



The Council of Higher Education has done good work in standarizing Education, and the uplift both in the City and Outports has been very mark-

been growing that further advance was necessary, and the Superintend-ants of Education have been giving their attention to the matter.

Last year the people of St. John's became enthused, and large sums of money were raised by the Methodist, Church of England and Presbyterian

Denominations, for College Extension, Elementary Schools, and provision for the Outperts pupils coming to St. As the matter was more closely As the matter was more closely studied, it was found that quite a number of children in St. John's were not going to any school at all; also that the elementary school buildings were not adequate in accommodation for the children who were eligible, nor in satisfactory condition for the proper carrying on of the work. There was general lack of equipment both in the elementary schools and in the col-

elementary schools and in the col-No denomination seems to be able to provide a properly equipped Laboratory for the teaching of Chemistry and Physics; there is no properly equipped department for Commercial

Training nor for Manual Training.

As the revelation of these conditions came to the Educational workers in St. John's it was borne in upon them that the practical and effective solution lay in the amalgamation of the Educational interests of the City, and that, if our Roman Catholic friends could not enter such amalgamation, it should be possible to have united ef-fort by the Protestant denominations in the City at least.

Resolutions looking to such policy were passed by the persons engaged in the Educational Campaign of last summer, and, during the wintermonths, a committee consisting of representatives of the Methodist, Church of England, Presbyterian, Congregational, and Salvation Army bodies has been meeting in order to see whether been meeting in order to see whether there could not be evolved a practical scheme for the City of St. John's that would unite the Protestant Educational interests, and provide better ele-mentary school bulldings, accommod-ation for all Protestant children in St. John's, extension of colleges, and provision for proper departments of Science, Commercial Training, Man-

Science, Commercial Training, Man-ual Training, Art and Music, etc.
This committee has given close con-sideration to the various points, and the members were delighted that they found great unanimity in dealing with the various phases of this question.
They were assisted by a visit of two Educational experts from Columbia University who confirmed the findings of the committee and outlined an ambitious scheme for the future of Education in St. John's.

The question was debated at the Methodist Conference in June last, and by a unanimous vote the Conference stated their willingness to unite in the proposed amalgamation for St. John's. An approach will be made to the other bodies and it is hoped that they will give favourable consideration to this matter which is so important.—

The reluctance to contemplate entering upon a new Crimean War without the most adequate provocation, which is to be found in every social, commercial, and laboring circle here. is to be noted in what may be termed the proletarian portion of the French colony in London There has been opportunity for talk with various representatives of this class, and they were unanimous in opposition to a conflict. I was quite prepared to hear you criticise my conduct in every way as a Minister of the Crown, and in connection with the operation of the regulations, and nothing that you have said has occasioned me the slightest resentment. We shall part I think fairly good friends. I thank you for being so candid as to express just what you have felt. It has helped matters along considerably. I trust now that there shall be only one ending to our conference—success which will mean prosperity for fishermen, for ex-

porters and country.

The Importation of Flour,

The Newfoundland Food Control Board announce that as the agreement made with the Canadian Wheat Board expired on August 31st, at which date also the Canadian Wheat Board went out of existence, PERMITS TO IMPORT FLOUR FROM ANY COUNTRY ARE NO LONGER NECESSARY.

The public may be interested in knowing that during the period of this agreement (January to August, 1920,) between the Food Control Board and the Canadian Wheat Board, Newfoundland shared with Canada and the West Indies the fortunate position in which she was getting all her flour fully \$1.50 (one dollar and a half) per barrel cheaper than the United States or any other part of the World, making quite a large save to our people.

The agreement referred to above gave Newfoundland the privilege of importing White Flour (while Canada was using flour not so white), gave Newfoundland assurance of full supplies, and rescinded the tax of two dollars which had been placed on Flour exported from

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
