If detailed information be not given therewith, the people of Toronto are first of all, and of course, Mr. Controller Spence actually stated that this property is worth only \$80,000.

When the board of control's report was under consideration, a council by a big majority vote, granted the C.P.R. special permit necessary for the erection of their new harbor commission.

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Confirmed Nominations. A big majority of council voted in favor of E. Home Smith's appointment.

Work on Tracks at Night. The city engineer had reported to the board of control that Alderman Yehman's proposition to work on track allowances in congested districts at night would not work out.

Relief on Officials. Ald. Graham submitted that the reports of the officials were sufficient argument to justify the defeat of the project of annexation.

Cheap Benefits. "I am the second speaker this evening in favor of the annexation," said Ald. McBride.

Ald. Phelan pointed out that the board of control was recommending the annexation of North Toronto with-out special terms or conditions.

Position of the Town. "At the very outset I might point out that we are not responsible for the granting of the exclusive franchise on Yonge-street," said Mayor Brown.
