



DISAPPEARANCE OF TWO YOUNG WOMEN HAS STIRRED NEW YORK

New York, Dec. 10—Every policeman in Greater New York has instructions to look out for Miss Jessie McCann, the 28-year-old daughter of Robert G. McCann, a wholesale grocer, who disappeared on last Thursday as mysteriously as did Dorothy Arnold.

She left home on Thursday morning, ostensibly to go to a home for destitute children, where she did volunteer work as an instructor. Since that time all trace of her has been lost, although a friend of the family reported having seen a girl answering her description in Wall street on Friday night. To him she appeared dazed.

The girl's father is a personal friend of Mayor Kline, and has appealed to the mayor to expedite the police search. "I am positive that there is no romantic reason back of Jessie's disappearance," he said. "Had there been, she certainly would have sent us some word before this, because she would have known how terrible our anxiety would be, and it certainly would not be characteristic of my daughter to cause her family any suffering. On the other hand, she has never suffered in the least from any mental or nervous trouble, and the idea that she became ill and wandered away unwittingly does not seem to have the slightest fact to bear it out."

London, Dec. 10—The provident slate clubs of the country will distribute about \$7,500,000 this Christmas, \$750,000 of which will be paid out in Lon-

about \$7,500,000 this Christmas, \$750,000 of which will be paid out in London.

These clubs are a remarkable feature of English life, many of them having histories which go back for many years. As a sample, one of the clubs at Wolverhampton is more than a century old. Twenty-one years ago the London New Tabernacle club was formed with fifty members, and the first Christmas thereafter it distributed \$250.

Now it has a membership of 16,000, and on the fifteenth instant will distributes \$88,750. This will make a total distribution in the club's history of \$600,000, after the payment of \$200,000 in sick and death benefits since its formation, and even then it has a reserve of \$75,000.

The mode of contribution and distribution is interesting: 2,800 members who have paid in twenty-six cents weekly will receive \$8.75 each; 12,500 who paid fourteen cents a week will get \$5 each, and 700 who paid eight cents a week will get \$5 each, and 700 who paid eight cents a week will get \$2.50 in cash. The work of distribution takes six clerks three hours.
