Sudden Death.—Mr. George G. A. Smith, who has been in the gaol here for a short time past, his mind having become deranged; was sent to the Asylum in Toronto one day last week. He died there, and his body was brought up yesterday to be interred near his late residence, in the vicinity of Aberfoyle.

CREMATION still continues to excite much interest in Berlin and Vienna. A lady in the latter city, of the advanced age of seventy, and to whom therefore the subject begins to assume an aspect of personal importance, has subscribed 30,000 florins to the cremation fund, with directions for a furnace to be erected without delay.

THE number of signatures to petitions for a prohibitory liquor law presented to Parliament during the present session from the various Provinces has been as follows: Ontario, 94,831; Quebec, 12,-65; New Brunswick, 13,536; Nova Scotia, 13,437; Prince Edward Island, 3,340; British Columbia, 208.—Total, 127,817. 3,340; 127,817.

After passing a eulogy on the new Chief Justice as a citizen and friend, the address closed by congratulating Mr. Wood on his appointment and wishing him and his family God speed on their journey and prosperity in their new sphere.

Hon. B. B. Wood, on rising to respond, was loudly cheered. He referred to his position when he first came to Brantford some twenty years ago, and the changes which had taken place in this country. It had changed wonderfully in the last two or three years, and is changing rapidly now, and making history very great measure that was brought before Parliament he always did his best to serve the interests of this Province and the whole Dominion. (Cheers). If he was entitled to any credit in one thing more than another it was in the settlement of the difficult problem which was thrown on the country, namely, the Municipal Loan Fund. CONFESSION OF BOWES. Bowes' confession is published to-day in the leading journals, anent abstraction of the Pope-Macdonnid letter. Employed as clerk at the Militia office, he states that he went to the Post-office early on the morning of 2nd September last. While serving letters at the office, he found one addressed to the Hon. J. H. Pope, and suspecting that the contents were of a political nature, and as the envelope was open owing to imperfect fastening, he made himself acquainted with the contents. Considering that injustice was being done to the Hon. Mr. Young, he inclosed the letter under another envelope to that gentleman, with whom he never had any communication on the subject. He declares that Falmer knew nothing of the matter, and denies that he ever received any money for what he has done. Bowes wrote recently anonymously to the Minister of Justice, asking for a full pardon in the event of his clearing up the mystery that surrounded this transaction, but obtained no answer. He states that no enbeside himself had anything to do with the affair, and it appears that he would not have forwarded his confession, which was written on the 11th of April, the date of Palmer's second suspension, had he not feared that, the Commissioners having closed their labore, Palmer would receive unmerited punishment. Bowes was formerly an engineer. He has fled, it is supposed, to the States.

The Council have seen fit to bring a question of increased market d hall accommodation before the epayers again. The proposal this ne is to make such alterations and xtensions of the present building s will meet the desired object, and or this purpose a by-law authorizing the Council to issue debentures to the amount of \$18,000 will be subnitted for their approval on the 18th of June. The previous by-law, for the erection of a new building, asked for \$25,000, so that there is a dif-ference of \$7,000 in favor of the secnd one for the extension of the resent building, and if the scheme in be carried out for less money, uncil need only issue deben tures for the amount required. 1t may be a question whether the Council was wise in asking the approva of the ratepayers to the extension so soon after the defeat of the previous by law for the new building, but perhaps it is better to have the matter definitely settled now, than to let the agitation die out, and bring it up afresh at some future period. We believe, however, that had this extension scheme been sub-mitted for approval in the first place, its chances would have been much better than they now are, for the de feat of the first one will to some ex tent damage the prospects of the second. Besides, our financial po-sition is better understood now than it was some weeks ago. The estimates for the year, as submitted 'at the last regular meeting of the Council, show that a rate of two cents in the dollar will be required to be levied to meet our indebtedness. But, then, the ratepayers must re-member that we have to assess this year for the payment of our portion of the Municipal Loan Fund debt to the Government, according to the terms of the Act passed in the session of 1873 for the settlement of that debt. This may seem pretty hard, at first sight, but when we con-sider all the circumstances, we think that the people of Guelph have good cause for thankfulness that they have got off so easy. Our position in regard to that debt is infinitely preferable to that of many Municipalities, whose resources will be seriously crippled in paying up what they owe to that Fund. We must also remember that since 1863-when we stopped levying for the interest and sinking fund—we have not paid a cent of our debt to that Fund, and during all these years our taxation in consequence has been light com-pared with that of many towns and villages that we could name. Should the by-law be carried, and

the work of extension be proceeded with, the additional amount required to be raised yearly, for twenty years, would average about \$1,400, which spread over the assessment of the town, as it stands this year, would be only about eight-tenths of a mill on only about eight-tenths of a mill on the dollar—so small an amount as would scarcely be felt by any rate-payer in the Town. The work most likely would not be proceeded with this season, so that an advantage would be gained in the certainty of contracts being entered into at lower figures than could be obtained now.

The Council having now done their The Council having now done their part, it rests with the ratepayers to say whether they approve or disapprove of the proposed extension. Is there a necessity for such an extension? Nine tenths of the people, in town admit that there is. Will this extention benefit us to the extent of the outlay? If judiciously and economically done, we have little doubt but it will, and afford such moreased accommodation as the noreased accommodation as the growing wants of the Town require, and which must be obtained sooner or later if we are to keep pace with its progress and requirements.

The Close of the Session.

Parliament was prorogued on Tuesday with the usual ceremonies, and the fruit of its labours is see in the hundred and nine bills which were assented to by the Governor General. The session lasted only two months, but into that short period was crowded a vast amount of ork, and members can go back to their constituents and honestly say that they did not triffe away their time that there was very little unneces sary talking, and that nearly every measure promised by the Govern ment has become law. Much of this is due to the ability of the different members of the Government, to the promptness with which they brought down all their measures, to their as-siduity in forwarding all public busi-ness, and to their excellent management of the House in having it carried through

Of the total number of bills passed sixty are private and forty-nine public. The most important of the latter are the Pacific Railway bill; the new Election bill, providing for vote by ballot; the Controverted Elections bill; a measure for raising a loan of forty million dollars for canal and other public improvements; the new Tariff bill, a bill; to vest in the Public Works department the power of managing the Intercolonial by ballot; the Controverted Elections

Railway; a measure for the better administration of the North West Territories; besides others of lesser importance. The only measure of any consequence, promised by the Government, which was not passed, was the bill for amending the Insolvent Act of 1869. It was introduced too late in the session to be fully discussed, and we think it was wise policy on the part of the Government to delay it for another session, so that members and the business community may have full time to carefully consider its provisions.

It is needless to enter into the merits of the measures above mentioned. We have fully discussed these from time to time as they came up for consideration. Suffice to say that their acceptance by the House, and the general approval they have met with in the country, is the best evidence of their suitability to our wants, and for the development of the resources of the Dominion. By the reckless legislation of the old Government the present Administration were placed in a most difficult position. But they have shown they were equal to the emergency, and by their ability, close attention to business, wise foreight and excellent judgment in legislation, administrative talent, adherence to principle, and honesty in carrying it out, they have fully realized the hopes and expectations of their friends, disappointed and outwitted their opponents, greatly strengthened their position in Parliament, and secured a larger measure of confidence throughout the country.

COUNTY OF WELLINGTON. BY-LAW NO.

A BY-LAW No.—

A BY-LAW to provide for the erection of a building reguired to give increased Market House and Town Hall accommodation in the Town of Guelph, and for the issue of eighteen thousand doltars debentures for that purpose.

WHEREAS, increased Market House and Town Hall accommodation is required by the Corporation of the Town of Guelph, and in order to provide for the erection of the necessary building for the said purpose on the Market Square, in the Town of Guelph, and on land belonging to the said Corporation, and to be attached to the present Market House and Town Hall, the said Corporation will require to expend the sum of eighteen thousand dollars.
