scenes of his early days in the Old Country. After a year's rest he recommenced his labors at St. John's, but had scarcely begun when he contracted smallpox, which was prevalent, and for a time his friends gave up all hope of his recovery.

A strong constitution, however, pulled him through, and on July 11, 1890, he was appointed to Trinity. His parish was a big one, extending from the waterfront to Bloor and from Sherbourne to the city limits, then called Leslieville. This territory is now largely populated as to be in size with many a favored clergyman. In 1890 he was made canon and in 1902 he celebrated his jubilee as rector of Trinity. This unique event attracted a

great deal of interest in church circles. A short time ago some of his parishioners offered to secure assistance for him in his clerical duties and to give the canon a handsome salary for the rest of his life, but the veteran clergyman refused to accept of such an attempt to relieve him of his duties. Up until the time of his last illness he performed his church work with vigor and conducted the work of the parish with an ability surprising in so old a man.

Canon Sampson was the soul of generosity and gentleness and those who knew his death mourned his country are numbered by the thousands.

SUSPENDED FOR NAZING.

Six Sophomores of Middletown, Conn., College Put Out.

Middletown, Conn., Jan. 8.—President Raymond of the Wesleyan University tonight suspended six members of the sophomore class until the mid-year examinations in February, and ordered them to leave town by Saturday night.

The students are charged with being connected with the hazing of a fellow-student last month.

The trouble has its beginning in the attempt of a number of sophomores to hazing Frank B. Taylor of Cambridge, Mass., Dec. 16. He prevented their first attempt to enter his room by presenting a revolver, but they returned later. Taylor fought his way thru the crowd with a screw driver and struck Howard Richards of New Haven over the eye, causing the loss of the sight of the eye. Learning of the affair, the faculty took summary action.

The students drew up resolutions disapproving the action of the faculty, on the ground that they were out of the class was unjust, there having been many more students involved in the hazing of Taylor than Raymond says the incident is not closed.

CRANKS AFTER ROOSEVELT.

Washington, Jan. 8.—Two cranks were arrested to-day, one of them at the White House and the other just after he had announced his intention of appealing to President Roosevelt for protection. The prisoners, David Benson Zentner and Arthur H. Harris, the latter a negro, were taken to No. 1 precinct police station and after examination by Police Surgeon Vale and Magistrate Benson were committed to St. Elizabeth's Asylum. Both were taken to that institution this evening.

HEAD OF NEW SCOTLAND YARD.

London, Jan. 8.—Chief Detective Inspector Quinn, who has just succeeded Superintendent Melville as head of the special branch of the New Scotland Yard, in London, is like his predecessor, an Irishman, and it is upon his shoulders that will rest for some years, to come the responsibility of watching over the safety, not merely of England's King and Queen, but also of the foreign sovereigns who may happen to visit the United Kingdom. The new superintendent has already spent nearly a quarter of a century in the police, had for a number of years been the principal lieutenant of Melville and by his services on both sides of the Atlantic, by his intuition, initiative and pluck has shown himself thoroughly well qualified to take Melville's place.

Best of Quebec's Liquor is Pur-

chased Illegally.

Montreal, Que., Jan. 8.—The Licensed

Victuallers' Association of Montreal in

answer to the recent appeal of Arch-

bishop Bruchet to the Police Com-

mittee for better enforcement of the

laws relating to the liquor traffic, has

blamed for the many evils resulting

therefrom on the illegal sale of liquors

at retail establishments. It

claimed that licensed vendors do not

sell more than one-eighth of the liquor

consumed.

CANADA AND THE TARIFF.

New York Tribune: Frank W.

Lamplough, a hardware importer and

manufacturer in Montreal, sent at the Plaza

a day or two ago, said: "The matter

in which the merchants and manufac-

turers in Canada are just now so

deeply interested is the agitation for

higher tariffs. The Conservatives, who

have been out of the power for four

years, are advocating the advance-

ment of the tariff on all imports. They

are contending for an increase all

along the line of about 50 per cent. on

the present duties, so that articles on

which there is a present tariff of 45

per cent. would be scheduled at 65

per cent., and as an appeal to patri-

otism and love of Mother Country they

propose a preferential in favor of Eng-

land of 40 per cent. as against 35

per cent., the present advantage ac-

cording to England. Of course, the

manufacturers see an advantage in the

proposals, for while the 40 per

cent. preferential may look attractive

at first, it is unthinking. It is more

neutralized by the advance in the

tariff. The result will be to reduce the

importations from England and mini-

mize the quantity of imports from

Germany and Austria. The Liberals are

pointing to the conditions in the United

States, where they contend that the

control of manufacturing indus-

tries has unfavorably affected the

laboring classes. I think the Liberal

policy will be sustained at the next election, and

that instead of the general advance in

tariff rates there will be a moderate

increase in some items."
