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## REPORT

Presented at the Annual Meeting, 11th December,

1887.

For the third time the printed Report of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul within the circumscription of the Particular Council of Ottawa is presented to the members. year which closed on the 30th September last was one which in many respects gave great cause for sorrow, though on the whole it supplied reasons for gratitude to Almighty God. The grounds for regret are personal - those for

rejoicing are general.

At the last annual meeting, the absence of the beloved and esteemed President, Mr. John A. MacCabe, in consequence of sudden and dangerous illness, was a subject of sorrow to every member, but few then anticipated the announcement which he made at the following quarterly meeting of his intended resignation. The intention was, however, carried out, and Mr. T. J. Richardson was chosen by the Council to succeed Mr. MacCabe. It is not our place, as members of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, to indulge in terms of eulogy, but it may be permitted to say that not one member failed to recognise the great services Mr. Mac-Cabe had rendered to the Society, his untiring energy and conspicuous prudence, or to sincerely regret the loss of a man so eminently fitted to stand at the head of the Society's affairs.

Unhappily, Mr. MacCabe's retirement from office was the precursor of other changes. By death or by resignation, four who were members of the Particular Council last year have! ceased to assist at its consultations. On the other hand, however, additions have been made of officers who possess the confidence of their brethren. Mr. James Latchford, so long Vice-President and President of St. Patrick's Conference, has been succeeded in the latter capacity by Mr. John Gorman; Mr. Têtu is followed by Mr. H. Casgrain as Vice-President of St. Joseph's; Mr. Richardson is replaced as Secretary of the Council by Mr. E. L. Sanders, and Mr. J. B. Lynch has been appointed Treasurer instead of Mr. Burns. In the Conferences outside the city, the late Mr. Henry Crilly, President of St. Stephen's Conference, Chelsea, has been followed by Mr. James Hogan, formerly Treasurer of that Conference, and quite recently Mr. Michael Gorman has retired from the Presidency of St. Patrick's, Pembroke, in favour of Mr. Michael Howe.

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In consequence of the brothers having, so shortly before, taken part in the Jubilee exercises of 1886, the usual retreat before the last annual meeting was dispensed with. The attendance at the four general communions and meetings was larger than in any previous year, and the increase in membership, receipts and work has been very marked. No less than 102

new members have been admitted during the year, of whom 98 were within the city of Ottawa, and, though 30 names have been struck from the Roll, it is to be observed that two thirds of this number were those of members who had for some time previously ceased to attend the meetings of the Conference to which they nominally belonged. The net increase in membership is 72 in the whole circumscription, or 70 in Ottawa itself.

Of this number, 44 are members of the two new Conferences which have been established during the year, and whose letters of aggregation are shortly expected from the Council-General in Paris, to which they have been recommended by the Superior Council of Canada. The first of these was the Conference of St. Bridget, which was organised in March last in the parish of Ste. Anne, where there had previously been an exclusively French Conference, with the approval and blessing of His Grace the Archbishop, and the cordial cooperation of the Parish Priest, the Rev. Father Prud homme. This Conference has throughout shown its thorough appreciation of the Rule, and its determination to be guided by it alone.

The other new Conference was to a certain extent an experiment. At the General Assembly held in Washington in June, 1886, great stress was laid upon the advantages which had been found to result from the establishment of Aspirant Conferences, composed of youths and young men to whom suitable works were confided and from whom in due course the ranks of

the senior Conferences were recruited. On the 8th of May, at the request of the Rev. Father Whelan, the Particular Council met a selected number of proposed members in the basement of St. Patrick's Church, and instituted the Junior Conference of St. Patrick, which is the pioneer of its kind in Canada. According to the plan adopted elsewhere, the President and Vice President of this Conference are selected by the Council from the members of the senior body, thus ensuring the proper connection of the two and preventing any possible friction. The works to which the attention of our young brothers has been chiefly directed have been the reading of prayers and preservation of order at the children's Mass, the preparation of children who have left school for First Communion and Confirmation, and the care of the free lending library of the parish. So far, the experiment has proved successful, and no doubt the winter will afford still further opportunities for the development of the energies of the new brothers of St. Vincent de Paul. They will be particularly suited to assist in the work of School Patronage, and in fact have already done something in that direction.

It has been often observed that the members of our Conferences lose interest in the Society unless they are employed. With this in view, two Special Works have been set on foot, one of which has done good work during the summer, as the other will doubtless find plenty of occupation in the winter and spring. It was urged

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by Father Riordan of Castle Garden, New York, at the Washington Assembly, that the Conferences of St. Vincent should take steps to watch over the immigrants from the old land, who arrived here as total strangers, without friends, and open to all the temptations to which the homeless and unprotected are exposed. A board of five members was constituted to undertake this charitable and patriotic duty, with the assistance of other brothers, and the report which is appended shows that they were able to do some good. Every member of the Society should consider it a duty to solicit subscriptions for this Special Work, which must commend itself to any one imbued with the true spirit of Christian charity.

Another very important work is that ordinarily designated the Patronage of Schools. We have the schools where Catholic education is given to our children, but there are some of our young ones who do not attend them, either through the neglect of their parents or their inability to purchase the necessary books or clothing. To take special direction of this matter, assisted by other members, another Board of five was formed, and though, naturally, it has had but little to do during the summer, it will find enough occupation in the winter season to demand all possible assistance from the brothers of each Conference as well as from charitable outsiders, who might easily be induced to obtain the advantages granted to benefactors of the Society.

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There are hopes that, before next spring, arrangements may be made, with the assistance of our brothers at Pembroke and Almonte, to protect from the harpies who now devour them those unfortunate victims who return from the shanties at that season of the year. The importance of this work cannot be exaggerated, but it demands much consideration and would be more certain of success if our brothers of the French Council could be induced to unite with us in carrying it into effect.

There is every prospect of a new Conference being shortly formed at Billings' Bridge, and probably one at Renfrew. The Conference which was established at Arnprior has not been heard from for some time past, and we have no information whether it has been aggregated or

Every member of our Conferences will learn with sincere pleasure and gratitude that His Grace the Archbishop, who has always been our protector and patron, has this year consented to accept the title of President of Honour of the Council and Conferences of the diocese.

The sacerdotal Jubilee of our Holy Father Pope Leo XIII has aroused the enthusiasm of the whole Catholic world, and of none of his faithful children more than the members of the Society which he has so blessed and honoured with his signal approbation. The members of the Conferences in this district were appealed to for contributions to the fund which our Society designs to present to His Holiness next month, and the result was that the following

amounts were subscribed by the members of the Conferences named:—Our Lady, \$24.25; St. Joseph \$33.25; St. Patrick, \$16.10; St. Bridget, \$6.75; Junior St. Patrick, \$3.50; St. Patrick, Pembroke, \$13.00. The Conferences of St. Stephen, Chelsea, and St. Mary, Almonte, forwarded their subcriptions directly to Quebec, but apart from them the members of the Society in this circumscription placed the sum of \$96.85 in the hands of the Superior Council to be torwarded to Paris for presentation to our Holy Father. Mr. Hamel, the President, in acknowledging the receipt of this amount, expressed the desire that the members should be thanked for their generosity.

The appended reports show that both receipts and disbursements have largely increased over those of last year, and only in one Conference—that of St. Joseph—has the revenue been less

than the expenditure.

The death list is a large one, and contains an unusual proportion of officers. The President of the Chelsea Conference, the Vice-President of St. Joseph's, and the Secretary of Our Lady's, besides three active members, have passed from us; and in addition to these, whose names are recorded on a subsequent page, the memory of the great Assembly in Washington last year is so green in the minds of all who were present as to justify a request to our Brothers here to pray for the soul of John Bingham, Secretary of the Washington Particular Council. In every case when it was practicable, a considerable number of members assembled at the

house of the deceased brother in this city, and recited the Rosary, besides assisting at the funeral. The Mass of Requiem for the souls of departed members was sung in St. Patrick's Church on the Tuesday following the second

Sunday after Easter.

The usual detailed Reports of the Particular Council and the several Conferences are appended. They show excellent results for the year past, and should stimulate all our members to renewed exertions for the future, for their own spiritual benefit and to promote the temporal and spiritual welfare of God's poor.

The Brothers of this very interesting and promising Conference are chiefiy occupied in reading prayers and keeping order at the children's Mass every Sunday, for which duty four are detailed each week; in assisting to prepare children who have left school for First Communion and Confirmation; and in taking care of the free lending library of the Parish. They have provided books for some of the children who were about to receive the Blessed Sacrament, and hold themselves ready to assist in carrying out the objects of the newly established Boards for the Patronage of Schools and the Protection of Immigrants, as well as to accompany the members of the senior Conference of St. Patrick, whenever they are called upon, to visit the poor.

#### SPECIAL WORKS.

#### Protection of Immigrants.

This Board consists of five members, one nominated by each of the Conferences of Our Lady, St. Patrick, St. Joseph and St. Bridget, and a President appointed by the President of the Particular Council. The following form the Board :- President. P. Brankin; Our Lady's, J. Mullin; St. Patrick's, J. A. J. McKenna; St. Joseph's, Martin Battle; St. Bridget's, T. During the summer, attention Ainsbrough. has been paid to six immigrants, four of whom were pecuniarily assisted. The class which the Board was called on to help was not, as a rule, a desirable one, consisting of boys of Irish parentage sent out to Canada from English refuges without any provision having been made in advance to secure them homes or employment. Those, however, who were willing to engage in agricultural pursuits, were easily disposed of. The others it was very difficult to deal with, and some of them appeared likely to turn out badly. Of a very different type was one young man of education, who was pleased to accept any decent position which offered, became an excellent member of our Society, and refunded at the earliest opportunity a portion of the Board's expenditure. A sum of \$13.00 is still held subject to the application of three boys, it being the balance of the amount sent to the Ottawa Immigration Agent for them. Two of them were looked after for some time by the Board, employment was found

for one of them, another having obtained a position for himself, but the third, after leaving two or three places in which he was tried, disappeared altogether. One lad who was subject to fits, and therefore unable to remain employed, was sent back to London. The Hon. John Carling, Minister of Agriculture, was good enough to give him a free passage to Liverpool, and the Board sent \$10.00 to Mr. Dyke, the Government Immigration Agent at that port, to defray further expenses. Of this sum, Mr. Dyke returned \$6.65. Another boy and a female domestic desired to be sent back, but the Board could find no reason for expending money upon either of them, as they were quite able, though not willing, to work. The boy was, however, boarded for two weeks. labour which has devolved upon the Board during this year has not been very heavy, but it has been sufficient to show that its formation was desirable.

# School Patronage,

This Board was organized in May last and is, composed of five members-one chosen by each of the four City Conferences and a President, nominated by the President of the Particular Council. The schools having closed the following month, very little work engaged the attention of the Board during the summer season. Several meetings were held, however, and a scheme devised to effectively and thoroughly accomplish the objects for which the Board was instituted. Undoubtedly, a large number of children, either through parental negligence or a lack of suitable clothing and text books, fail, to attend school. Such cases as these will have the earnest and unremitting attention of the Board. It is confidently believed that the next, Annual Report will show an increased attendance at our Catholic schools through the instrumentality of the Board.
