This principle of friction has been known for centuries and used for the production of fire, first by the use of dry pleces of wood and later on the flint and steel method, which held its own until about 50 years ago, when the friction match containing plosphorus was brought into use. The principles upon which the phosphorus match depend are but slightly different from those involved in the use of flint and steel. The rubbing of a match upon a rough surface is a mechanical process which generates heat. Just as any blow or any friction does the amount of heat is small but sufficient to set on fire, the phosphorus of the match, which in turn ignites the sulphur and the wood. Many have now been puzzling their brains to invent a substitute for the ordinary pocket match; several devices have recently been invented for producing a light by means of acids, phosphorus, fulminates and other chemicals. The trouble with anything in the chemical line is that not only are they undestrable to have in the p.cket, but when the materials used for combustion are exhausted and not on hand the instruments are useless and have to be thrown aside. We notice a simple and inexpensive device for producing a light without the use of chemicals, being an linguinous combination and improvement of the old and new systems of lighting by friction, which has just been in vented by Dr Wad-El-Ward. late of Palestine, and J. R. Collins of this city, which threate to some extent if it comes into general use. The device is arranged in a neat pocket case about 3½ inches in length, 1½ inches in width and ½ inch in thickness and consists of a series of small toothed wheels which work on the spindle of a steel wheel of particular quality and temper, which in revolving comes gently in contact with a piece of sandstone arranged in such a way that the contact of stone and steel produces a brilliant stream of spanks which, are Games To-day.
