



Dr. Hjort Lectures.

Dr. Johan Hjort, Chairman of the Norwegian Fisheries Commission, lectured at the Grenfell Hall last night on "Scientific Investigation of lands, B.B.; Frederick Perry, Goosethe Fisheries of Norway" to a small berry Island, B.B.; Walter G. Critch, out appreciative audience.

Mr. A. W. Piccott, Minister of Marine and Fisheries occupied the chair gate; Auguste Frow, St. George's; and introduced the lecturer. Among those present were Rt. Hon. the Premier, Hons. John Harvey, W. C. Job and M. G. Winter, Messrs. R. J. Devereaux, M. H. A., W. B. Grieve, G. C. Fearn and other prominent citi-

an interesting manner, and held the closest attention of his audience for upwards of two hours. He referred to the progress in the fisheries, due to scientific investigation, and cited as an example the introducton of small steamers to replace the old time fishing boats. On the Michael Sars, the work of investigation is practical and thorough. The development of a fish is closely studied, as well as its distribution in different parts of the ocean. In the examination of the spawning grounds of several species much valuable knowledge was gained. The migration of the codfish was learned by the marking of fish, and it has been found that such migrations covered hundreds of miles.

The investigations have been so thorough that now it is possible to tell the age of a fish and the section which it was caught. Many theories rave been advanced as to the fluctations in the catches of herring and cod from year to year, but the principal one is that the catch is regulated by the abundance or scarcity of the food on which these fishes exist. The discourse was illustrated with lantern slides, and was very inter-

Oporto Market Well Supplied.

The Board of Trade have been informed by Messrs. Lind & Coutu, of Oporto, as follows:— "The war has a very disturbing effect upon the market, and neither retailers nor consumers are buying more than their requirements from day to day. Prices are too high, and will have to be reduced to encourage consumption. We estimate the present stocks at about 18,500 cwt. of British and 13,000 cwt. of Norwegian. There are several cargoes on the passage from Newfoundland, and a steamer from Norway due to arrive this week is reported to have about 14,000 cwt. for this market. We are thus faced with a very heavy accumulation of fish and no means of getting it into consumption, except at the rate of perhaps about 3,500 cwt. per week. On top of this we shall now have the Portuguese catch arriving. We have no reports at present as to how the no reports at present as to how the vessels have done. Exchange is qued at from 38%d. to 40 1-8d. norm but the supply of bills is very lim ed and it is very difficult to buy, except in small amounts. 


