Minnesota, Jan. 28, 1873, We have been favored with the following interesting letter from Mr. Daniel Kribbs, by whom it was received from his brother, the Rev. L. Kribbs:

We had, on the tenth and eleventh of this month, the severest storm I ever witnessed. The wind blew a perfect gale, and although the snow that fell did not amount to much, I presume not more than four or five inches, still the wind was so strong that the snow previously on the ground was raised up in the air and made a perfect blinding storm, through which one could not see four rods ahead of him, which continued for two days in succession.

Since the storm the sun has shone fine almost every day, the thermometer sinking at night from ten to twenty below zero, and raising during the day to from twenty to thirty above. This morning was the coldest we have had this season, the thermometer being thirty-eight below zero, and it is pretty cold to-night with a strong wind from the south, but not near so hot as the morning.

The reports about such numbers of people, horses and cattle being frozen to death are found not only to be exaggerated, but in many cases entirely without foundation.

London, Feb. 8. - American Club of Liverpool entertained Lucius Fairchild, the new U. S. Consul at that city, at a banquet last evening.

London, Feb. 7. - Railway travel in the north of Spain is yet interrupted by the Carlists. No mails from Madrid have been received in London for nine days, and the Spanish trade is disturbed.

New York, Feb. 7. - The steamship Trinacria, from Gibraltar, has arrived.

Ontario Legislature, Bills were introduced by Mr. Gow to incorporate the Guelph and Collingwood Railway Company, to authorize the sale of certain lands in the Town of Guelph.

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THIS MORNING'S DESPATCHES

Evans the Double-dyed Fiend, His Confession of Six Murders, Pardon of Two of the Ku-Klux Klan, Carlists impede Travel in Spain.

Boston, Feb. 7. - According to the confession of Evans, in 1858 he stole away and killed his little niece in Derry, N. H., aged 5 years. In 1861 he assaulted and cut the throat of a girl, 14 years old, in Augusta, Maine, for which by the way another man died in prison. In 1865 he outraged the person of Isabella Joyce, aged 14, and then killed her and her brother John, a boy of 12 years, in Bussey's wood, near Boston. In 1871, June 10th, he was charged with a similar crime upon the person of a woman who was found dead in the woods near Fitchburg, Mass., and during the year he outraged and mutilated the person of and murdered Georgiana Lovering, a girl 12 years of age, in North Wood.

Washington, Feb. 7. - The President, to-day, pardoned Stewart and Mitchell, both of South Carolina, convicted of Ku-Klux crimes, and sentenced to imprisonment in Albany penitentiary.

New York, Feb. 7. - Arrived steamers Greece and Parthia from Liverpool.

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Lien in Favor of Mechanics.

It is surprising to what an extent the delivery of small parcels is carried in this city, and we could mention a hundred instances in illustration of what may be called the nuisance of tradesmen. Two or three will, however, suffice. A person out shopping purchased a comb, which constituted the whole purchase; but an errand boy had to take it to purchaser's residence a distance of half a mile, making a mile's travel for the delivery of this one small parcel, the profit on which, probably, was only three or four cents. Immediately after the delivery of the comb, the next door neighbour of the first purchaser entered the establishment and purchased a tooth brush; and the leg tired errand boy had to make the same trip again for the delivery of the brush. In another case the errand runner was despatched a distance of three quarters of a mile to deliver a spool of cotton thread and a paper of pins; and it not frequently happens that the errand boy is despatched to a considerable distance to deliver a pound of sugar, a quarter of a pound of nutmegs, and thus on ad infinitum. How easy it would have been for these thoughtless purchasers to have carried the articles they had purchased home themselves, and thus saved all the unnecessary running backwards and forwards of the tired errand boys. It is a positive nuisance and a general grievance. We venture to say that Queen Victoria, had she to purchase such small articles as we have mentioned, would never ask that they should be sent to the palace by an errand boy. It is only thoughtless and silly people who thus impose upon the good nature and accommodating spirit of the tradesmen of this city. It is a nuisance, however, which should be abated. No one should be ashamed to carry home any article he may have occasion to purchase. If it be very bulky, of course the tradesman should send the article to the residence of the customer by his porter, but not otherwise. We remember an instance in which an employer administered a practical rebuke to his clerk in this wise: The clerk had purchased a pair of chickens in the market, and though going directly home himself, he asked the person to whom he made the purchase to send them to his house, a very considerable distance from the market. The employer passing at the moment, and hearing the request of his clerk, said, "Don't trouble the man, John, I will carry the chickens home for you," and actually did so, to the utter chagrin of the employee.—Hamilton Times.
