashore. Trawlers have an average of 25 qtls. per boat ashore. The total catch for Job Bros. 300 fishery in the Straits is 2,000 qtls. The Diana landed men coming this way at Trinity, Hant's Harbor, Carbonear and other places. Penny's crew of 30 men were landed at the latter places. Two hundred sail of schooners, which were fishing in the Straits, have gone north to Labrador. These vessels have absolutely no fish, with the exception of four schooners, who have about 200 qtls. each. At Flower's Cove, Anchor Point and Ferrole, traps have from 2 to 3 qtls. It is the worst season in the Straits for a number of years.

The Coronation Regatta

A Grand Success—Beautiful Weather Prevails, Thousands of People Present and the Programme Goes Off Without a Hitch.

Had the energetic committee which supervised yesterday's Coronation Regatta ordered the weather to suit they could not have a more pleasant day.

Since the inception of our great aquatic derbies no better races has been held and everything conducive to make it the success it was. Hon. John Harvey and the energetic committee which had charge of the Regatta this year deserve the encomiums which were lavished upon them. The day was exceptionally fine with a nice breeze blowing up the Lake making it very pleasant for the competitors as well as the thousands of spectators who assembled on the slopes of our splendid lake. By noon it was estimated that about 10,000 persons were assembled on the green. The spectacle presented to them was a very pleasing one indeed. On the north side of the pond there was a line of tents built to accommodate the public, and from them banking was down, while at the head of the lake there were a number of tents above which flags flew in the breeze; swinging boats were in evidence; the dancing galleries were well patronized, and away over on the south side of the lake tents dotted the landscape with placidness in all directions and a happy lot of them were tucked in the regatta on that side of the lake. One thing must have impressed the great number of people present and that was the orderliness of the crowd; a

few, and a very few, had a "wee drop in their ven" as Burns would say, but there was no disorder, not an angry word was spoken, and the people who went there to enjoy themselves did so to their hearts content. We congratulate Hon. John Harvey and the energetic committee with him for affording the public such a splendid holiday. There is much work connected with such an undertaking, but the committee were equal to it and acquitted themselves admirably.

During the day the Lake was visited by His Excellency Sir Wm. Howard, His Grace Archbishop Howley, Hon. E. R. Dowling and D. Morrison, Mr. H. D. Reid and other distinguished people. The Premier was the guest of the committee during the day.

The different events on the programme were keenly contested, some very pretty races occurred and the "dash horns" upheld their traditions as usual. The races were run in the following order:

AMATEURS.

In this race only two boats entered, the Guard and Peter. When the starting gun fired the two boats made the lake neck and neck, and after getting a little below the committee tent the Guard led, but soon the Peter overhauled her and reached and turned the buoy several lengths ahead; she came home in capital style and finished fully 6 boat lengths ahead of the Guard. Time, 10 mins. 20 sec.

PIERS.

The next on the programme was the Press Race in which the Peter (Chronicle), Lion (News), Herald (Guard), and Pink Un (Mixed), took part. From the start the Herald men who rowed a splendid stroke kept the lead and were at the buoy first, received a fine turn and came up the Lake in splendid style, and won several lengths ahead of the Chronicle, the next crew, with the Red Lion and Pink Un following. Time, 10 mins. 44 2-5 sec.

TRADERS.

This was an exceptionally pretty race in which the Guard, Peter, Lion and Pink Un ran. Going down the Lake the Pink Un led and held it to below Reid's boat house when the Red Lion spurred and reached the buoy first and received a good turn and came up the pond well ahead of her competitors, with the Pink Un second and the Peter and Guard in the order named. Time, 10 mins. 15 sec.

MERCANTILE.

In this race four boats entered, the Lion (Arts & Sons), Guard, Marshall Bros., Blue Peter (Harvey & Co.), and Pink Un (Job Bros.). Harvey & Co.'s men were the favourites at the sound of the gun the four boats set away together, and passing the committee tent the Pink Un and Peter were first and neck, with the Lion third and Guard last. The Peter "jawed" for her buoy first fully 7 lengths ahead of her competitors, and came home in splendid shape and in well ahead of the Pink Un, with the Lion third and Guard last. Time, 10 mins. 21 2-5 sec.

SOCIETIES.

In this race the Lion (S. O. E.), Peter (St. Mary's), Guard (S. U. F.), competed. The boats made a nice run down the Lake, and at the start the Guard led slightly and the race going down was an exciting one. Just below Coaker's River the Guard spurred and ran ahead; she was at the buoy first with the Peter second and Lion third. Coming back the Guard did fine and Coaker's River she was three lengths ahead of the others and she kept increasing her lead and was fully six lengths ahead of the Peter when the gun fired, with

BRIGADES.

This was the race on which all eyes were centered, and it is safe to say that the boat was made on it that any other race for the day. The boats got away—the C. L. B. in the Blue Peter, Highlanders in the Red Lion, C. C. C. in the Pink Un and M. G. B. in the Guard. The boats made a very nice start, but just before the committee tent was reached the stroke of the C. C. C. lost the catch of his pole pins, and in hammering it down the boat fell behind, as by actual count 12 strokes were lost. There is no doubt about the Pink Un, but for this would have made a good fight for second and third, but her crew need not feel ashamed of their work. The Guards had a splendid crew and they proved their mettle. With a pretty swinging stroke they went down the pond, took the lead from the start and got to the buoy in an excellent style. The C. L. B. was closely followed by the C. C. C. and the Red Lion last. The Guards increased their lead as they came up the pond and finished fully 10 lengths ahead of the C. L. B. who were next, with the Cadets a close third and the Highlanders last. Time, 10 mins. 19 sec.

SWIMMING RACE.

The swimming race was divided into two sections, the open race being first and the Inter-Brigade next. In the first or open race ten contestants dived from the platform at the City Club boat house and made a nice race of it coming across followed by a flotilla of boats. In good style M. Kelly came first, G. Roberts, second, J. Mullooney, third, T. Morgan, fourth and James Brown, fifth. Wm. Clancey became exhausted and was taken in a boat before he could finish.

INTER-BRIGADE.

In the Inter-Brigade race the four City Brigades entered and quite a number competed. The boys made a spirited race of it coming across the pond, and Chesley Martin, of the C. L. B. and son of Mr. Albert Martin did excellently, led from the start and won hands down, followed by C. Grace, of the C. C. C. son of Mr. J. Grace, of the Municipal Council, with John Dunphy, of the C. C. C., third.

INTERVAL.

The interval was then announced and the committee were regaled with a luncheon in Mr. J. Ross's best style. After that the programme was continued and the next race was the FISHERMEN'S.

Two crews of Outer Cove men rowed in the Peter and Pink Un, respectively, and a crew of Torbay men in the Guard. The Torbay men had it all their own way, and the two Outer Cove crews went down to square defeat at their hands. The Guard led from the start and was an easy first to the buoy, and finished almost half the pond ahead of the Peter, with the Pink Un third. Time, 9 mins. 16 sec.

LABOURERS.

The Lion, Guard and Pink Un contested in this race which from start to finish was very close and keenly contested. The Peter and Guard were neck and neck almost up and down the pond but the Peter led on the last stretch until a few boats lengths from the winning post when the Guard spurred and she shot in about two feet ahead of the Peter. Time, 10 mins. 20 sec.

FOOTBALL.

The C. E. I. Star, B. I. S. and Collegian teams ran this race. The boats were: C. E. I. (Pink Un), B. I. S. (Blue Peter), Star (Red Lion) and Collegian (Guard). From start to finish it was a close race between the Guard and Pink Un, and the latter won with the Guard a close second. Peter, third. Time, 10 mins. 37 1-5 sec.

JUVENILE.

In this race the Guard, Pink Un, Lion and Peter, and from the start the Peter led, being first to the buoy, and well ahead of the others coming up the Lake. She finished in good style, with the Guard second, Lion, third and Pink Un last. Time, 11 mins. 21 2-5 sec.

TRUCKMEN.

Only the Peter and Pink Un ran in this race, and going down the pond the boats made a nice race of it, but the Peter reached the buoy first and led and kept her lead coming home, winning by over two boat lengths. Time, 10 mins. 38 1-5 sec.

FACTORIES.

The Peter, Lion and Guard went in this race, and going and coming the three boats closely pressed each other. The Guard coming up pushed herself to the front and reached the winning post first with the Peter a close second and Lion third. Time, 10 mins. 43 1-5 sec.

NAVAL-BRIGADES.

In this the last event on the programme, the Naval men in the Guard, and the C. C. C. in the Peter, competed. It was a pity that the C. L. B. and Highlanders did not show up. The boats made a pretty race of it and the C. C. C. made a plucky start, but the Guard came in first. Time, 10 mins. 42 sec.

The Association is undertaking a campaign throughout the country for the distribution of literature and the holding of meetings, especially announcements of the British Empire who have a special interest in defeating the intention of Americans."


