2000 Addressed by Ministers.

This evening the 2000 strikers and a meeting to discuss the situation and the Ministers of Marine, Postmaster-General, Hon. Mr. Bicknell, M.P., and Hon. Mr. Pratt, M.P., were present. The Ministers spoke from the point of view of the country, but they offered no advice as to the men's acceptance of rejection. Mr. Bicknell, M.P., went further and told the men to go to work. Vice-president O'Neill of the union spoke calmly, and asked the men to consider their own situation as well as that of their families, which they did by unanimous consent to accept the proposed terms. Conference of strikers still on.

ASSENTED TO MANY BILLS

Large Amount of Routine Work Accomplished by Ontario's Busy Legislators.

GOOD ROADS BILL KNOCKED OUT

Measure Favored by Donald Sutherland Not Endorsed—Papers in Shannon Deal.

Second reading of several public and private bills engrossed the attention of the legislature yesterday. It was a dull day, not a breeze disturbing the quiet of the assembly.

Dr. Barr moved the second reading of his bill to amend the assessment act, which provides that township councils may pass bylaws to have the assessment made every two years. In many townships there was practically no change from year to year and a yearly assessment was unnecessary.

Mr. Gibson had no objection to the bill going to the committee, but he thought the inconvenience of having the assessment taken once a year would be offset by the inconvenience of having the assessment officer.

Mr. Lackner's bill to amend the municipal act provides for the appointment of commissioners to look after the sewage system. His bill to amend the municipal waterworks act provides that the commissioners hold office for two years. The same principle applies to his bill to amend the municipal light and heat act. The bills were read a second time.

Election of High School Trustees.

Dr. Barr moved the second reading of his bill to amend the high school act to provide for the election of trustees by ballot. The Minister of Education did not notice any great demand for the change, but the bill went on to the Legislation Committee.

Mr. Sutherland sought to have the act for the improvement of public highways amended by giving the supervision of the work to the county councils instead of the commissioner of Public Works. Mr. Pattullo, who has made a study of the good roads question, believed that the proposal would result in the money appropriated for county roads being frittered away, and some of the occupants of the government benches cried: "Hear, hear."

The Premier asked that the bill be withdrawn and promised that he would bring down a bill next week to improve the act.

Mr. Whitney complained of the operation of the present bill and said it would lead county councils into endless litigation.

Mr. Sutherland declined to withdraw the bill and it was declared lost on division.

Bills Read a First Time.

The following bills were read a first time: Mr. Gibson—To amend the Ontario Insurance Act.

Mr. Lackner—To incorporate the College of St. Jerome, Berlin.

Mr. Duff—An Act entitled the Hospital Compensation Act.

Mr. Auld—To amend the Street Railway Act.

(Caraculac).

These private bills passed their second reading: Respecting the Lindsay Public Library (Fox); respecting the city of London (Beck); respecting St. Paul's Church, Dunnville (Harcourt); respecting the village of Hainwood (Truax); respecting the Art Museum of Toronto (Foy); to change the boundaries of the village of Leithville (Harcourt); respecting the Elgin Loan and Savings Co. (Pattullo); to confirm bylaw 507 of the town of Niagara Falls (Gross); respecting the Lake Superior Power Co. and certain other companies (Connex); respecting the village of Fenelon Falls (Carnegie); respecting the municipality of Shanah (Connex); respecting the International Transit Co. (Connex); respecting the Thomas Street Railway (Macclarnin); respecting the town of Aurora (Davis).

Papers in Shannon Deal.

The House passed an order for a return of copies of awards made by the arbitrators between the Dominion and the provinces since the date of the last return, and a statement of the account between Ontario and the Dominion from Dec. 31, 1902 to Dec. 31, 1902 as settled by the counsel for the province and the Dominion; also, that papers, reports and correspondence with respect to limit in the township of Rutherford and unsurveyed lands adjacent to Shannon in 1902 from the year 1883, and subsequent thereto, be laid before the Public Accounts Committee, with power to enquire into the same as fully as in the case of accounts for 1902.

The Premier informed the House, in reply to Mr. Smyth, that there was no correspondence between members of the government and one John T. Linklater between June 1, 1884, and Jan. 1, 1903.

On Monday Mr. Carnegie will ask what amount of revenue was received from woods and forests in East Victoria during 1896-1901, 1901, and 1902.

Mr. Gibson has given notice of a bill to amend the assessment act.

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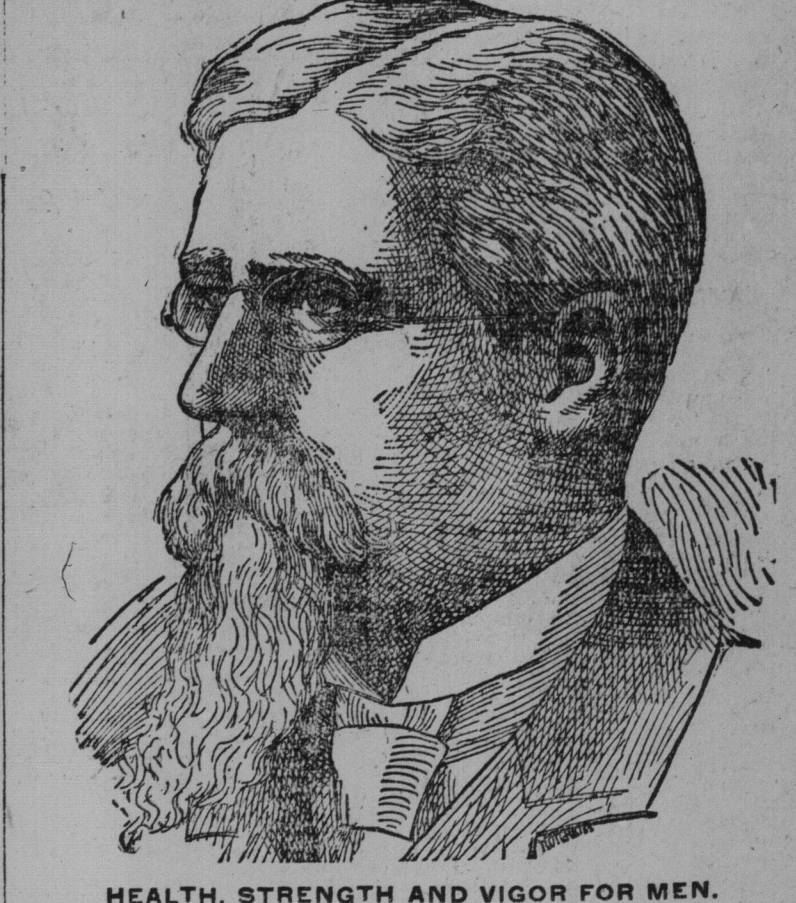

TRADE DISPUTES BILL KILLED IN PARLIAMENT

Imperial Government Refuses to Legalize Picketing—Royal Commission Will Investigate.

London, May 8.—The House of Commons to-day by 426 to 226 votes rejected the Trades Disputes Bill, intended to legalize peaceful picketing and alter the law affecting the liability of trades unions' funds. Premier Balfour and other ministers opposed the bill and promised that a royal commission shall be appointed to report into the whole position of trades unionism, as affected by court decisions in the recent Taff Vale and similar cases.

WANTS IT 40 MILES AWAY.

William Mackenzie Expresses His Opinion of the G.T.P. Project.

Montreal, May 8.—The Herald's Ottawa correspondent, treating of the Grand Trunk Pacific, says that the chief opposition to it should come from the Canadian Northern, because "its territory is chiefly affected by the route which has been announced as the one contemplated."

William Mackenzie, when asked what he thought of the announced route of the Grand Trunk Pacific from Quebec to North Bay and on to Winnipeg, and thence to Saskatoon and Battleford and the two lines to the Pacific, said: "The route is all right. But it should be a good one; it is ours," he said, with a smile. "The route indicated is exactly the one we are known to be working on at the present time. It is the one on which we have laid a good deal of the track."

Pulling a G. T. P. folder out, he called attention to the fact that the lines of the C. P. R., the lines of the Grand Trunk, the lines of the Intercolonial and of all the other important roads in the country were indicated. But the lines of the Canadian Northern did not appear.

"This may seem remarkable," he said, "but it would have been rather awkward to have put the Canadian Northern lines in, when they should appear there are indicated the projected lines of the Grand Trunk Pacific."

When asked what the attitude of the Canadian Northern would be, Mr. Mackenzie said: "All that we want done is for the policy announced by Minister Blair to be carried out. The Minister of Railways has said that it was the policy of the government to separate the main lines of road by from 40 to 50 miles. All that we ask is that the Grand Trunk Pacific be kept 40 miles away from us."

BECAUSE HE WORKED. Strikers Desert Comrade and He Shoots and Kills. Greenwich, Conn., May 8.—An Italian striker was shot to death by one of his fellow countrymen in a riot here today. A contractor's gang was excavating for a residence when twenty Italian strikers induced all but one to quit. Angered by his refusal, the strikers set upon him with clubs and stones. The man was driven slowly backward until he reached a pile of lumber. There he made a stand and drew a revolver. The strikers continued to advance and he fired. One of the assailants was hit in the stomach and died shortly afterwards. The strikers scattered, but six were arrested, together with the man who did the shooting. New York, May 8.—There was no cessation in the situation of the striking 15,000 excavators and rock men to-day. President Taft said the subway men might submit the question of hours to arbitration, but will accept nothing less than \$2 a day. Work was at a standstill to-day on most of the big buildings as the result of the refusal of the lumbermen and brick dealers to send out material until the teamsters shall have modified their demands. Glasgow, May 8.—The council of the Amalgamated Society of Engineers has notified the Clyde strikers that strike pay will not be allowed them, as the strike was declared contrary to the instructions of the council. Buffalo, May 8.—The strike of the journeymen tailors for an increase of wages, which has been in progress in this city for one month, was declared off to-day unconditionally. Anish—Brakeman Killed.
