BRAVE MEN OF THE SURF SAVES ELEVEN SURVIVORS

Led by Prince Consort of Netherlands, Lifboat Crews, After Hours of Terrific Battling With Waves, Succeed in Their Mission—Two Women and Child Still in Danger.

Hook of Holland, Feb. 22.—Thanks largely to the courage and determination of Prince Henry of the Netherlands, the prince consort, that which last night appeared impossible, has been achieved and the heroic and unflinching efforts of the Dutch lifboat men have succeeded in rescuing eleven survivors of the ill-fated steamer Berlin.

The lifboat men triumphed after more than thirty hours of hard and dangerous work. Buffeted and driven back time after time, they refused to relax their attempts to save the handful of shipwrecked persons, and finally, this afternoon, aided by the receding tide and some improvement in the weather, their arduous fight was crowned with victory.

Altho several of the persons rescued were in the last stages of exhaustion, they were able to get to recovery. Some of them have been even able to tell the story of their awful experiences.

Two women and a child are still on board the wreck, but it is feared that they are dying. Nothing, however, is being done to save them, as the sea is so rough that it is impossible to approach the wreck, over which mountainous seas continued to dash with terrific fury.

At Daybreak. When daylight broke this morning a handful of survivors of the Great Eastern Railway Company's steamer Berlin, from Harwich, England, to Rotterdam, which was wrecked off the Hook of Holland, yesterday morning, could still be seen clinging to the upper part of the steamer. The efforts made to rescue the survivors yesterday were continued throughout the night and to-day, but until this afternoon they proved futile, owing to the furious seas and heavy snowstorm which raged all night long, rendering it impossible for the tugs or lifboats to approach the wreck, over which mountainous seas continued to dash with terrific fury.

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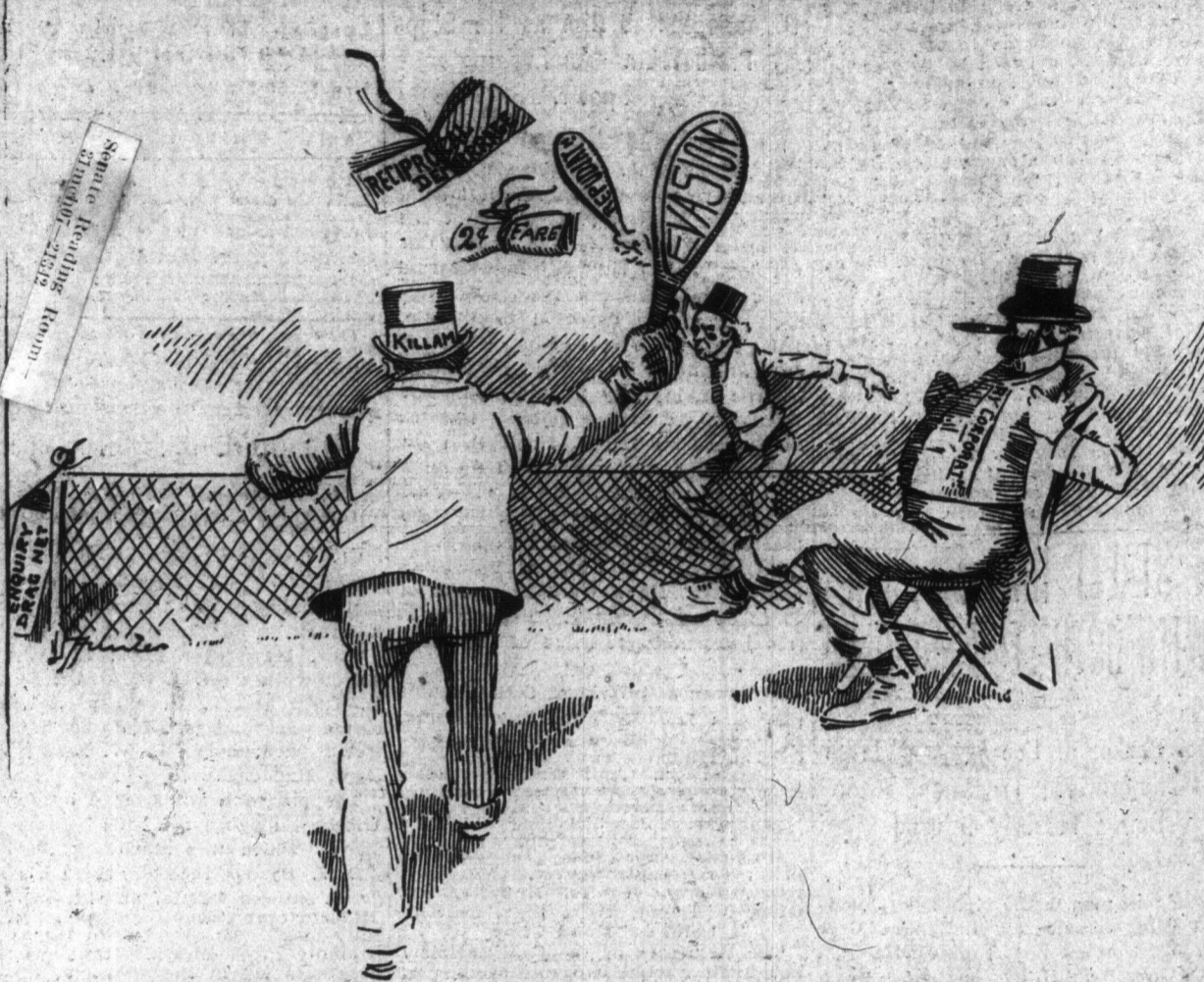

BAD RAILWAY WRECK IS REPORTED TO SIDETRACK 100 LIVES LOST

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Feb. 22.—A long-distance train was wrecked on the Pennsylvania Railroad at Altoona, Pa., this afternoon, and it is reported that 100 lives have been lost.

Philadelphia, Pa., Feb. 22.—At 1:30 this morning the Pennsylvania Railroad officials here said that the wrecked train was the Pennsylvania special, the 19-hour train between New York and Chicago. The wreck, the officials said, occurred about 23 miles west of Altoona, and half a mile from the Pennsylvania Railroad station.

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SOMETHING DOING SOON FOR A HUDSON BARRI.

MRS. PERKINS ASKED LAWYER AS TO SHARING AN ESTATE

Was Afraid Husband Would Die Without Making a Will, So Story Goes.

Cayuga, Feb. 22.—(Special.)—Interest in the Perkins case is at fever heat. In fact the public feeling has had no little to do with the affair.

At the inquest into Perkins' death Dr. Kerr, the family physician, stated that he knew of no strychnine being about the house. The poison book at the local drug store, however, shows that Ralph Carrig, brother of Mrs. Perkins, purchased a quantity in October. It is said, too, that strychnine was found in the trunk owned by the dead man.

It was learned to-day that the crown will endeavor to show that Mrs. Perkins had been buying poison at a store in St. Thomas, Windsor and Detroit. While in Welland Detective Greer interviewed the persons with whom Welland to show that Perkins was in good health and good spirits when he lived there and when he left there to go home for Christmas.

Perkins was living at Welland, where he was working in a factory. His father died under somewhat similar circumstances. It is said that Perkins got about \$6000 in property from the estate.

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HONDURAS DECLARES WAR PREPARES FOR INVASION

President Bonilla Leads His Army Towards the Nicaraguan Frontier.

Mexico City, Feb. 22.—Word reached this city to-night that Honduras has formally declared war against Nicaragua. President Bonilla is at the head of the Honduran troops, and is marching on the frontier of Nicaragua.

Managua, Nicaragua, Feb. 22.—The Nicaraguan force on Feb. 20 captured, without opposition, the Town of El Trunfo, in Honduras, and yesterday afternoon the fighting between the Nicaraguan army occupied San Bernardo, an excellent position, owing to the fact that it is in communication by land and water with the Nicaraguan base of operations.

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Premier Intimates that Matter is Being Considered, and Early Announcement is Promised—General Demand from West for New Railway.

Ottawa, Feb. 22.—(Special.)—On a motion to go into supply this afternoon, Mr. Knowles (Liberal, West Assiniboia) called the attention of the government to the urgent necessity for the construction of a railway to Hudson Bay.

The west was suffering from the lack of transportation. Neither wood nor coal could be moved as required. He claimed that the C.P.R. is withdrawing its motive power and rolling stock from the west, altho the traffic is increasing.

The government should assist the west by constructing a national road. The western people were heavily taxed by a tariff that did them no earthly good, and from this revenue were built wharves in Nova Scotia and canals in Ontario. Had not the west some right to relief from the national treasury? He claimed that ships could enter and leave the ports of Hudson Bay from June to December.

Mr. Lake (Conservative, Qu'Appelle) considered this matter of the highest importance. The present railway was unable to meet the demands of western traffic.

Mr. Greenway (Liberal, Manitoba) thought the Hudson Bay route was entirely feasible. It was the original route, the one used for hundreds of years by the Hudson Bay Company. It was a serious problem in the Northwest was a serious problem. The G.T.P. and other slow roads running east and west only accentuated the trouble by opening additional areas and increasing the quantity of grain to be carried.

Mr. Cash (Liberal, Mackenzie) said that the entire west was anxious for this road to be built. The railways had utterly broken down in their efforts to get out the grain. Had the government any way of enforcing the law and compelling the companies to carry the people? He submitted that a railway to Hudson Bay might bring relief.

Mr. McManey (Liberal, Saskatchewan) corroborated the preceding speakers as to car shortage. The trouble was so serious that people had largely been talking about it.

Mr. Foster (North Toronto) defended the C.P.R. It seemed odd to commiserate with the companies, who were the freight that it possibly could. But he favored a railroad to Hudson Bay.

Premier Premier (Liberal, Saskatchewan) Sir Wilfrid Laurier said the Hudson Bay Railroad had been discussed for many years. A statute was passed years ago appropriating land in their efforts to get out the grain. No company had ever applied for it. But some other moment the matter was engaging attention of the government.

BUREAU TO LEND A HAND. Solicitor-General Will Take Part in the Manitoba Elections.

Montreal, Feb. 22.—(Special.)—Not satisfied with their defeat in British Columbia, it appears that the Laurier government will enter the fight against Premier Roblin.

This, in fact, is confirmed to-day by the leading government organ here, Le Canada. That paper declares that the new solicitor-general, Hon. Jacques Bureau, will leave for Winnipeg on March 1 to take part in the contest.

Le Canada says that the solicitor-general will be accompanied by Messrs. Beaupreant, M.P. for St. Hyacinthe, and Boyer, M.P. for Verdun.

WOMAN AND 3 CHILDREN DROWN IN SHALLOW CREEK

She Went to Rescue When Youngsters Broke Thru Ice—One Boy Saved.

Buffalo, Feb. 22.—Four people were drowned in Scjaquadda Creek at the Elmwood-avenue entrance of Delaware Park, this evening. The dead are Mrs. William H. Drummer, 23 years of age, of 1017 Grant-street; Anthony Belter, 13 years old, 382 William-street; Richard Belter, 12 years old, Anthony's brother; Ruth Drummer, 14 years old, Mrs. Drummer's stepdaughter.

Mrs. Drummer, with seven children, was walking on the ice toward Delaware Park, the Elmwood Viaduct, over the creek, when the ice suddenly gave way under Ruth and the two Belter boys, throwing them into the water. Mrs. Drummer was about 20 feet away with her four-year-old son Walter, who was riding on a sleigh. Leaving the sleigh, Mrs. Drummer ran to the rescue of the three children struggling in the water. In her efforts to save them Mrs. Drummer broke thru the ice and little Walter, who had toddled after his mother, also fell in. The screams of the other children, who were nearby, attracted the attention of the crew and passengers of a street car, who ran to the bank of the creek. The only one of the four in sight then was the four-year-old lad, Walter, who was clinging to the edge of the ice. He was rescued without difficulty.

Mrs. Drummer was unconscious when taken from the water and the excited children did not tell the rescuers, or failed to realize that three of their number were still missing. Mrs. Drummer was carried to a hospital, where she died without regaining consciousness. It was not until the children reached home that the others were missed. The creek was dragged and the three bodies found close to the hole in the ice.

The water was only four feet deep where the drowning occurred.

Detectives Nab Him as He Steps

ON STREET HALF-AN-HOUR
WITH BOTH LEGS MANGLED

Geo. Parker of Lee Ave., a Victim
of Thoughtless Treatment After
Being Terribly Injured.

Business men in the vicinity of Jarvis and King-streets are indignant over the fact that an unfortunate man with both legs frightfully mangled by the wheels of a car, was allowed to lie on the sidewalk for half an hour, before he was conveyed him to St. Michael's Hospital. No attempt was even made, it is asserted, to cover the poor fellow, who lay unconscious and exposed to the public gaze. One man, Mr. Drummond, offered to allow the victim to be carried into his crockery store. The offer was, however, ignored by the policeman on the beat, and Mr. Drummond says it was 29 minutes before an ambulance arrived. There was nothing on the streets at that time, and he felt that it was a person to offer a clue as to his identity, and it was not until he regained consciousness after both legs had been amputated, one above, and one just below the knee, that the hospital authorities were informed of his name, Geo. Parker of 16 Lee-avenue. Parker's friends were notified and were with him at the hospital, where he was in a condition worse than reported as improving. Dr. St. Charles, who was at the scene of the accident, says the treatment given the man was the worst he has ever seen. He says that he has never seen a man who has been so badly injured and who has been left on the street for so long a time. There were several cars standing on the street, and why couldn't one of the railway people have placed him in the car and taken him to a hospital without waiting for the ambulance? The wheels were allowed the man to stay on the street for such a time. According to a witness of the accident the man was running up Jarvis-street and attempted to jump on the car at the front end. The car was moving fairly fast when the man slipped and fell under the wheels. The motorman, J. Davis, stated that he had stopped at the market, and was fast when he was struck. The man grabbed both the hand rails of the front vestibule, but he never put his foot on the step. He slipped on the snowy road and fell under the wheels. A citizen says that mishaps to people who try to board cars at the corner are an everyday occurrence.

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE LECTURE

Bicknell Young Addresses Large Audience in Massey Hall.

The Christian Science cult, judging by the attendance at Massey Hall last night for the lecture by Bicknell Young of Chicago, has attained considerable numerical strength in Toronto. The body of the ground floor was comfortably filled, while the lower gallery also held a number of interested listeners.

Mr. Young, who is a member of the leadership board of First Church of Christ, Scientist, Boston, showed himself the possessor of a polished style, and of a smooth delivery. His exposition of the principles of Christian Science was clear and forceful.

Christian Science, he said, might be defined as the science of all that related to God, and was science not only in relation to healing, but as corrective in relation to all problems of existence. Accepted theories of religion and science had scoffed at the association of the words, but reason and logic showed conclusively that science must relate to truth, and therefore to God, since God was the cause and basis of all that was true.

Of all people, Christian Scientists believed most absolutely in Christ. They declared that His command to heal the sick was as binding as that which preached the gospel, and that there was no evidence that it was intended for His time only. It was scientific religion that healed the sick in the time of Jesus and his disciples, and it was the same work now.

The practice of medicine was merely an experimental system, and it was a self-confessed condition of weakness that combinations of medical societies and the medical fraternity generally, to shut out all other systems. President Schurman Disagrees With Roosevelt—Remedies Against Monopolies.

Omaha, Neb., Feb. 22.—At the annual dinner of the Omaha Club to-day to celebrate Washington's Birthday, the principal speaker was Dr. Jacob Gould Schurman, president of Cornell University. He discussed "Some Present Day Problems." He said in part:

"I suppose there is little doubt that in some few industries monopoly actually exists and oppression is actually practiced by monopolies. It is a very serious thing, and it is our duty to remedy it. There are remedies within reach which may be used at any time. In the first place, trusts, which are monopolies and oppressive, may be destroyed. If any tariff schedule does actually enable a trust to exploit the people for its own enrichment, that tariff schedule is done up. No matter how much talk there may be of the sanctity of the tariff or the solemn duty of independent rivals.

"A second remedy is a better regulation of corporations and trusts in the interest of the people. Perhaps we may see the big corporations legally enjoined from charging markedly different prices for the same commodity in different parts of the country for the sole purpose of freezing out independent rivals.

The speaker discussed recent revelations of corruption in business and official life, and argued that the fault lay largely in the fact that the leaders in great industries have not developed as rapidly in their moral nature as in their economic and their financial capacity.

Dr. Schurman did not, however, consider this as the only government of the United States, which draws its life from party politics, and in which the administration are necessarily short-lived.

"Dr. Schurman said he could not agree with President Roosevelt as to the alleged danger from 'swollen fortunes.' 'The danger is not,' he said, 'in stolen fortunes.'

ANTI-SEMITIC EXCESSES GRADUALLY DIMINISHING

Stolypin Ordered Active Measures to Repress Disorders—The Black Hundreds.

Odessa, Feb. 22.—The anti-Semitic excesses which have been conducted during the past month by the Union of True Russians, with the tolerance of the authorities, are gradually diminishing. Premier Stolypin finally instructed Governor-General Kaubars to take energetic measures to prevent further disorders.

It was becoming evident that the "patriotic activities" of the black hundreds, which began before the parliamentary elections, was merely a subterfuge for the organization of an anti-Jewish attack similar to that of last year.

Thanks, however, to Gen. Gregorieff, the prefect of Odessa, with whom the correspondent of the Associated Press discussed the local situation to-day, and who recently went to St. Petersburg in order personally to report the situation to the emperor, a disastrous anti-Jewish attack has been averted.

LEGISLATORS UNDER BAN.

House of Member With Smallpox Closes Boarding Houses to Them. Jefferson City, Mo., Feb. 22.—A member of the state legislature was today found to be suffering from smallpox.

The house of representatives, after the hall had been fumigated by the state board of health, adjourned until Monday because of the smallpox. A resolution adopted amid confusion and with half of the members in their seats, provided for the thorough fumigation of the capitol. The senate voted to sit a few hours this afternoon and then adjourn until Tuesday.

Many boarding house keepers have refused to allow their homes to be entered by legislators. In consequence Governor Fox has ordered the use of his mansion to legislators who are unable to obtain quarters elsewhere.

and stern parted, hurling nearly all on board into the sea.

The prince consort, after his first visit to the wreck, when he saw that there were still some survivors on board, declared:

"We won't return to the Hague before we save them; we must get them somehow."

A rumor that this determination had been fulfilled reached the waiting crowds this afternoon, and a pilot confirmed the glad tidings. There was then a wild rush of the people to the various points of vantage overlooking the harbor.

Long hours of waiting followed, and the thousands of people began to doubt the truth of the report that ten persons had been saved.

By this time the harbor was black with people. The roofs of all houses and sheds were crowded, while along the roadway skirting the sea there thronged hundreds of people, keeping pace with the rescue boat.

While the waiting preparation was being made at the shore a special force of police and soldiers had been brought into the Hook for duty, because the crowd had become so large that it threatened to become uncontrollable.

Ottawa, Feb. 22.—(Special.)—In reply, Mr. Bennett complained to-day that the Office Specialty Company of Neymarket and the Eclipse Company of Ottawa received enormous profits from the Dominion government to the exclusion of a rival company at Prescott.

London, Feb. 22.—The engagement of Miss Nellie Post, granddaughter of the late General James Wadsworth of Geneva, N.Y., to "Jack" Churchill, will be announced this season, it is expected. The attachment between the couple has existed for a considerable time, and only the lack of a sufficient fortune has stood in the way of their marriage.

Miss Post, who is now a guest of royalty in the capital of Sweden, is extremely popular in society. "Jack" Churchill is not so brusque in manner as his father, and more distinguished. Winston Churchill and being much better looking, though he is better liked. The younger Churchill was with Sir Ernest Cassell in Egypt for some time, but lately has been junior partner in Grenfell's financial firm in the city.

TOUR OF THE SPRINGBOKS. A Profit of Nearly \$300,000 Made by the Famous Footballers.

Capetown, Feb. 22.—The South African Rugby Board has adopted a resolution congratulating the Springboks on the results of the tour in the British Isles, and paying a tribute to Mr. Carden, the manager, who reported that the board's share of the gates was \$9618, exclusive of the England match, which would probably bring in \$2000. The profit to the board is estimated at \$6000.

Mr. Carden paid a tribute to British hospitality and the wonderful efficiency of control in Wales. He mentioned the Cardiff match, when he received a cheque, calculated to a penny, within an hour and a half after the game. He also presented to the board the ball given to him at Eton College.

Trains Running Late. The railways have not yet recovered from the shock to traffic caused by the heavy fall of snow of Wednesday night. The Grand Trunk London train, due at 10 p.m. last night, was 45 minutes late, and the Montreal, Buffalo and Detroit trains each 10 minutes behind. Delayed connections were responsible for the Midland train, scheduled to arrive at 9:10 p.m., not pulling in until 10:50 p.m.

ADMITS HE OWNS REVOLVER.

Charge of Murder Laid Against Partner of Dead Man.

Buffalo, Feb. 22.—Following an investigation by the district attorney into the death of Joseph Ross, a manufacturer, a charge of murder was tonight lodged against A. C. McGarry, a partner of the dead man. Ross was found dead in his office Tuesday afternoon with a bullet in his head. A revolver, which McGarry admits is his, was found beside Ross' body. McGarry told the district attorney that he loaned the revolver to Ross.

PROTEST TO LORD ELGIN.

Upper House of Newfoundland Legislature Condemns Modus Vivendi.

Hallifax, N. S., Feb. 22.—The legislative council, the upper house of the Newfoundland legislature, adopted by a vote of 11 to 2 an address to Lord Elgin, British secretary of state for the colonies, protesting against the modus vivendi last October between the British and American governments for the regulation of the herring fisheries on the west coast of the island.

WANT PREFERENCE EXTENSION.

Manufacturers Think Arrangements Should Affect All Industries.

The executive council of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association has recorded their disapproval of the extension of the Mutual preference to Australia, only in the commodities of agricultural implements, and three others of small import, but hold rather that all branches of industry should be concerned therein. Resolutions will probably be made to the government in this regard.

Boy Dies After Drink.

Belleville, Feb. 22.—Arthur Brough, only son of George W. Brough, died very suddenly under peculiarly painful circumstances. Arthur, who was ten years of age, was returning from school at noon, and when near home went into the house of Frank Dolan and asked for a drink, being apparently in a fainting condition. When he had taken a drink of water he fell to the ground and died in a few minutes. The little fellow had just recovered from an attack of fever, and his heart was weak.

Pension for Public Servants.

The quarterly board of Westmount-avenue Methodist Church on Thursday evening adopted a resolution declaring that the time has arrived when every Canadian contributing to the public welfare and having reached the age of 60 years, or if incapacitated before reaching that age, is entitled to a pension or annuity.

RIGHT PARTY MAKES GAINS IN RUSSIAN ELECTIONS

Barely 25 Members of Old Parliament Re-elected—Strength of Parties.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 22.—Yesterday's returns from the national elections show no change in the already established proportion of returned delegates. The Right continues to make fractional gains at the expense of the Constitutional Democrats.

ERRORISTS ROB POSTOFFICE

Mail Postmaster and Escape With Contents of Safe.

Warsaw, Russian Poland, Feb. 22.—The postoffice on Wapolina-street was attacked at noon today by a band of terrorists, who shot and killed the postmaster, two postal clerks and two soldiers guarding the place and wounded a score of bystanders. The terrorists robbed the safe of the cash and stamps and escaped in cab.

GIVE THE ACT! FAIR TRIAL PREMIER TELLS WINDSOR

No Reason to Apologize for the "Three-Fifths Clause" at Present.

There was no vacillation about Premier Whitney's speech to the big deputation of the Ontario Alliance yesterday. They asked for the abolition of the three-fifths clause in the local option election law, and Mr. Whitney frankly told them the law was on trial and he was not going to change it in the light of the facts before the government. It was necessary to the permanent of public opinion. He did not claim that it was absolutely necessary to the enforcement of the law. It worked both ways, and when the vote was for the liquor license the vote of the temperance people were as good as three others.

"We do not want such a provision," cried a delegate. "It does not matter whether you do or not; you have it there," was the premier's reply.

Several hundred members of the Alliance were present, and were introduced to Premier Whitney and Hon. J. D. A. Hanna by George F. Murter. The legislative chamber and the galleries were filled by the delegates.

They presented the following resolution, which was adopted: "That in the judgment of this convention the present requirement for the three-fifths vote to carry a licensing bill is contrary to justice, fair play, and the spirit of our institutions; and deprives municipalities of a right long enjoyed; and that this provision of the present liquor act should be once repealed."

Mr. Murter gave the government officials credit for good work, but he wanted the government to go a step further. He said that the government had done well in the past, but he wanted to see a change in the liquor law.

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PRESBYTERIAN MISSIONS SPECIAL APPEAL NEEDED

Owing to the Severe Winter in West, Contributions There Have Fallen Off.

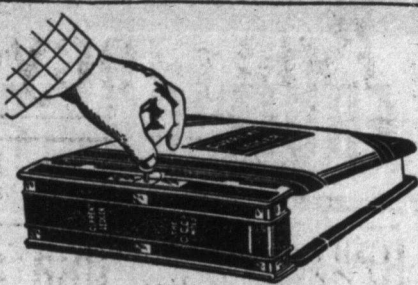
Rev. John Somerville, D.D., interim treasurer for the Presbyterian Church writes The World as follows:

A great many of our readers will be interested in knowing the state of the mission funds of the Presbyterian Church in Canada at this date, inasmuch as the church year closes on Feb. 28. It is of the utmost importance that congregational contributions be sent in at once, in order that the account included in this year's account. Many treasurers of congregations do not send the mission funds in their hands to the treasurer of the church until the very end of the month, but making all allowance for funds that may reasonably be expected to reach this office by Feb. 28, the indications are that some of the funds will be largely in arrears unless extra contributions are sent from individuals and congregations.

The home mission committee has sought to follow with the Gospel the incoming population that is settling in the mines and on the prairies of our new land. The shortage of the winter has double trouble. The shortage of cars during the autumn and winter hindered them from marketing their goods. The very severe weather this winter has blocked the railways, and funds to meet their necessities and fulfill their obligations to the church.

In many cases I fear our missionaries will not receive the amount of stipend promised by their congregations. If the home mission committee have to face a deficit of \$30,000 in their funds, as appears to be most likely, our missionaries may not receive more than 75 per cent. of the amount of salary that was promised them for the year. This would mean that their support as one does not like to contemplate. The foreign mission fund and the benevolent funds of the church, as well as the pinch of the country's prosperity, the Divine claim upon their substance, upon the fact that they are engaged in their missionary, benevolent and educational work. It is hoped that before Feb. 28 arrives, members of the church who have been receiving bountifully during the year from the church, will contribute to this matter to help and contribute to the maintenance of the maintenance of his cause.

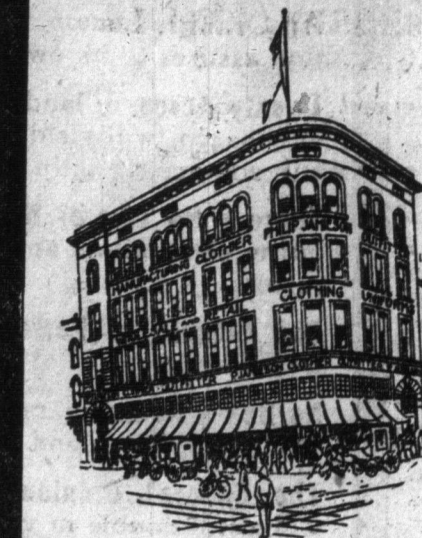

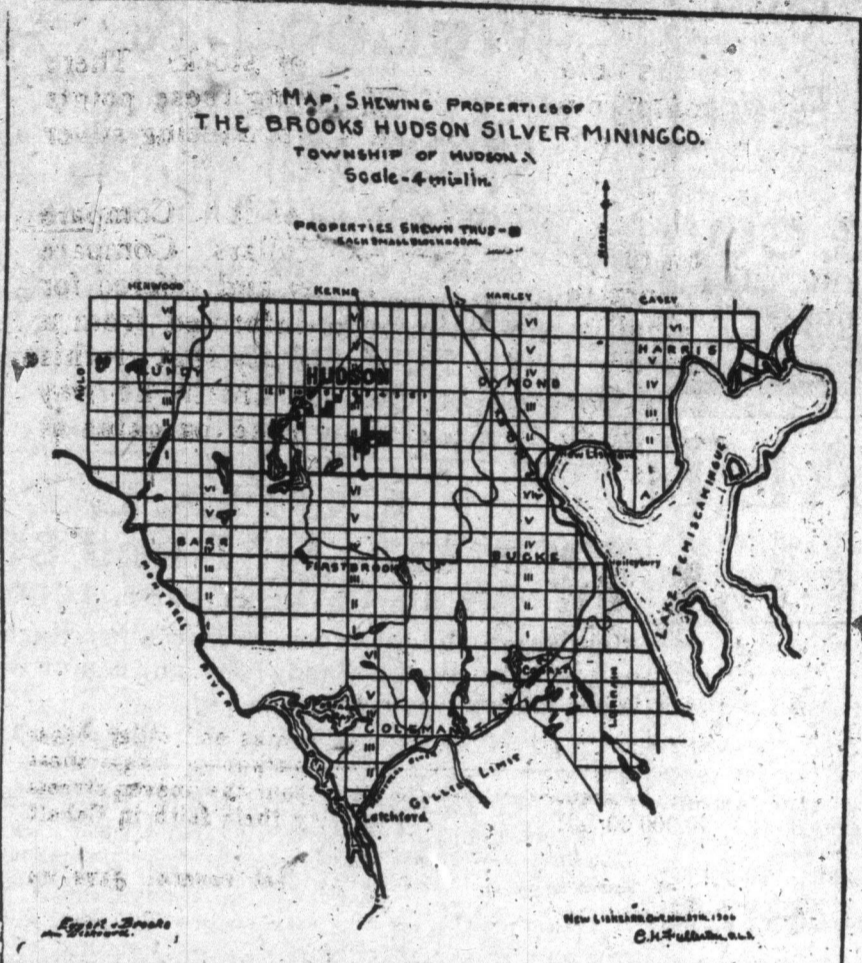

GOLD STORIES ARE FAKES SAYS PROF. W. G. MILLER

Only Traces of Gold Found at Cobalt, But Different Farther North.

Prof. W. G. Miller, the provincial geologist, returned yesterday from a three week stay on the Gillies government mining reservation, and the adjacent Cobalt district. He states that the stories about very rich gold discoveries in the Cobalt field are fakes, generally founded on iron pyrites. Traces of gold are found in some of the ores and it is, of course, extracted at the smelter to the extent of \$2, \$3 or \$4 a ton. This only applies to the Cobalt field as in the country further north gold is found in paying quantities in some deposits.

Prof. Miller said that nothing had occurred to change the views so far held as to the origin of the Cobalt deposits, and that he saw nothing to change his opinion as to the area of rich mineral, which covers about six square miles in Coleman. Next to silver the Cobalt deposits are the most valuable, the pound being paid for this ore 4.50.

The operating mines number about forty, he said, although every lot presented a prospect.

Precautions are being taken by the government to see that the mining law is properly enforced and to ensure the safety of laborers in the mines. He thought these were well handled, and the superintendents good men. Among them were graduates from Toronto University, Queen's, Royal Military College, McGill, California, Minnesota, Wisconsin and Pennsylvania.

On the government reservation the main shaft has been sunk 75 feet, and drifted over 300 feet, developing a rich vein in good shape. No shipping will be done until the Kerr Lake branch of the T. & N. O. Railway is built, which will permit the ore to be taken from the shaft head. The ore will probably equal anything yet shipped from Cobalt.

DETAILS ARE ARRANGED.

For the Concentrator Plant at Cobalt Central Mines.

New York, Feb. 22.—Cobalt Central is now one of the heaviest shippers from the Cobalt camp. The second car of ore was forwarded Thursday to Ricketts & Banks at Waverly, N. J., and Manager Elmer telegraphs that the next car will go forward about Feb. 1. This ore runs very high, many of the samples showing between 7000 and 12,000 ounces of silver to the ton.

Mr. W. Henry telegraphs that the Cobalt ore has heavy buyers in the Big Pete mine, and the knowledge that other parties are strongly interested were equally promising. H. W. Hardinge, consulting engineer of the company, returned yesterday from the camp where he has been arranging with Mr. Elmer the details of the installation of the concentrating plant now being erected by the Traylor Engineering Company. This plant will be in operation by May 1, and thereafter the company will be able to ship a great variety of its products as bar silver and high-grade concentrates, thus saving smelter and freight charges. Mr. Hardinge said yesterday that the ore strikes in the property were continuing all the earlier expectations.

MOVE THE TOWNSHIP.

Cobalters Beginning to Realize That This Must Come.

Cobalt, Feb. 22.—Several circumstances and developments have transpired recently in the Cobalt district which have brought the idea of moving the Town of Cobalt prominently before the people in the town, and as people have strongly improved with the great future of the camp, the idea gains in favor.

The fact that the Coniagas Company have begun the sinking of a shaft on one of the most valuable lots in the town, indicates that this company is soon to have a very profitable interest in the ore strikes. Cobalt in the summer will probably take the shape of trenching and digging all over their part of the town.

The owners of the town lots, which now constitute the property of the City of Cobalt Mining Company, were at first very wary at the idea of moving the town, but now they realize that their property is worth more as a mine than as a real estate. Many of these are moving in favor of the movement. From the fact that a sewerage system would be exceedingly costly, the people of Cobalt realize that something has to be done.

MAYOR KAISER PROTESTS PUBLIC OWNERSHIP ISSUE AGAINST DISCRIMINATION

Fare From Oshawa to Toronto is 3-1-2 Cents a Mile, West of Toronto 3 Cents.

Oshawa, Feb. 22.—(Special.)—Mayor Kaiser, backed by the town council and every merchant in town and encouraged by every citizen, has instituted a campaign against discrimination in passenger fares by the Grand Trunk Railway.

Winnipeg, Feb. 22.—(Special.)—Hon. F. W. G. Haultain has given his views to the Telegram on the important questions of public ownership of telephones and railways. The Telegram says: "In regard to the public ownership of telephones, Mr. Haultain finds himself in hearty agreement with the attitude of Manitoba on the one hand and Alberta on the other. Manitoba has done the spadework in this direction," he said, "and I am glad to see that the Alberta government is taking this very important question up in a practical spirit. Indeed, from the reports I have seen, it appears that the administration of Mr. Pendergast is prepared to go even further in the direction of government ownership and operation than Manitoba, where both parties appear to have agreed on the common principle. There is no doubt that a cheap and readily extended telephone service is available to the development of a community consisting largely of farmers, as it brings these into direct touch with their markets—a matter of prime consideration—and also brings about a hardly less valuable intercourse between the cities and country which is of mutual advantage in many ways. Under present conditions—that is control by our telephone systems by the Bell Company—prices and terms of operation are such as put farmers at a disadvantage entirely out of the field, while the cities are obliged to pay exorbitant rates for very unsatisfactory service."

QUESTIONS REGARDING THE HUDSON BAY RAILWAY

Questioned regarding the Hudson Bay Railway, which it is proposed shall establish a short ocean route between the wheat fields of the west and European markets, Mr. Haultain said that the provincial attitude and that of the provincial government were "together with the Liberals of Alberta in favor of a railway constructed jointly by the three western provinces. That we consider, in view of various reasons we have been somewhat of the best method of building this road, which the people in the west have agreed upon as necessary to the solution of the problem always confronting them regarding the marketing of their grain."

ATTRACTION FIELD.

London, Feb. 22.—(C.A.P.)—At the annual meeting of the English Association of American Bondholders the chairman said there was an attractive and unlimited field for investment in the Dominion of Canada. He pointed out that they were a surplus realized from the sale of land in the Canadian division of £3018, with a dividend of 5 per cent. on ordinary shares recommended.

ART EXHIBITION OPENED AWARDS AT HORSE SHOW
GENERAL STANDARD HIGH SOME CLASSES NOT FILLED

Ontario Society's Annual Display Splendid Quality of Animals, However, in Competition for Various Ribbons.

A large and brilliant assemblage attended last night at the opening of the annual exhibition of the Ontario Society of Artists at their art gallery, 165 West King-street. The president, F. M. Bell-Smith, Mrs. Knowles and F. McGilvray Knowles received the visitors. All the elite of Toronto society seemed to be present, and when His Honor Lieutenant-Governor Mortimer Clark arrived, the art rooms were crowded almost to a point of discomfort.

His honor in his address formally opening the exhibition, said he regretted that past observation and experience at functions of this kind, people of the Toronto art community were conspicuous on the first night, were the remainder of the exhibition. He hoped they would show more true to the art of the present and the future. He thought the Ontario Art Exhibition would do well to have itself represented first in one of the province, where people with the desire and ability to purchase pictures of the highest merit would have the opportunity of seeing them.

While there is no outstanding exhibit in the galleries, the general standard has yet been secure. There is much admiration for the work on exhibit, testifying to a keen appreciation of nature in its varied aspects, and to a conscientious and artistic treatment. The paucity of portraits and figure subjects testifies not so much to artistic deficiencies as to the nature of public taste and a lack of appreciation of the resources of Canadian life. For artists, like other men, have to live, and it is wrong to visit the limitations imposed by external conditions on the inherent quality of Canadian art.

It is inevitable that year after year the changes are rung on practically the same exhibitors. Yet when the exhibition of nature and real interpretation of life is shown, the impression cannot be resisted that a genuine progress is being made. Few of the exhibits fail to convey the idea that some aspect of nature has been seen and embodied. Many indeed, reveal the possession of the true artistic eye which reads into the commonplace subject their poetry and romance. Indeed, as the winter passes, the impression is inevitable that Canada will work out her own artistic destiny and make a place among the aesthetic nations of the world.
