Venerable Ang or Passes Away

Rev. Canon Sanson Dead, Aged 85—William Durrell Killed by Cutter on Jarvis St.

William Durrell, a well-known character in the city, and one of the oldest Orangemen in the city, was killed yesterday afternoon at Jarvis-street and Wilton-avenue. He attempted to cross the street, and in avoiding one rig, was knocked down by another. He received an ugly wound on the forehead, which caused his death. Whether he was struck by the shaft of the cutter or the horse's hoof is not known; either would have caused the injury. Deceased has lived for a number of years with Madame Mendon, a phenologist, at 2500 Ontario street. After the accident the body was taken into the residence of George Saunders, 387 Ontario-street, who lives opposite Madame Mendon. After the old man was knocked down, the driver of the rig whipped his horse and drove away at a rapid rate, without waiting to see the harm he had done. He is supposed to be Thomas McMullen of Eglinton-street.

Durrell was a picturesque figure. He was known by sight to thousands, although he did not know his name. His long gray beard and hair and red, classic features made many a person turn around and look at him the second time as they passed him on the street. He resembled very much the late Walt Whitman, the American poet.

An Enthusiastic Orangeman. He was an enthusiastic Orangeman and a member of Brunswick Lodge. He has not missed an Orange party in years. A back has always been provided for him in later years. As he rode along he would carry a bunch of orange slices. Of all the days in the year, the 12th of July was his day for him.

Mr. Durrell was born at St. Helier's, Jersey, Channel Islands, where his two sisters are still living. They were notified of his death by cablegram. He had no relatives in this country, as far as is known. He was an expert in teaching French. He had to give up his pupils some time ago because of a cataract in one eye. A short time ago he was treated for this in the St. Michael's Hospital, and was to have returned to that institution today.

Mr. Durrell was notified and issued a warrant for an inquest, also up to 10 o'clock last night the coroner had not seen the body. Police were then taken to the remains to the undertaker's, but were unable to go, owing to the coroner's order. The body was lying in the house of a stranger, who took it in out of kindness, rather than to take it to the undertaker. The accident happened at 6 o'clock.

Edicated in Paris. The deceased was familiarly called "Daddy" Durrell. Born in Jersey Island, eighty-four years ago, he spent his early years until about 20 years of age, when he went to Paris University, where he learned French, Italian, German, and having English as his native tongue, became an exceedingly good linguist. He was afterwards a professor's chair, which he accepted and lived in it for many years. He finally returned to Jersey and resumed his father's business. He was a very popular man, and his death was a great loss to the community.

When Mr. Durrell was about 55 years of age, his wife having died, he and his son came to America. On his arrival in Toronto, one of the first men he met was the late Orangeman, who was attached to Lodge 781. Soon after his arrival he was made president of the lodge. He was a very active member, and his death was a great loss to the community.

For the last couple of years he has been very infirm and bedridden. He was continually walking around on one end of the year to the other body in the morning.

He passed for a great many pictures, and one is to be seen in the Normal School, where it is hung on the wall just as an example of the grand old painting and very well done.

OLDEST CERGYMAN DEAD. Canon Alexander Sanson, the veteran and venerable rector of Little Trinity church, who has been steadily failing during the past three weeks, died at his home last evening at 8 o'clock. His end was quiet, and after a brief period of consciousness, he peacefully passed away. The remains of the family who number three sons and one daughter—Norman of Banff, John of Toronto, Dr. Robert Sanson of Calgary and Mrs. Canon Greese of Orillia. The funeral will be held on Monday, and interment will take place in St. James' Cemetery. It is expected that the body will lie in state in Trinity Church for a few hours before the funeral. Memorial services will be held in the church tomorrow. He passed his 88th birthday on Wednesday last, and in 1902 celebrated his golden jubilee. He was one of the oldest, if not the oldest, Anglican clergyman in Canada.

A year later he became a priest and was appointed to the parish at St. John's Church, York Mills. During a part of the ten years of his ministry at St. John's, he was in charge of St. Paul's, on Bloor-street. Plan to Entangle Japan In Russian Inigue Web

Russia's Reply Proposes to Transfer Seat of Negotiations to St. Petersburg.

London, Jan. 8.—According to The Daily Mail's Tokyo correspondent the Russian reply proposes among other things to transfer the seat of negotiations to St. Petersburg, and the Japanese newspapers denounce this as a manoeuvre to entangle Japan in the web of Russian intrigue. The correspondent adds that riots at Chollado, Korea, are increasing, and that the officers of the Japanese steamer Shini Maru, which left Port Arthur Jan. 4, report that there were 80 warships and three first-class torpedo boats inside and five battleships outside the harbor. Dredging was proceeding night and day in the western portion of the harbor. Owing to the breakdown the port is almost unobtainable.

Emperor of Korea Vacillating. The correspondent says that the Emperor of Korea is vacillating and unable to adopt a definite policy. The Emperor is greatly reassured by the receipt of a memorial from the Korean officials, declaring that there is no danger of war, and that the Japanese are preparing to return to Korea.

Japanese Emperor Attended. Other telegrams to The Daily Mail state that the Emperor of Korea is expected to assemble to-day at the Imperial Palace. The Emperor attended by his staff and accompanied by his family and members of the foreign legations held a brilliant New Year's review at the garrison yesterday morning in the Aeyama parade at Tokyo.

HEARS OF A BATTLE. London, Jan. 8.—The correspondent of The Daily Express at Kobe sends a telegram to the effect that a collision between the Russian and the Japanese fleets has taken place near the Straits of Tsushima, in the Straits of Korea, about midway between Coricia and Kishida.

TO CONTINUE NEGOTIATIONS. Tokyo, Jan. 8.—The Japanese government has practically determined to continue negotiations. It is dissatisfied with the Russian terms, but does not desire to break off negotiations, and will make another effort to secure their modification before resorting to force. It is anticipated that the discussion will continue a few weeks, during which interim a breach of the ice is very improbable.

LIBERAL WON FROM UNIONIST. London, Jan. 8.—The by-election in the Ashburton or Middle division of Devonshire yesterday to fill the Liberal vacancy in the House of Commons resulted in the return of the Liberal candidate, H. T. Evans, by a majority of 1476 over the Unionist candidate, General Sir Richard B. Haldane. The result is attributed to opposition to Chamberlain's tariff proposals.

TO KEEP YANKEE HORSES OUT. Ottawa, Jan. 8.—A deputation of horsemen said the Premier, the Minister of Finance, and the Minister of Customs had afternoon tea at the Hotel Wellington. The deputation was led by a man named H. W. Bole in Winnipeg.

TOOTHACHE KILLS GIRL. Pottsville, Pa., Jan. 8.—After participating in a school entertainment, Ethel M. Flail of this place, aged 8 years, was seized with violent toothache. All efforts to relieve the pain failed, and the brain was finally affected, and to-day the girl died. The case is without a parallel in the vicinity.

DOCTOR ANGLIN POISONED. Kingston, Jan. 8.—Dr. Anglin contracted blood poisoning following an operation on a patient. The doctors to-night decided that amputation was necessary in his case. The middle finger of the right hand was removed. His condition now is quite grave.

U. S. TO REPRESENT PANAMA. Paris, Jan. 8.—All United States consuls in Europe are being recalled to represent Panama in all consular matters.
