IRON AND STEEL STRIKE PROMISED TO BE BITTER STRUGGLE

CLASHES PRECEDE THE STEEL STRIKE

Pennsylvania State Police Charge Crowds Bent on Holding Mass Meetings—Companies' Property Under Heavy Guard—Will Be Bitter Fight.

Pittsburg, Pa., Sept. 21.—Clashes between Pennsylvania State police and crowds bent on holding labor mass meetings in the Pittsburg district today ushered in the strike in the iron and steel industry.

Quiet reigned throughout the day at Duquesne, Homestead and East Duquesne. There was no attempt made by the steel men to hold meetings, and there was no congregation on the street.

There was a slight disturbance at McKeesport, where the union organizers attempted to hold a mass meeting in defiance of the proclamation of Mayor George Lysle, forbidding public gatherings.

It was stated, The steel plants in and about McKeesport employ approximately 18,000 workmen. All plants are under heavy guard.

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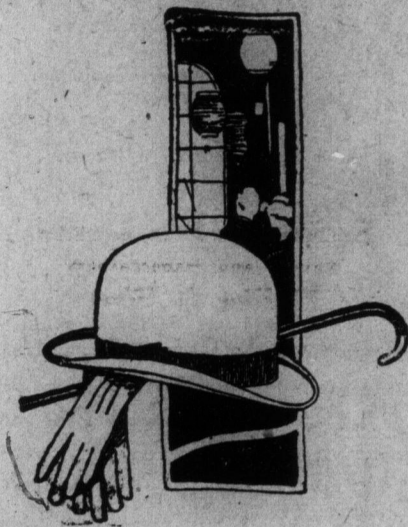

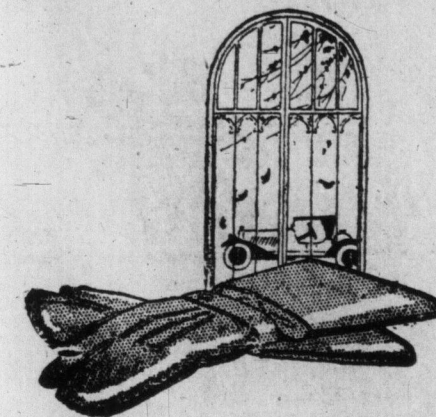

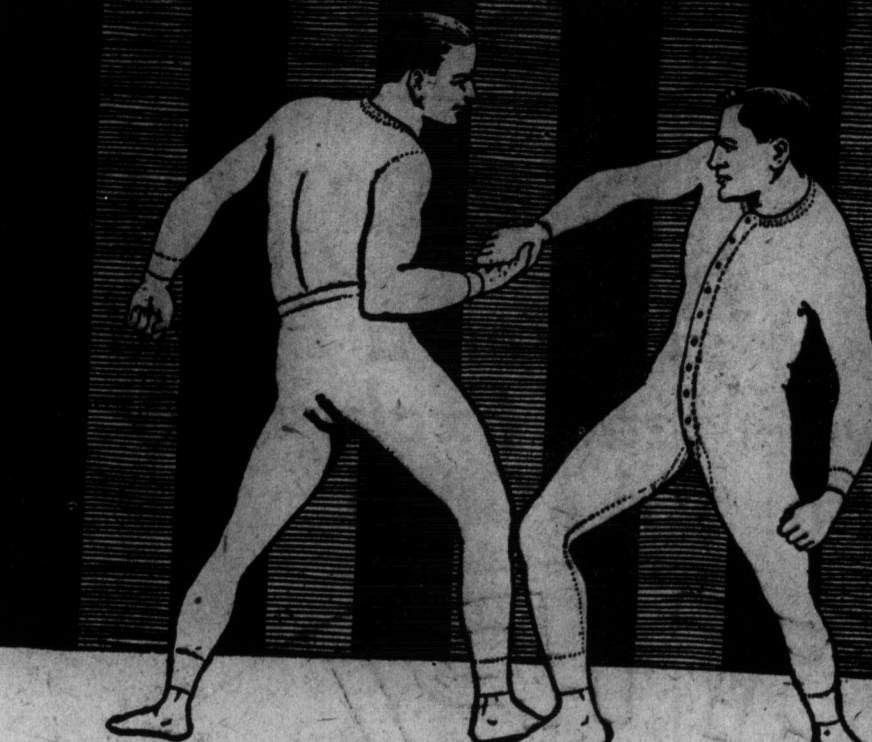
Only one veteran organization availed itself of the invitation sent out by the Gratuity League to designate a representative to the meeting...

W. J. Carmichael, on behalf of his association, stated that the G. A. C. was willing to abide by the decision of the mass. He declared that in the event of the other veteran organizations casting their charters, name and constitution into the ditch...

Various other injustices were laid at the door of the Government and of the G. W. V. A. who, the speaker claimed, were banded together to crush the interests of the returned man. Chief among these allegations was that as a result of the efforts of the G. W. V. A. the process of demobilization was delayed over a period of two or three years.

Referring to the non-appearance of a representative from the G. W. V. A., Mr. Flynn stated that if they had the right spirit they would throw into the ditch all they had as an association.

Referring to the proposed organization, the speaker stated that this should be political, so as to gain for the returned man that power and right to which he is entitled. He emphasized the advantage of a united front and related in glowing terms the "new lions at Ottawa" that had been caused by the activities of the Gratuity League during the short time they have been working for the \$2,000 bonus.
