

EIGHT HOUR DAY FOR ALL MINERS

Hon. W. H. Hearst Introduced Far-Reaching Bill to Legislature Yesterday.

RESULT OF AN ENQUIRY

Legislation Will Not Apply to Those Not Working Underground.

Hon. W. H. Hearst, minister of lands, forest and mines, introduced a bill yesterday in the legislature which means that no miner shall be allowed to remain underground in any mine for more than eight hours a day. This legislation, which was given its first reading, embraces the recommendations made by Commissioner Price, who was appointed by the government to investigate conditions in all the mines of the province. Mr. Rowell, stated that the bill covers the entire mining industry, save that of iron, of the province, and will make an eight-hour-day compulsory upon all employers and operatives. The reason for the exception of the iron mines would be given later.

The bill says, in part: "No workman shall remain or be allowed to remain underground in any mine for more than eight hours in any consecutive 24 hours, which eight hours, where the employer obtains from the inspector's certificate that the means and methods in use at the mine of getting to and from the place of work are methods in use at the mine of getting to and from the place of work are proper and satisfactory, shall be reckoned from the time of arriving at such place of work until the time of leaving such place, otherwise such eight hours shall be reckoned from the time of leaving the surface until the time of returning to the surface, or, in such other way as the inspector may direct."

direct."

The Saturday shift may work longer hours for the purpose of avoiding work on Sunday or changing shift at the end of each week, or giving any of the men a part holiday.

The eight-hour-day will not apply to shift bosses, pump men, or persons engaged solely in surveying or measuring, nor will it apply in cases of emergency, where life or property is in imminent danger, or in cases of repair work, or in any mine where the number of men working in the shift does not exceed six.

The bill gives the lleutenant-governor in council the right to suspend the operation of the eight-hour day in the event of a great emergency or grave economic disturbance, to such an extent as he deems fit.

LOCAL IMPROVEMENT CAR LINES The World seems to have shared in the misconception which was widely spread concerning the proposal to lay street car lines on the local improvement system. The explanation that the local improvement system is not intended at all somewhat relieves the situation. It may also allay the en thusiasm for the plan which was eloping in some quarters.

What The World objects to, and would continue to object to, is th suggestion that bodies of petitioners, or groups of residents, or local interests the most sacred and solemn holy days of any kind, either directly or thru an alderman, should have the power to go before the city council and lobby for street car lines. The initiative for laying all such lines should not be vested in the aldermen or anyone behind the aldermen, but in the expert or experts constituted by the city as the authority for that purpose. No line should be laid which does not have the prospect of supporting business before it in the view of the city authority, whether that authority be a traffic commission or the city engineer. A local improvement plan would load the city up with lines doubtful as business propositions and based only on the hopes of real estate promoters.





FASHIONS AND THE HOUSEHOLD

Helps For Housekeeping A Few Economic Desserts

By Mrs. Sarah Moore. There are many useful hints about cooking which I have gathered during past years of housekeeping, some of them from my own and some from other people's experience that I think may be new to many of my readers and one teaspoonful of lemon extract. may be new to many of my readers Add one teaspoonful of len and which perhaps may, in an emer- and also of melted butter. and which perhaps may, in an emergency, make housekeeping easier.

If you want to make an icing for a cake which is extremely novel and delicious as well as quickly put together, try a fruit icing. This is best made from confectioners' sugar, but if you don't happen to have this in the house ordinary powdered sugar will do. Orange juice with a thin grating of the yellow rind makes a serv pretty and finely-flavored frost-

simplicity itself. All you have to do is to stir sugar into the juice until it is thick enough to spread on the cake. Strawberry juice makes a very nice frosting indeed, as does also the juice of red raspberries and pineapples and even the homely lemon juice is not to be despised. When fresh fruit cannot be obtained the juite from canned fruit can be used. Cake will never stick to the pan if after buttering it the pan is sprinkled with flour. This takes the place of a paper lining and is much easier. Even the best baked sponge cake will fall if after being taken from the oven it is set where a draught will blow on it. It should be taken out of the tin and put away carefully in a cupboard or pantry until perfectly cool.

To keep raisins, currants or citron from falling to the bottom of a cake is sufficient.

Georgia Apple Toddy: Bake some tart apples until nearly tender, then place them in an earthenware baking dish, season with any desired spices and sugar and cover them with California brandy. Bake slowly for two hours. It will not take a great amount of brandy and this so evaporates in the long cooking as to leave no evil consequences, but only a delicious flavor.

Canned Peach Cobbler: This is not at all like the dish that goes by that name usually. Nearly fill a pudding dish with peaches not cut up. Cover with biscuit dough nearly an inch thick. Beat one egg until thick, add one cupful of milk or cream, the sifted flour mixture and one cupful of oranherics.



Sections in Demand.

Agents who anticipated that the heavy sale of building land that was an unusual feature of winter business would mean a lesser turnover during the spring, admit cheerfully that they were out of their calculations. The past week has brought forth a wider and heavier enquiry, with larger resultant sales, than any similar period for months. Real building land, land improved sufficiently for the builder to go ahead with his work, is the most saleable thing on the realty market. The builders are not asking that every improvement be in, water and sidewalks suffice. They will wait for the sewers and the permanent pavements, and they are prepared to look ahead of the cars, provided the carscivic cars—are to be in operation this summer. They must have water connections for their building work.

SKYSCRAPER PROMOTERS WILL HAVE TO FIGHT FOR PERMITS

Council Decides to Stick to One Hundred and Thirty-Foot Limit in Future—Thick Walls Clause For Tall Buildings Discarded-Apartment House and Private Dwelling Rooms Must Have at Least One Window Opening to External Air.

Resuming consideration of the proposed building bylaw yesterday afternoon the city council by a close vote decided that the provision that certain walls must be increased by four and one-half inches in thickness below the uppermost 75 feet of the building and by an additional four and one-half inches below the uppermost 135 feet, adds no appreciable security to the building and should be removed from the list of those that must be fireproof if over thirty-five feet high.

After much discussion and voting on three amendments the clause limiting the height of buildings to 130 feet was adopted.

The clause to prevent dwellings on front and rear of lots was strengthened, and another clause makes it imperative that every room of an apartment house or any dwelling must have a window opening to external air.




