Allies Resume Attacks Upon Turkish Positions

Sensible Progress on Gallipoli Peninsula With Heavy Losses by Turks—Forts Bombarded and Severely Damaged—Russian Victory in the Caucasus

Paris, Aug. 10.—The allied forces have resumed their attacks upon the Turkish positions at the Dardanelles with great vigor, during the last two days, and have made sensible progress on the Gallipoli peninsula, according to a Havas despatch received from Athens. The Turkish losses have been heavy. Simultaneously the allied fleet bombarded the Turkish positions on the Dardanelles, inflicting severe damage upon their defense works.

"BRITISH FLEET SAVED THE WORLD" FOR MEXICAN PACIFICATION

Tribute by French Minister of Marine to England's Sea Dogs—Good Works For Army Also

London, Aug. 10.—The Daily Express publishes an interview with M. Agucner, the French minister of marine, who said that the British fleet saved the world from destruction, by the bombardment of the Turkish positions on the Dardanelles, during the last two days, and have made sensible progress on the Gallipoli peninsula, according to a Havas despatch received from Athens.

DEFINITE PROGRAMME AGREED UPON BY U. S. OFFICIALS FOR PAN-AMERICAN CONFERENCE TOMORROW

Washington, Aug. 10.—With a definite programme for the pacification of Mexico agreed upon, administration officials today were ready for the resumption of the Pan-American conference in New York tomorrow. At that time the plan will be taken up for formal ratification. Secretary of State Lansing, in an announcement said that an agreement had been reached with the conference adjourned, last Friday, and that a recess was taken that he might consult with President Wilson, regarding it.

London, Aug. 10.—Germany will renew her offers of a separate peace to Russia, according to the Daily Mail, but the proposals will meet the same fate as the others already made.

BERLIN NOT SO CHERFUL NOW

Rotterdam, Aug. 10.—(Correspondent of Daily News)—The tone of the comment by Berlin newspapers on the fall of Warsaw has completely changed, since the first announcement of the German victory. The public is now reminded that the taking of the Polish capital is no decisive military event. The "Vossische Zeitung" says: "A great stride nearer peace, which still lies far distant, is the capitulation of Warsaw, but no fortress, not even Paris, can longer be looked upon as the final object of the military operations."

65,000 GERMAN LOSSES

Geneva, Switzerland, Aug. 10.—A despatch to the Tribune from Innsbruck, Austria, says that in the recent fighting along the section of the eastern front, running from the Pissa River to Ostrov, northeast of Warsaw, the Germans lost 65,000 men in killed or wounded, but succeeded in capturing the principal fortified positions of the Russians.

(Continued from page 1.) anchored there until five in the morning when they started down river, followed by the Herschel with the 6th German Spy on Board. "Of the Grand Banks a dense fog came up and for three days we made very little headway. Great care was taken to keep all portholes covered, and no one was allowed to smoke on deck. On Tuesday night one of the guards noticed a porthole open after dark and had examined and found them all closed a short time before. He decided to investigate, and hiding behind some baggage, waited for fifteen minutes. Hearing a stern door open, he watched and saw a civilian appear at the porthole and flash an electric lamp. He immediately arrested him, and when searched papers and a Morse code were found on him. I never learned what the papers were, but he and another who was his mate were under arrest. He is a German. "There are 24 so-called merchant workers on board returning to England to work on war supplies. Their way is very hard. Any spy caught on an ship is sent to the gallows. We have about two hundred on all the time. In my tour as orderly officer of the day, I have seen an officer to visit all the guards at their posts. Good Entertainments "In spite of my feeling we might have of an attempt to blow us down to Davy Jones' locker we do not regret having a good time. The sea is calm, no one is sea-sick, and everyone is ready to enter into a game proposition. We have had a big boxing, fencing, broad sword and single stick tournament. Every afternoon from the Brigadier down to take part. The men had a boxing tournament last Saturday and some men's backs were spilled. We had two big concerts, one for the privates and one for the officers and N.C.O's. The talent was extra good. "Tomorrow night we have orders to sleep on deck with our life-preservers as pillows. We will be in danger none. Last night was beautiful. About eleven o'clock I was standing on deck maintaining the watch on the water when suddenly a full rigged ship crossed the moon's reflection, with all sails set. It was a beautiful picture. One could not help thinking of those brave old mariners, who sailed across the ocean in their little cockle-shells. How they must have been tossed about by the long high waves. "The Sunday Services "I almost forgot to mention the most impressive part of our trip, the sacred service on our two Sundays on board ship. It was a grand sight to look up at the bridge, where all the officers were, and below them over 1,500 soldiers. The band was below the chaplain who used the platform on the forecastle for a pulpit. From this precarious position he preached an eloquent sermon. Capt. MacConnell, chaplain of the 6th, is a great worker among the men, always trying to find something to interest them. The men swear by him and in turn will do almost anything for him. Our sailing record was as follows:-- July 18th, 57; 19th, 100; 20th, 20th, 800; 21st, 200; 22nd, 70; 23rd, 166; 24th, 848; 25th, 850; 26th, 838; 27th, 747." Lieut. Mooney tells of the eleven officers of the 6th who went on the Hesperian, getting themselves before the Brigadier at Quebec for taking an early train from Valcartier instead of waiting for the 4th and 5th. Not knowing they had gone, the other train waited and sent an orderly back for them, and when it was learned they had already gone, the Brigadier said nothing and later had them up before him. However, they were able to give a satisfactory explanation, and Lieut. Mooney observes that the Brigadier is a very fine and popular commander. A printed programme of the entertainment on the Hesperian shows that Lieut. Mooney was a member of the committee. He was also on the committee and referee at the boxing tournament, in which were men of the 115, 125, 145 and heavyweight class. MAY RETURN TO EAST George McDonald, a coal merchant in Vancouver, passed through the city today on his return to the west after visiting relatives in Nova Scotia. He spoke this morning of many St. John men who are doing well in the western metropolis. It is understood that Mr. McDonald is soon to return east to enter provincial politics in his native province.
