Briand Abandons the Attempt to Form a Ministry.

France Faces Worst Crisis in the History of the Republic--High Commissioner of Australia Condemns the Dole System--U. S. Polar Expedition Leaves in June.

THE DOLE CRITICIZED. LONDON, April 14. A sweeping condemnation of the dole that is being given to the unemployed in this country, was made by Joseph Cook, Australian High Commissioner in London, at a concert given by the Institute of Handicraft Workers in Brighton yesterday. Sir Joseph spoke of the pernicious and degrading effects of the dole which was having the worst of the nation, and degrading the people with the grave handicap of pauper migration. The best man in the world, he contended, will not work while they can sit on the dole and be wonderfully well for themselves.

MINIMUM WAGE IMPOSSIBLE. LONDON, April 14. A notable feature of the Independent Labor Party's Convention at Manchester was the frank admission by A. Salter, Labor M.P., for West Lancashire, that the payment of a minimum wage was impossible in many industries. He cited as example that in the minimum of four pounds a week workers would involve a yearly loss of £20,000,000 to £40,000,000.

FRANCE FACES A CRISIS. PARIS, April 14. France is in the throes of one of the worst crises in the history of the republic, politically, economically and socially. There is a widely divergent current of opinion between the Chamber and the Senate and it now has become open conflict. This involves all the present difficulties. The resolution of parliament, which a few days ago was mentioned only in a whisper as the rallying cry of all the discontented and is being openly displayed in the lobbies of Chamber and Senate.

BRITISH ARCHITECT HONORED. NEW YORK, April 14. The gold medal of the American Institute of Architects, awarded for conspicuous merit only six times in the last nineteen years, will be given to Sir Edwin Landseer Lutyens, British architect, as a feature of the convention of the American Institute of Architects and Architectural and Allied Arts Exposition both of which are here Monday. It was Sir Edwin who designed the famous Queen's House, the miniature palace situated in Queen Mary of England. He has designed many buildings in his country.

HUSBAND MURDERS HIS SUCCESSOR. TACOMA, April 14. Two men are dead, and two children following a shooting spree here when a divorced husband shot the home of his former wife.

The new company, besides building ten new ships, would take over ten merchant marine vessels for £400,000 payable in shares in the new company. According to McLeod's scheme, the steamers would run regularly from the Pacific Coast ports of Vancouver and Prince Rupert to the United Kingdom and Continent of Europe, and when necessary would call at United States ports.

HURON VALLEY FLOODED. DETROIT, Mich., April 14. Scores of families in the valley of the Huron River, between Flat Rock and Lake Erie, were driven from their homes early today when a dam at the lower power plant of the Ford Motor Company, at Flat Rock, burst, and released millions of gallons of water into the valley. No lives have been lost so far as could be learned, although many houses built below the level of the dam were inundated.

MACMILLAN HAS BIG PROGRAMME. WASHINGTON, D.C., April 14. Under the final programme approved to-day, the MacMillan Arctic expedition will undertake exploration of several millions of square miles of territory, believed to have been hitherto unknown to civilization. In addition to this vast territory between Alaska and the North Pole, the expedition will cover the central portions of Ellesmere Island, Grant Land, Great Greenland, Ice Cape, the entire interior of Baffin Island, and the northern Labrador. Commander Donald B. MacMillan announced a base would be established at Etah, about 700 miles from the Pole, from which flights would radiate over an immense field selected for exploration. The expedition proposes making a start from Wiscasset, Maine, about June 27.

WINDSTORM DAMAGES. INDIANAPOLIS, Minn., April 14. A windstorm that almost attained the destructive proportions of a tornado hopped about over Indianapolis last night, leaving in its wake damaged homes, uprooted trees and levelled power and communication lines. No fatalities or serious injuries were reported, but material damage will aggregate thousands of dollars.

C. N. R. STATEMENT. OTTAWA, April 14. Taking fixed charges into account, the Canadian National Railways last year had a deficit of \$51,869,419. The deficit in 1923 was \$64,697,674. These results are shown in the annual report of the Canadian National Railways tabled in the House at six o'clock. The report shows in spite of a decrease in gross earnings of \$17,547,305, due to smaller crop and general business conditions throughout the country, the company was successful in earning a net operating profit of \$17,244,251, or \$3,176,397 less than in the preceding year and therefore maintained "to a very considerable degree the rate of improvement during 1923, which was a phenomenal year in many respects from a transportation standpoint." A feature of the report is the item which shows that operating expenses were reduced by \$14,350,907.



BRIAND FAILS. PARIS, April 14. Ex-Premier Briand, shortly after 6 o'clock this evening, definitely decided to abandon the attempt to form a Cabinet in succession to the Herriot ministry.

RUM RUNNER CAPTURED AFTER 150 MILE CHASE. NEW YORK, April 14. The capture of the three-masted auxiliary British schooner, Madeline Adams, yesterday, by the coastguard cutter Seminoles, after a chase of 150 miles off the New York coast, was reported to-day when the schooner was brought into port with its crew of 9 men, as prisoners, and its liquor cargo valued at \$50,000 under seizure.

MACLEOD'S SCHEME. LONDON, April 14. Donald MacLeod's scheme in connection with his offer to the Canadian Government to establish a ten steamer line service for a subsidy of £100,000 lower than that the Dominion Government proposed to pay Sir Wm. Peterman for a steamship service between Great Britain and Canada, the Canadian Press learns, provides for the establishment of a new company to be called the Canadian Transports Limited.



Tuning the Primary EDITED BY JOHN M. CLAYTON. If you have a tuning unit in which the number of turns in the primary, or antenna, coil are fixed, or in which the coupling between the primary and secondary is not variable, we are going to tell you a very simple way to increase the signal strength and selectivity of your receiver fully 50 per cent. The fixed number of turns in the primary coil with the antenna have a certain natural wavelength. This is the coil is so designed that it will really be in tune with an incoming signal at only one wavelength. At all other wavelengths the primary coil and the secondary are not in tune and signals are forced through from the primary to the secondary by virtue of the close coupling between the two coils. On some wavelengths ample coupling is provided, but the further we go away from the natural wavelength of the antenna-primary coil circuit the worse becomes the coupling factor between the primary and secondary. True we are adding another control to the receiver. However, it is perfectly possible to disregard the additional control and get the same results that you are now getting, and use the added control after the station you want has been tuned in. The diagram is shown above. This is nothing but a loading coil plus series condenser arrangement where by the antenna circuit is brought in tune with the incoming signal. The diagram is self-explanatory. If you desire to arrange two switches and sets of switch-taps whereby single turn variation of the loading coil can be secured, the series .0005 Mfd. variable condenser is not necessary. However, without the variable condenser the tuning is a bit difficult and the results may not be the same.

Magistrates Court

A married woman of the West End, who is well known in police circles, having served several terms in the penitentiary, for various offences, was arrested yesterday at the instance of a city mechanic, and appeared before court this morning charged with stealing a purse from his pocket on Monday night...

It is anticipated, however, that Central Leather will show a profit for the first quarter against a deficit after interest charges of \$369,617 in the first quarter of 1924. Prices of leather have remained very firm, with no indication of recession, following the 25 per cent to 30 per cent appreciation from the lows of last year. This is permitting the company to show some profit.

That leather consumption continues to exceed production is indicated by steady decline in stocks on hand over the country. In February, the latest month available, there was another reduction of 110,000 pieces of sole leather, bringing stocks on hand down to about 5,000,000 pieces, which contrasts with approximately 8,300,000 at the end of February, 1924. This is a decrease of 3,300,000 pieces, or 39.7 per cent in a year. There has been a steady decline from month to month, as a result of curtailment of production by tanners. In conjunction with the firmness in hide prices this is an explanation of the strength in leather.

That the shoe industry, on which consumption of leather is largely dependent, has maintained a very fair pace is indicated by the fact that output of the factories in February was 26,906,000 pairs comparing with 26,275,000 pairs in January and 26,831,000 pairs in February, 1924. Certain of the large companies have been remarkably busy during the entire first quarter. The expectation has been that 1925 would be likely to show an increase in shoe production over 1924, which year witnessed a decline in output of about 10.7 per cent compared with 1923.

A resident of Manuel's who was held on remand about a week ago, charged with stealing a sum of money from the store of J. R. Martin, at Manuel's on April 5th, came up before court this morning, and upon being convicted was sentenced to six months imprisonment. According to the evidence submitted the accused was a bosom friend of Martin, and visited his home on the day of the larceny and partook of tea with his family. The Martin family left the house that evening to attend church, while the accused went off in another direction. In the meantime Martin was very suspicious of his friend, and left Const. Efford in hiding in the shop, which he had just entered. Upon his return he found the man had entered the shop by a false key, and was caught red handed by the constable at the cash drawer from which he had taken \$2.45, and placed in one of his long rubber boots. The officer waited his chance and flashed a light upon him, and quickly handcuffing the man, placed him under arrest. The accused was convicted of larceny in 1914, and upon being convicted was let go with a light fine. In this case he had nothing to say. A man given in charge by his wife for being drunk and disorderly in his home was ordered to sign bonds to keep the peace.

Well Meaning Slanderers

Now and then articles published abroad by strangers tend to give a false impression of Newfoundland. If they are of a humorous and harmless nature, we are ready to join in the laughter; if they are vindictive, we can generally afford to disregard them, but when they are written in ignorance, however well meaning, they call as far as possible for correction.

REV. H. MacDERMOTT.

"Who is he? Ask anyone who knows anything about the outports of Newfoundland and you will immediately receive the reply, 'Why it's Mr. Mac.' 'Mr. Mac' is the only minister along 120 miles of rugged coastline in Newfoundland. He is a doctor, too, and a magistrate, and a road maker, and—well, the adviser and friend of everybody. The people in the outports are all simple fisherfolk. The men go off to the Grand Banks two or three hundred miles away for the deep sea fishing. They are hardy men to whom the intricacies of our modern civilization are unknown, but they understand the simple Gospel as revealed in the self-sacrificing service of a brother man, and therefore they understand MacDermott for he meets them on their own ground."

The above, taken from a pamphlet issued by a certain Colonial and Continental Association in Sheffield, may be excellent propaganda in the cause in which it is used, but as a distortion of facts, as a reflexion on the self-sacrificing work of the other clergy and doctors in Fortune Bay, and as an unfaithful representation of the conditions which exist in our outports, it merits the strongest censure and entitles us to ask if steps cannot be taken to put an end to the circulation of such highly coloured effusions which discredit us abroad.

Not for a moment do we imagine that the gentleman referred to has wittingly been responsible for the statements made. It would be unlike Dr. MacDermott, who, so far as we know him, is anxious to do his best in his particular field, and would not desire to belittle the work of others in his profession, to exaggerate the hardships that he undergoes, or to classify the people of Fortune Bay as ignorant and unsophisticated.

There was a time when such methods were used to stir up interest in the mission field, but long ago it was discovered that they worked more harm than good, and whereas in the earlier days there might have been some grounds for referring to the backward condition of the country in such terms, they by no means apply to-day. Hardship there is, certainly, and here as elsewhere there is much to be done for the uplift of the people, but the devoted missionary is inclined to make light of his experiences, and is too deeply interested in his work to spend much time in elaborating upon it.

Ominous Signs in Europe

Is the stage being set for another war? Warnings have been issued from various quarters that another outbreak is imminent. Germany has been shown to be making preparations to meet, or perhaps to precipitate such an event, and Hindenburg is a candidate in the Presidential elections. The dispatches to-day announce that the political situation in France has developed into one of the most serious crises in her history. Recently it was suggested that the Hungarian regime was working to restore the Hapsburg dynasty and the Empire of Austria Hungary, with a view eventually of forming an alliance with Germany. In Russia, in order to inflame the minds of the people or to detract their attention from the blunders of their rulers, reports have been circulated that the other powers are preparing to attack her.

In the messages received this morning is an account of an attempt on the life of King Boris of Bulgaria, the killing of two of his attendants, and the murder in Sofia of one of the generals who was closely identified with the overthrow of the Peasant Dictatorship under the control of Stambulsky in June, 1923. This incident vividly recalls the event that occurred at Sarajevo on June 28th, 1914, when a Serbian student assassinated the Archduke Francis Ferdinand, heir to the Austro-Hungarian Crown, and his wife Sophie, Duchess of Hohenberg, and thereby precipitated the war which involved all the great nations and not a few of the lesser powers.

If matters are as serious as they appear to be, how will such a catastrophe be averted and by whom? Undoubtedly in Britain and her Dominions and in America any attempt to renew hostilities in Europe would meet with universal disapproval, and the united decision to prevent it at any price would do more to have a sobering effect than anything else. To conduct a war money and supplies are essential. To-day most of the European countries are in straitened circumstances, and it is unlikely that either of those powers which could, and formerly did replenish their depleted resources would be willing to lend any assistance to such a purpose.

S.S. Ranger Seventh Arrival

S.S. Ranger, Capt. Wesley Kean, arrived from the icefields at 8 o'clock last night, with a catch of 6,000 young and old seals. The Ranger like the other ships got jammed up early in the season, and even after getting clear very little could be done with seals owing to continuous fog and bad ice conditions. While the ship was working the old seals engine trouble arose and she was forced to put into Grosa Islands, for repairs, and after making a second attempt further trouble developed, when she was compelled to abandon the voyage and harbor at Conche. After temporary repairs had been effected at the latter place, the run was made to port with stops at Twilligate and Pool's Island. Capt. Kean and crew are in good health after the trip.

Attempted Assassination of King Boris.

A General and Two Attendants Killed.

SOFFIA, April 14. King Boris of Bulgaria, had a narrow escape from death to-day at the hands of alleged Communists, while General Gheorghiu, one of the leaders in the movement which overthrew the Stambouly Government in 1923, was killed in the streets of Sofia. The King's automobile, which was travelling in the direction of the capital ran into an ambush of Communists who fired upon him. The King was not hurt but two of his attendants are reported to have been killed and the chauffeur wounded. One of the slain men was a young nationalist, Hicoff. Almost immediately after the attack the assassins fled. Troops went in pursuit and searched the entire district, but without success.

44 BEER FOR ONTARIO. TORONTO, April 14. The date upon which 4.4 per cent. beer may be legally sold in Ontario has not yet been fixed. The Bill may be brought into effect any time by Proclamation.

REVOLUTION FRUSTRATED IN COLUMBIA.

BOGOTA, Columbia, April 15. A coup d'etat was frustrated Sunday when a group of army officers who planned to take possession of the palace and government were arrested and thrown into prison. The conspirators purposed to take advantage of the absence of President Nolaspin from the capital. The President had been on a visit to the various departments of the Republic, but he suddenly returned Sunday and the arrest of several army officers and some government officials at the capital followed. The cause of the fire is unknown.

EARL BALFOUR ON HIS WAY HOME.

ALEXANDRIA, Egypt, April 15. The Earl of Balfour embarked on his way home to England, having arrived here from Syria, where his presence in Damascus last week resulted in a violent demonstration by the Arab population which disapproved of his work in aiding the establishment of the Jewish National Home in Palestine.

C. P. R. VESSEL BURNED AT LIVERPOOL DOCKS.

LIVERPOOL, April 15. Fire broke out at 7 o'clock this morning on the Canadian Pacific steamer Gentaufier, which has just completed repairs at the dock at Birkenhead across the Mersey opposite Liverpool. By noon the whole forepart of the vessel was reported to be destroyed with the fire still under control. Dense clouds of smoke hampered the fire-fighters. From the decks of the steamer Inca at a neighbouring dock the firemen poured great streams of water on the white hot plates of the burning liner, but they made little impression. The cabins and gangways are choked with debris while smoke and gas filled the passages and prevented the entry of the firemen with fire fighting apparatus. The cause of the fire is unknown.

The Potential Wealth of the Labrador.

Sir Patrick McGrath's Address Before the Rotary Club and the Holy Cross Institute.

Mr. Chairman.—As certain features of the Labrador Boundary dispute have already been discussed, here and elsewhere, at some length recently, I decided to deal with some of the developments in connection with it, which bear on a possible settlement.

The late Lord Salisbury, British Premier for many years, once said that "the secret of proportion in judging international controversies lay in the use of large maps." I think this is a sound saying, so I am using to-day some large maps to give you an idea of the territory in question, and the issues involved.

The first map, which I now display, (exhibiting it) is a reprint by the Hudson's Bay Company of an official map, on which the Company gives its various establishments and managerial districts. I use it, first to show the relative size of the Labrador Peninsula to the rest of British North America, the whole of which can be seen, and secondly, to enable you to realize the extent of the region itself.

Labrador's area is about 511,000 square miles, or say one-seventh of that of British North America. Labrador of the geographers, is the area north of the black line I have drawn on this map. The Encyclopedia Britannica describes it as that portion of the mainland, north of a line drawn from the S.E. corner of Hudson's Bay, near 51° N. (say Rupert House), to the mouth of the Noisier River on the north shore of the St. Lawrence (near Seven Islands). Its area is about twelve times that of Newfoundland, and its population about 10,000 to 12,000.

From Seven Islands eastward along the coast of Blanc Sablon, which we know as Canadian Labrador, are about 4,000 souls. From Blanc Sablon north to Cape Chidley our territory, are about 3,800 according to the last census, about 800 being Eskimos under the Moravian Missionaries. From Cape Chidley along the shores of Ungava Bay and Hudson Strait, and down the East coast of Hudson Bay, the population is entirely Eskimo, probably not exceeding 2,000, while in the interior are wandering tribes of Mountain and Nascoptic Indians whose numbers can be counted in hundreds. The only white inhabitants of the latter section are the officials—with their families—of the Hudson's Bay Company's posts round the coastline, about 100 souls altogether.

The Labrador of the treaty makers is somewhat different, and is shown on this second map (exhibiting same). This is a reproduction of what all students of the Boundary Question know as "Low's Map" of Labrador, the most authoritative yet produced on the region. The colorings on it relate to the case now preparing for the Privy Council. The original was drawn by Prof. Albert Peter Low, who, in the early '90s, explored much of the peninsula and notably the Hamilton River region. He was then a member of the Canadian Geological Survey and afterwards became Deputy. His published "Reports" regarding the peninsula are accepted as of equal standing with his maps.

The area colored green on this map is that which we claim in the present dispute. That colored blue represents the northern boundary of Quebec as fixed by the Treaty of 1763 and that

declares that the forest resources of Quebec Province, essential to the pulp and paper industry, will be exhausted within 21 years. In this fact you can see a strong reason why the forests of Labrador will increase in value every day as that time comes nearer, and you can also see a reason why the pulp and paper interests of Quebec should desire the transfer of Labrador from Newfoundland jurisdiction to that of their own Province.

Eastern Labrador also possesses in a large degree that indispensable adjunct to the pulp and paper industry, namely, waterpower. The latest official Canadian bulletin—issued for the world's "Power"—conferred at London last year, estimates the water powers of Quebec at about 7,000,000 horsepower, and Mr. John Powell, of the Reid Mfd. Company, who has given much study to the problem, figures the value of those on "Terranova" Labrador, exclusive of the celebrated Grand Falls, on the Upper Hamilton River, at about 3½ millions, or about half that total. On Canadian Labrador there are several rivers yielding moderate hydro-electric energy, but the drawback there is the lack of safe harbours. On Terranova Labrador there are equally large rivers, such as the Pinware, Lewis, Alexis, Gilbert, Hawkes, three in Sandwich Bay (The South, Eagle, and White Bear) and several in Hamilton Inlet region, not to speak of those farther north, which are, however, too remote to be likely to be utilized for a long time. This territory has, moreover, the advantage of numerous fine harbours so that the export of any products manufactured in the interior is rendered easy.

The waterpowers, however, most likely to attract the attention of capitalists and result in development are those on the Hamilton River. The Encyclopedia Britannica gives the length of this river as 500 miles. The North West River, also in this area, is about half as long, the possibilities of which in this respect have not yet been adequately examined.

Low's map shows that between Goose Bay, at the head of Lake Melville, which is the outlet of the Hamilton River, and the Bowdoin Canyon, where the river emerges after tumbling over the Grand Falls, there is a rise of 900 feet, while the Falls (represented on this map by a black circle), are 315 feet high against 155 for Niagara, and the River above the falls flows downward from a plateau of 1660 feet above sea level. Let me quote Low himself as to this, from his chapter in Grenfell's book on "Labrador":

"The distance between the lake expansion at the upper end of the portage route and the mouth of Bowdoin Canyon, is eight miles in a straight line running south-southwest. The river at the upper end of this line has an elevation of sixteen hundred and sixty feet above sea-level, a little below the general level of the surrounding country. Where it issues from the canyon into the main valley, it is nine hundred feet above the sea, there is thus a drop of seven hundred and sixty feet in a distance, by the river of less than twelve miles. Considering the volume of the stream, estimated at fifty thousand cubic feet per second, this is a phenomenal descent. If the energy developed by the fall could be turned into work, it would produce the enormous amount of upwards of four million three hundred thousand horsepower. Neglecting the rapids above and below the falls and confining the calculation to the power of the falls itself, we find that it would

develop energy equal to one million seven hundred thousand horsepower, an amount sufficient to operate a large proportion of the manufactures and railways of Canada."

Mr. Powell calculates that the Muskrat Falls, 27 miles up the river from Goose Bay, can develop half a million horsepower without regulation, and twice as much by regulating the stream for some miles above. He believes, too, that five or six other powerful installations can be created between there and Lake Winokapan, about two-thirds of the way to the Grand Falls. To this Lake there is a rise of 750 feet and he says that "the head," or vertical drop of the water from the flume or pipe-line, to the turbines in the power house, of about 120 feet, gives suitable formations and not too expensive installation of dams, is sufficient to generate a profitable power. The "Head" at Petty Harbour is 185 feet, at Grand Falls 125 feet, and at Deer Lake 175 feet. As Niagara one plant has a head of 135 feet and another 180 feet, and at Saguenay the head is 127 feet. Mr. Powell holds, therefore, that on this river, at every rise of about 125 feet, an installation can be put in capable of furnishing a very great horsepower, even disregarding the Grand Falls entirely, because of their remoteness and the engineering problems they would present.

An example of what is possible in this direction is afforded by several rivers in Quebec Province, as shown by this panoramic view of the eastern section which I now exhibit (shows maps). Look first at the St. Maurice River, starting almost due north of Montreal. In its upper reaches the Provincial Government, under the regime of Sir Lomer Gouin, established the Gouin dam at La Tuque, a reservoir with a capacity of 60 billion cubic feet, to regulate the source of the river to 1200 cubic feet per second. It cost 2-1/2 million dollars; but already the paper mills and water-power plants on this river have nearly doubled the output as the result of this dam, while several smaller falls still remain to be disposed of by the Quebec Government. This dam rendered possible three big power installations on the St. Maurice—the St. Maurice Power Company at La Gabelle, with a development of 134,000 horsepower, (or one-third more than that of the Armstrong, Whitworth Company projects at present at Deer Lake), the Laurentide Power Company at Grand Mere, with a development of 164,000 horsepower, and the

Shawinigan Power Company, with a development of 200,000 horsepower. Thus, on a comparatively small river, is a development of 536,000 horsepower, enabling in turn the operation of six of the largest paper mills in Canada, besides which the Shawinigan Company supplies a large proportion of the power for lighting, heating and other purposes in the city of Montreal, though it is 100 miles away. The six paper mills on this river are the Laurentide, Belgo, International, Weyganack, St. Lawrence and St. Maurice; and I may add that besides being run by power from the river they get much of their wood from its watershed.

Then again, let us take the Saguenay, a much larger river, but because of being farther away from Quebec City and centres of population, not so fully developed. It is, however, the scene of the principal activities of the great paper-making firm of Price Brothers, of Quebec, and within its watershed, including the Lake St. John and tributary streams, developments exceeding a million horsepower are in hand. Two years ago a combination was made between Sir Wm. Price, (who was killed by a landslide on this very river last fall) and Mr. Duke, the New York tobacco millionaire, for an installation at Grand Discharge, of one million horsepower alone, of which the first unit of 200,000 horsepower is to be brought into use the coming spring.

This plan shows numerous other installations on both sides of the St. Lawrence, but time does not allow of my dealing with them to-day. Ontario has an immense hydro-electric reservoir in Niagara River, and several installations on both sides of the Niagara Falls furnish enormous supplies of power. When we visited Niagara in August, 1920, with the Imperial Press Conference, we were shown the construction work of the Ontario Hydro-Electric Commission's plant to generate 550,000 horsepower, and in December, 1921, I was invited to be one of an official party proceeding from Toronto to Niagara to witness the inauguration of the first of the ten units, each 55,000, into which this installation is divided.

The next item of potential wealth of Labrador is its minerals, but of these there is not much to be said, because the record in that respect is yet a blank one. It is known that there is a vast deposit of iron ore to the northwest of the Grand Falls, but its remoteness forbids its being utilized at present, though the day will probably come when it will be smelted with the electricity generated at the Grand Falls and the finished product exported by railroad running down the Hamilton River, or by one built due south to Mingan, opposite Anticosti, if the venture warrants the development of a shipping port there.

However, the fact that Labrador has not yet shown the existence of workable mineral wealth, is no evidence that the territory lacks it. When Alaska, with an area of 584,000 square miles, or say one-sixth larger than Labrador, was purchased by the United States from Russian in 1867, for \$7,200,000, it was termed "Steward's Icebox," and Mrs. Steward, when Secretary of State, who was responsible for its purchase, was denounced throughout the United States for investing his country's money in a section of the Arctic region. Yet we find that Alaska has since produced vast gold, coal and other minerals, fishery, peltry, and other wealth returning to the United States a thousand-fold on its outlay. The Encyclopedia Britannica says that

"between 1867 and 1903 the revenue returns from Alaska, totalled \$9,555,509, and in the same period the United States drew from Alaska, fish, furs and gold to the value of about \$150,000,000, that up to 1903 the imports from the United States totalled \$100,000,000 and that \$25,000,000 of American capital was invested in Alaska."

The New York World Almanac for 1925 says that up to the end of 1920 Alaska produced \$20,000,000 of gold and \$127,000,000 of copper, and that the United States Geological Survey estimates the value of the placer gold reserve alone at \$360,000,000 more. This Almanac also gives figures showing the total trade of the territory to be about \$84,000,000 annually for the past five years.

Last, but not least, in the item of Labrador resources is that of its fisheries. A statement compiled from returns of our Fisheries Department for a number of years past shows that for the 13 years, from 1912 to 1923, the average value of fishery exports from the coast was \$583,000 per year. Authorities differ as to the quantity of cod brought back to Newfoundland each year to be cured, some saying as much as exported and others saying as much, so I have "split the difference" and estimated the total as 1½ million dollars, or from a sixth, to a fourth of the annual value of our cod fish export.

This, however, is only a fraction of what the region might produce. For instance, half a century ago there was a very large herring fishery on Labrador, but it no longer exists, though it may come again and prove equally valuable. Again, in bygone days there was a large salmon fishery on that coast. Low says that "Hamilton Inlet was once famous for its salmon fishery, but the use of numerous codtraps along the coast has practically exterminated the salmon." With

IN THE REALMS OF SPORT

SCIENCE AND TRAINING.

ONE-WHEEL SULKY IMPERFECT.

Grand Circuit trotters will continue to race in two-wheeled sulkies for one more season at least. H. W. Hannan's newly invented one-wheeler sulkie Thomas W. Murphy a rough ride when tried out at Syracuse the other day, and it has been laid away for the present. Too much vibration and an inclination to skid were the weak points

developed by actual use at high speed.

Murphy is working his horses with a fractured left hand as the result of a misunderstanding last week with the two-year-old filly Georgia Etawah, one of his nominations in the 360,000 Hambletonian Stakes. MUNN TO MEET ZBYSEKO.

PHILADELPHIA, April 7.—Wayne Munn, heavyweight wrestling champion, will defend his title here on April 15 against Stanislaus Zbyseko. Gabe Kaufman, manager of Munn failed to come to terms yesterday with Promoter Fitzsimmons for a \$50,000 purse to meet Ed. Strangler Lewis in a championship match at Michigan City, Ind., May 30.

Kaufman said he has received a \$100,000 offer for an European tour for Munn. He told Fitzsimmons that as Munn was the champion, Fitzsimmons should have negotiated with Munn first before signing Lewis.

How Old Should a Bride Be

Marriage has been wittily described as the voyage for the unknown, with the large number of couples who, without any very close acquaintance with each other's personalities, rush into matrimony, the epigram contains a considerable amount of truth.

In the best course of an impetuous courtship, in an almost wholly artificial atmosphere where both are on their best behaviour and intent on little but the exercise of mutual charm and fascination, little heed is paid to the important factors of personal habits of life, family traditions, temperaments, and, most important of all, relative ages.

But before considering the question of the right ages for the prospective husband and wife respectively, it will be as well to glance for a moment at the subject of the marriage of mere adolescents. The children resulting from marriages of the immature are likely to inherit the physical, mental and moral immaturity of their parents.

Happy Brides of Twenty-Five.

The average young man, then, should wait until he is in the middle twenties, before he marries. In the case of women, since they mature earlier than men, a suitable age for marriage is twenty-two or twenty-three. At an earlier age than this they are scarcely fitted for the accomplishment of those tasks which healthy motherhood entails, and there is a possibility that their children would be inferior both mentally and physically. An ideal age would seem to be twenty-eight for the bridegroom and twenty-five and a half for the bride.

It is usually taken for granted that for a happy marriage a husband should be older than his wife. Most people hold this view. They seem to have conjured up a picture in their mind's eye of man as the chivalrous knight, and woman as hapless maiden threatened by all the powers of darkness, against which he is her sole and trusty protector. This idea arose during that long period in which women were kept in subjection, and it was assumed that man was the guide and must therefore be the wiser of the two.

Many marriages in which the husband is a good many years older than his wife prove happy enough; but the chances of their being so are greater than those in which the wife is some years older than her husband. The point, after all, would seem to be that the ages of the husband and wife should not differ greatly. While it is possible for many marriages to turn out quite happily where the age of the husband exceeds that of the wife by five, ten, or even twenty years, the marriage most likely to prove successful is one where the man and the woman are of the same age.

When there is no disparity in ages, there is less likely to be any subsequent clash originating in the totally different habits of life and general mental outlook of the pair who have been unequally yoked in respect of their years. Again, a couple who have seen the same number of summers are likely to watch the passing of succeeding winters in close compa-

nyship and with deepening affection. A powerful factor often overlooked by those contemplating marriage is the fundamental "mothering" instinct of woman. Pending later developments, she wants to mother her husband with all the care and devotion which in her younger days she lavished on her unresponsive dolls. To her, the wisest man is only a big and wayward child, to be duly "tended, nursed, and mended." But—and this is important—if he is so obviously and insistently her senior that her mothering instinct is balked of its satisfaction, it will have to be repressed with somewhat disturbing results to her equanimity. But this should fight itself when her first baby arrives.

A Fish of Mystery

A Cart Wheel Clue

Just over one hundred years ago Dr. Peter Mark Roget, who was born in London in 1779, read a paper before the Royal Society which was destined to lead to the invention of the cinematograph.

One day in the summer of 1824 he was looking out of his window at a baker's cart delivering bread at houses opposite. Passing his eye up and down the slots of a Venetian blind he received the impression of a stationary wheel, which he saw was revolving when he kept his eyes still. He discovered the cause and effect, and ultimately gave his findings in his paper to the Royal Society.

The publication of his paper started a new train of thought among the leading scientists of the day; and that his writings on the subject were widely read is proved by the acknowledgments of Dr. Faraday, Dr. Plateau, of Ghent, and Dr. Stampfer, of Vienna, who agreed that but for his clearly-given data and lucid explanation of the phenomena the invention of the phenakistoscope by Dr. Plateau, and of a similar instrument, the stroboscope, by Dr. Stampfer would not have occurred.


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
