FIX THE RESPONSIBILITY

Mr. McGoldrick is justified in his desire to place the blame where the blame belongs in connection with this affair of preparing the site for the new wharf on the west side. The board of works, the newspapers and the public generally have been misled into believing that this work would have been completed at least by the present time, and many weeks ago there seemed a prospect that the sinking of the first-crib would be an accomplished fact long before this date.

IS HALIFAX AFRAID

The Times quotes on another page the hysterical outcry of the Halifax Herald about the proposal to have the Empire steamers land their mails at St. John. This paper published yesterday the fierce resolutions adopted by a public meeting in Halifax.

But perhaps Halifax has doubts. Possibly it fears that in such a contest St. John would win, just as it has done in the case of the export freight business.

But the question is not one between Halifax and St. John. It concerns the whole of Canada. Is St. John the most desirable mail port? Can the C. P. R. steamer prove that it is? If not, the claim of Halifax is established, if so the most favorable route be chosen.

OSBORNE WITH JEROME

The remarks made by ex-Mayor Osborne at the Albany conference of anti-Hearst Democrats a couple of weeks ago have a fresh significance since the Democratic convention has endorsed Hearst.

For reasons which it is unnecessary to specify, but the results of which are painfully obvious, the Democratic party in this state has not of late years commended itself to a majority of the voters.

convention met which nominated Hearst. At that convention Mr. Osborne spoke again, and these are his latest words: "Out of the trail of your dishonor a new democracy will arise in which you will have no part."

In his Albany speech Mr. Osborne laid down such a platform as he believed the Democratic party should present, and laid down this rule concerning candidates: "Upon such a platform it must place in nomination men who are genuine Democrats—men capable of leadership, but not ambitious of being bosses—men who are their own masters, controlled neither by corporate influences nor by small cliques of ambitious and unscrupulous politicians, men honest but not self-seeking, progressive and yet not demagogues—in short, candidates who will themselves be a guarantee of the pledges made in the platform, whose characters, intellectual and moral, will bear the searching investigation of a heated political campaign."

The statement that the board of works had expended this year over \$45,000 led the mayor last evening to enquire when the department would spend some money on the streets. He was unable to see that any profitable expenditure had thus far been made.

A tract of land over fifty miles square in the heart of New Brunswick is to be converted into a game preserve. So far as the new project makes for forest and game preservation it will be of benefit. There may be problems, but they are of the future.

Suppose that a test of the route via Halifax and the route via St. John should show that mail-train passengers for the Canadian west and the Orient can be forwarded quicker through this port than through any other in the winter—what then?—Daily Telegraph.

JAPANESE IMMIGRATION

The problem of dealing with an influx of Japanese, if it were threatened in order to meet the views of the labor unions would be a very difficult one for the Dominion government. The legislative assembly has on several occasions announced the right—and apparently with the general concurrence of the electorate—to exclude Japanese, but the Dominion government has resolutely set its face against the proposal and promptly disallowed the legislation, as being ultra vires and also as being opposed to the policy and interests of the Dominion and Imperial governments.

TURBINERS LIKELY TO COME

Ottawa, Sept. 27.—(Special)—The department of trade and commerce informed your correspondent today that the question of changing the Allan line contract in regard to sailings from St. John was not before it in any shape whatever. They heard nothing of it. As already stated matters of this kind are not discussed and disposed of in the absence of the ministers concerned.

ALLAN TURBINERS BROKE ALL RECORDS

(Montreal Witness). According to a statement given out by George Hanna, of the Allan line, this season's passenger traffic from the port of Montreal has eclipsed all previous records. The increase has been especially notable in the case of the two royal mail turbiners, the Victorian and Virginian. Each of these vessels up to the present made six round trips from March 23, beginning with the Virginian's sailing on that date. On these six voyages the Virginian carried a total of 11,288 passengers divided as follows: Saloon, 1,866; second cabin, 3,040; third cabin, 6,382. Her sister ship, the Victorian, although not carrying so many first class passengers, excelled in those of the second class. On her six trips she carried altogether 10,621 passengers, classed as follows: Saloon, 1,533; second cabin, 3,097; third cabin, 6,021. Combining the numbers on both vessels the figures are 3,389 first, 6,100 second, and 12,538 third class passengers.

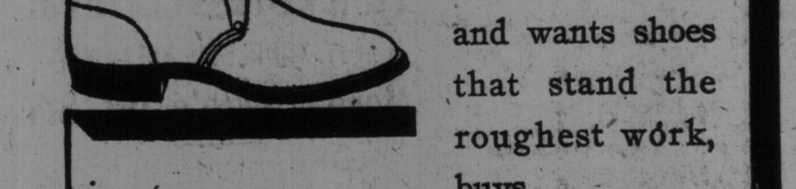

WOODMEN OF THE WORLD AND INSURANCE INQUIRY

Toronto, Sept. 27.—Proceedings before the insurance commission today were tame, after the striking disclosures of the recent sessions. The Woodmen of the World were under investigation as a result of interest manifested in the evidence of W. G. Fitzgerald, head clerk of the institution. Before proceeding with the business of the day, Mr. Shepley called attention to the fact that an erroneous impression had been created as to the amount of money advanced to the extent of \$750,000 from investments in land and lumber. He explained that the statement was put simply for the purpose of showing the mercenary nature of the investments from a financial standpoint. The profits from all the investments enumerated, however, will not accrue to the I. O. F. as they were not interested directly in some of the lands.

CHILDREN'S DAY

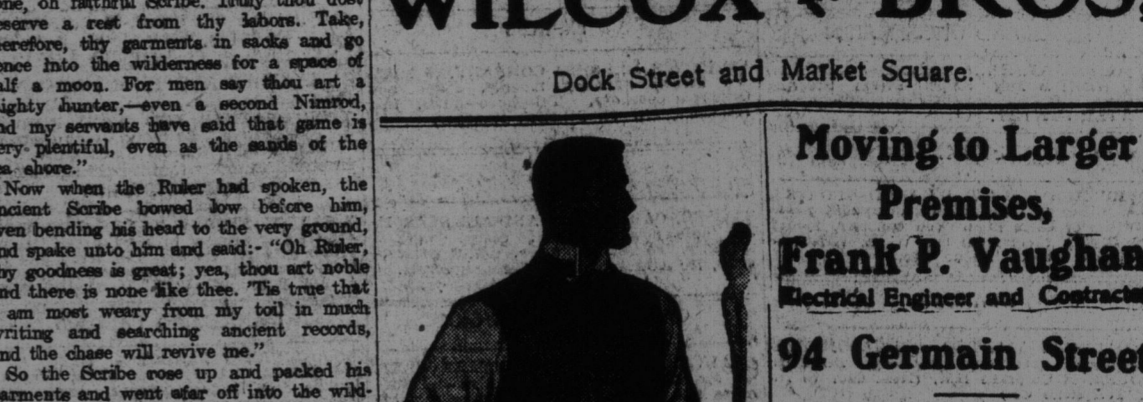

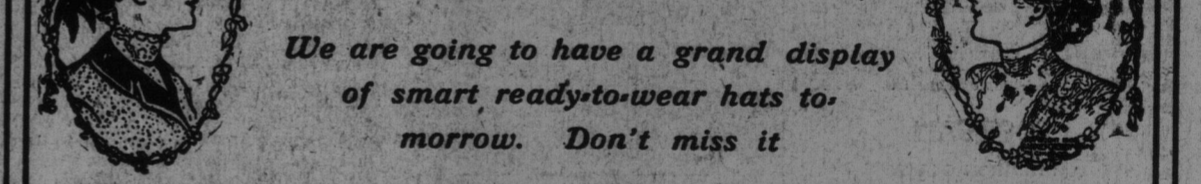
