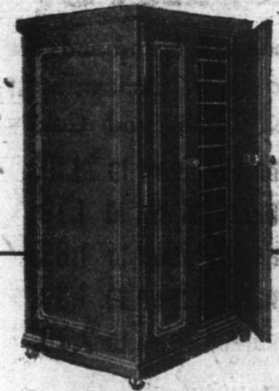

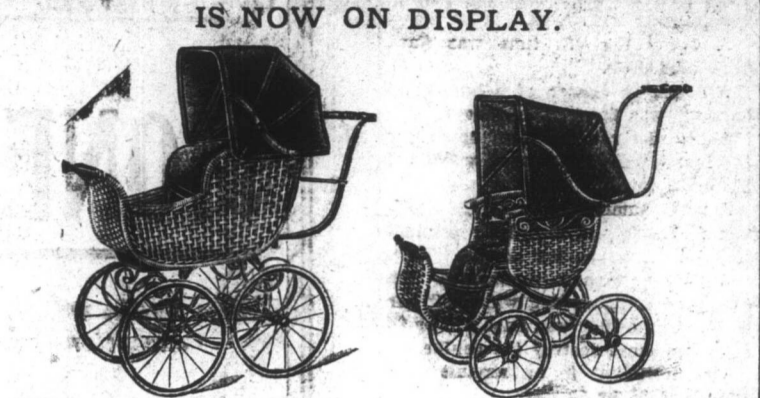

Morley has written a letter to all Liberal Peers intimating that the Veto Bill will be again submitted to the Lords, probably during August.

Union Jack Banished.

CANADIAN NAVY WILL NOT FLY UNION JACK WHEN IT HAS CHARGE OF OUR WATERS—PART OF TEXT OF NAVAL AGREEMENT.

(1) The naval services and forces of the Dominion of Canada and Australia will be exclusively under the control of their respective governments.

(2) The training and discipline of the naval forces of the Dominion will be generally uniform with the training and discipline of the fleet of the United Kingdom, and by arrangement, officers and men of the said forces will be interchangeable with those under the control of the British Admiralty.

(3) The ships of each Dominion will have their own distinctive flag of the Dominion.

(4) The Canadian and Australian governments will have their own naval stations as agreed upon from time to time. The limits of the stations as considered desirable are set forth in schedule A for Canada, and in schedule B for Australia.

(5) In the event of the Canadian or Australian government desiring to send ships to a part of the British Empire outside of their own respective stations, they will notify the British Admiralty.

(6) In time of war, when the naval service of a Dominion, or any part thereof, has been put at the disposal of the Imperial Government by the Dominion authorities, the ships will form an integral part of the British fleet and will remain under the control of the British Admiralty during the continuance of the war.

(7) It will thus be seen that Newfoundland is within the Canadian Atlantic station, and that under clause V. of the Canadian naval agreement can send their ships to Newfoundland without let or hindrance from the Admiralty and even without notifying them. Newfoundland will be under the EXCLUSIVE naval command of Canada.

We are awaiting an explanation from the Premier, Sir Edward Morris. No explanation appeared in the Daily News this morning.

The Stephano Here.

The S. S. Stephano, Capt. Clarke, arrived here at 8 a.m. to-day from New York and Halifax. She left the former port Saturday last at 11 a.m. and arrived at Halifax at 8 a.m. Monday. She had some fog on the run but not much. She left again at 3 p.m. Tuesday and had good weather down. She has a half cargo and 168 round trip passengers with 37 in second class. The ship sails Saturday afternoon.

Died on Labrador.

Mr. S. Goose, a Spaniard's Bay planter, who had gone to Horse Harbor, Labrador, in June, with his crew to carry on the fishery there, dropped dead as soon as he landed there. His wife, who knew nothing about this, went north the last trip of the Solway to join him. She received a terrible shock on landing at Horse Harbor. The body was brought home by the Solway and landed at Harbor Grace.

WRECKED CREW BROUGHT UP.

The wrecked crew of the schooner, Beacon Light, of Westleyville, were brought up by the Solway from Labrador and boarded the Dundee at Trinity to be taken to their homes. The Beacon Light was lost while heading into Independent Har. She mis-stayed and fell on a rock. All the gear was saved.

Melting Out Justice.

Reporter Gets an "Exclusive."

Mr. Leo Murphy, of the Chronicle, who was on a visit to Bell Island last Monday, fell into a pit 11 feet deep at the Wabana Mine. It was pitchy dark and he did not see the danger. Messrs. C. F. Taylor, Joseph Greene and W. Cole heard his moans and lowering themselves into the pit found Mr. Murphy unconscious. He did not recover till a doctor had worked over him for half an hour. 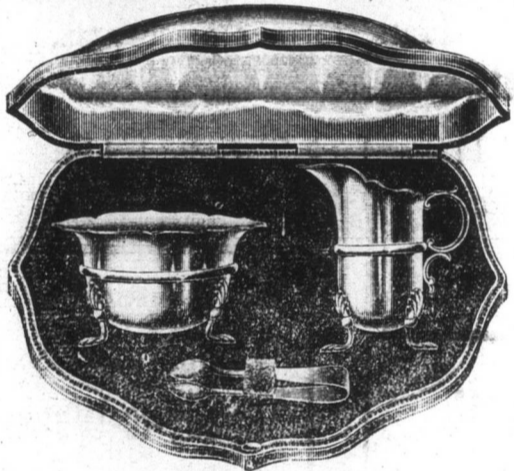
