**ENGLISH CLUBS WILL DISTRIBUTE MILLIONS**

Old Country Custom Brings Christmas Cheer to Members From Own Savings.

London, Dec. 10.—The provident state clubs of the country will distribute about \$7,000,000 this Christmas, \$700,000 of which will be paid out in London.

These clubs are a remarkable feature of English life, many of them having histories which go back for many years. As a sample, one of the clubs at Wolverhampton is more than a century old. Twenty-one years ago the London New Tabernacle club was formed with fifty members, and the first Christmas thereafter it distributed \$200. Now it has a membership of 16,000, and on the fifteenth instant will distribute \$88,750. This will make a total distribution in the club's history of \$600,000, after the payment of \$900,000 in sick and death benefits since its formation, and even then it has a reserve of \$75,000.

The mode of contribution and distribution is interesting: 2,800 members who have paid in twenty-six cents weekly will receive \$8.75 each; 12,200 who paid fourteen cents a week will get \$5 each, and 700 who paid eight cents a week will get \$2.50 in cash. The work of distribution takes six clerks three hours.

**ON MAIL TRIP 2,100 MILES INTO THE NORTH**

Four Hudson's Bay Company Men Start on Perilous Journey

Edmonton, Alta., Dec. 10.—Four trusted employees of the Hudson's Bay company, which has operated in the north since 1791, accompanied by two mail teams, each carrying 800 pounds of mail and provisions, are on the way to Fort McPherson, 2,100 miles north of here, on what is conceded to be the longest overland mail trip in the world. They are scheduled to reach the fringe of the Arctic Circle on February 28, the journey occupying about sixty days.

The trip from Edmonton to Athabasca, 100 miles, was made by train the first day, after which the party started on the lonely trail, which follows the windings of the Athabasca, Slave and Mackenzie rivers. One of the dog teams, with two men, is destined for Fort Smith, the other going to Fort McPherson. They are experienced river and woods men, who have passed years in the north country.

Included in the mail is a small packet for Stefanson, the Arctic explorer, to be delivered at Herschel Island, the most northerly mail point in Canada.

"The winter trip to Fort McPherson is fraught with great danger," said Acting Postmaster Cairns, "but we feel confident that the men will get through, as they know all conditions of the country."

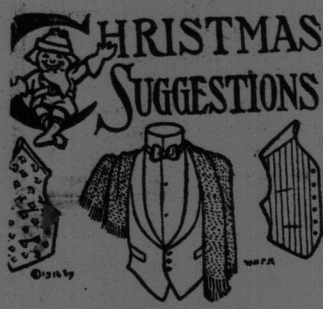

Halifax Echo, Tuesday.-The old Tuckerford & Black West India service is being discontinued. This morning the freight steamer Uller sailed for Philadelphia, her charter to Tuckerford & Black having expired. The Oceanic, the last passenger steamer on the old service, is due at Bermuda today for Halifax. The freighter Britannic will conclude the service. able supply is running low. Now they are talking about old Mordcael Brown, who should be able to handle the job if they don't trade all the players away before he takes hold. Others to receive honorable mention for the title, according to the coast papers, are Roger Bresnahan, "Bill" Dahler, "Bill" Sweeney of Boston, Fielder Jones, and so on. Practically the only prominent name to be omitted is "Bill" Klem's, and he should do well there because he has a good voice and can talk loud. Therefore, he should win many an argument.

I have heard from other sources that Tinker is very anxious to get back into Chicago, and that Evers will make a deal by which Bresnahan and Corriden will go to the Reds for "Joe". If this is the case, Roger will lead the Cincinnati club. It looks to me like the probable solution of the situation for many reasons. First, Murphy is paying Bresnahan a big salary, and Roger did very little catching last year, most of the work going to "Jimmy" Archer whose holdout propensities were responsible for the big offer to Bresnahan when he joined the Cubs. Murphy would just as soon get this \$10,000 salary off his pay roll, and he would not weaken his catching staff to any extent by so doing, because he still has "Jimmy" Archer, than whom there are few better.

Again, Murphy got in badly in Chicago when he let Chance and Tinker and Brown and some of the other old Cubs, who had won him so many pennants and world's championships, get away from him. The receipts from the club felt this lack of popularity last summer. By bringing Tinker back to the Cubs, Murphy would partially restore his good standing with the Chicago fans, and many would go out to see "Joe" in his old uniform again. Therefore, Mr. Murphy stands to win both ways by letting Bresnahan go and getting Tinker back. The loss of Corriden would not weaken the Chicago team to any great extent, as Tinker would more than fill any gap he might leave.

There is only one hitch in the smooth working of this transaction. Can Tinker and Evers patch up their old differences? Both declare that there are no differences between them now, but the old feud has burned itself out. But it had not last spring. After Chance had left the Cubs, there was some question as to who the next manager of the Cubs would be. It lay between Tinker and Evers, and each declared that he would be his leader. Tinker was most emphatic in his demands. These facts have not been published to my knowledge, but "Joe" certainly asserted he would not work with the Cubs if Evers was the leader.

Then, after Tinker had been made the manager of the Reds, he declared himself in this wise:

"Well, there is one team we will beat out anyway, and that is the Cubs."

If Tinker returns to Chicago, as the indications now are he will, Evers and

he will probably have their differences again, but I think they will play the same brand of wonderful ball they did when they worked together like parts of one machine and yet did not speak to the easy stuff. But I suppose you'll have to get your whiff at it, like all the rest of us, and maybe you'll make good. I hope you do. As for me, I would not mind being a common player again and attending to my outside business."

If the owners of the Cincinnati club believe Bresnahan is going to be a trackable manager, they will find him almost as book-headed as Tinker and as insistent on having his own way. It was because Bresnahan was refused permission to make a trade by the owners of the St. Louis club that he had his row there. It seems as if the Cincinnati owners were jumping from the frying pan into the fire.

And, in the meantime, as a hint, the Giants' management is wondering whether something could not be done to bring Tinker to New York.

I would not even risk a guess as to who Tinker's successor will be. The Cincinnati club will soon have to begin to repeat itself on managers if they are changed as often in the future as they have been in the past, because the wall-

## GIVES ASSURANCE THAT VALLEY RAILWAY WILL CROSS ST. JOHN RIVER

The North End Conservative Club held a smoker last evening in Temple Building, Main street, at which addresses were given by Hon. H. F. McLeod and H. W. Woods, M. P. J. Thornton presided. He introduced Mr. Woods, who spoke at considerable length upon the policy and record of the Conservative party.

Hon. Mr. McLeod was the principal speaker of the evening. Regarding the mail situation he said that no one but Mr. Hazen could have brought the Royal boats to this port.

Regarding a question of considerable importance the speaker said:

"Again I might refer to the Valley Railway. This line is coming to St. John. It is not coming on C. P. R. rails either. The line will cross the St. John river at The Mistake or Oak Point,

whichever point is the most suitable. The Mistake a diamond drill has gone down 200 feet into clear mud without striking a bottom suitable for a bridge foundation. We have employed Mr. Monserrat, perhaps the best bridge engineer in Canada, to look over the sites for the bridges, and the government will be guided by his recommendation.

"The railway will cross the St. John and the Kennebecus and connect with the Intercolonial at a point near Rothesay and thence over the I. C. R. to the Combermere Bay district.

"Personally I believe that West St. John should be developed first, but that is your business. The Valley Railway might have been built on the western side of the river, but the right of way through St. John would have been expensive."

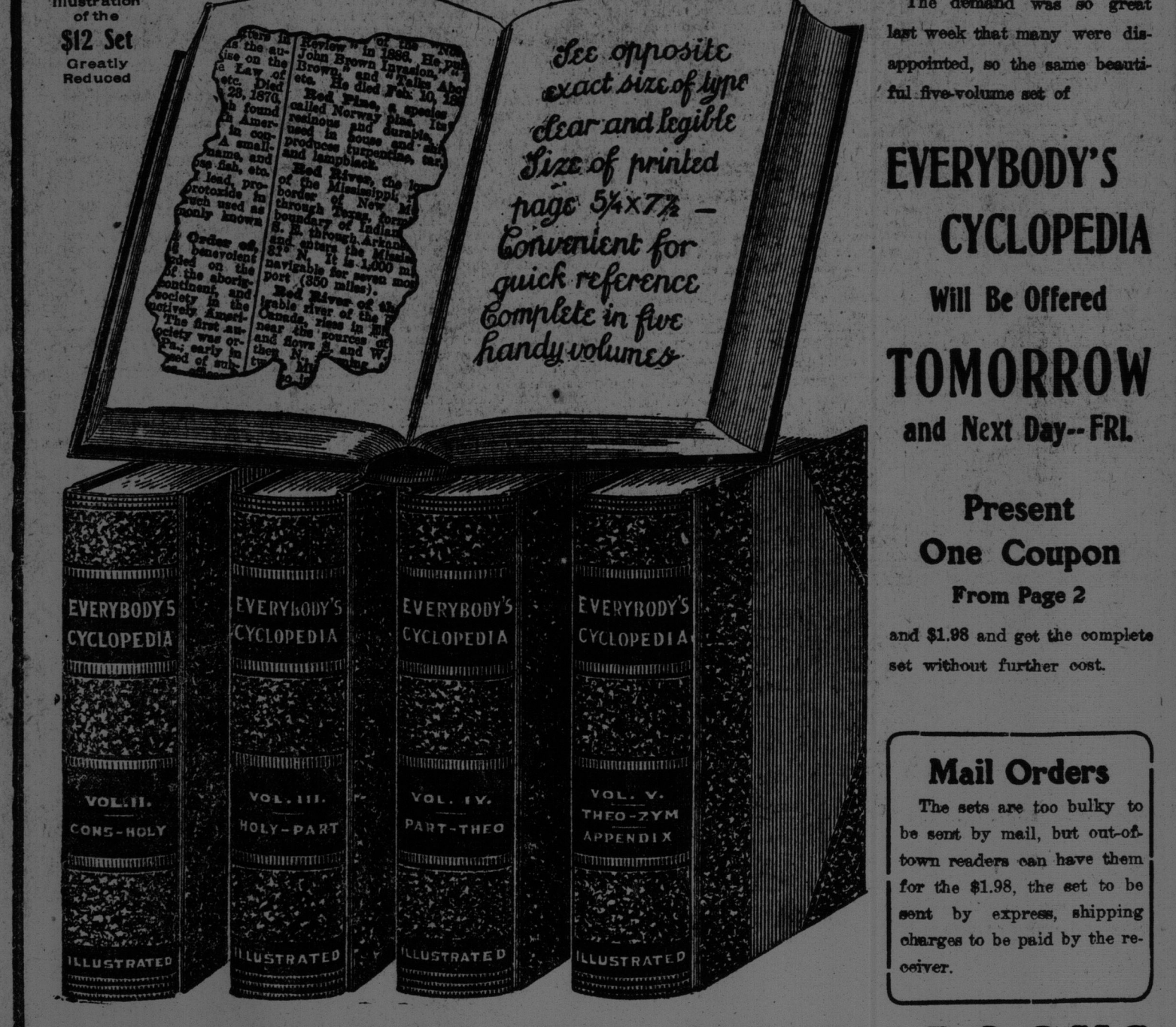

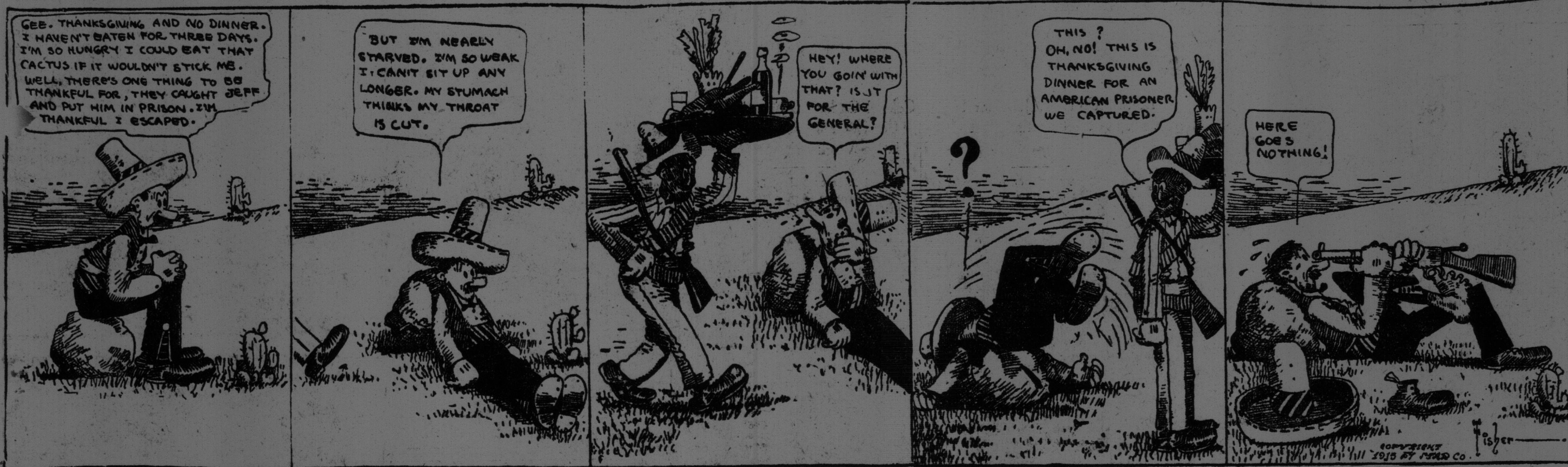

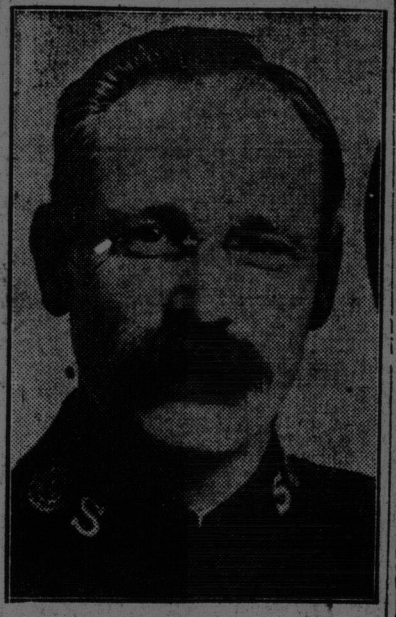

## FIELD SECRETARY IS ON VISIT HERE

Colonel Gaskin Visiting the Army Posts and Encouraging Those in the Work

Colonel Albert Gaskin, field secretary of the Salvation Army for Canada, Newfoundland, Bermuda and Alaska, with headquarters in Toronto, came to the city this morning from Moncton and is the guest of Major Taylor at the provincial officers' headquarters, Pitt street. He is making a tour of Eastern Canada to conduct officers' councils in Montreal, Halifax, New Glasgow and St. John and to confer with them as to the best plans to adopt to strengthen the work of the army and particularly to endeavor to reach people who never attend any church, also he is conducting public meetings at all the places visited.



## COLONEL GASKIN

Colonel Gaskin met a council of the officers here this afternoon and discussed various phases of the work and suggested methods of getting in touch with men who did not attend church and he requested the local officers to make their crusade of visiting even more vigorous than at present and to go to the homes of the poor, sick or sorrowful wherever they know of such cases.

In speaking to a Times reporter this morning Colonel Gaskin said he noticed a great improvement in the work throughout the province, for which St. John is the centre, and that the army had greatly increased in numbers during the past year. He expressed himself greatly pleased with what he had so far seen of the work here since he arrived in St. John. The colonel will go to Fredericton tomorrow and return to St. John the following day. He will leave for Montreal Friday night. In speaking of his visit to other places, Colonel Gaskin said that the Charlotetown on last Sunday the spacious citadel there could not accommodate the crowd in attendance. In Amherst on the previous Sunday the new citadel there was officially opened in the presence of a very large gathering.

A banquet will be tendered Colonel Gaskin by the officers at their residence this evening and he will address them on "Self Evident Doctrine." An outdoor meeting will be held this evening, after which Colonel Gaskin will speak in the Charlotte street citadel.

Major Taylor of St. John and Colonel Gaskin were in Moncton last night and the colonel gave an address, J. T. Hawke was chairman. The subject was "Some Leaves From My Diary."

## "BE KIND TO ANIMALS"

Nation-Wide Movement in States of Special Interest Here Just Now

In connection with the formation of an animal rescue league in St. John, the following from the Boston Globe is of interest:—

"Be Kind to Animals" is the watchword under which a nation-wide campaign has been started by the American Humane Education Society. A southern millionaire philanthropist is supplying the necessary capital for the campaign, and the returns will come in the better treatment of animals brought about through the thought engendered by the little button on which is the above motto.

Sample buttons are being sent out this morning to 1800 societies for the prevention of cruelty to animals and humane societies in the country, and it is estimated that the buttons that will be requested from these sources will go well up into the millions.

The attractive buttons are about the size of a 25-cent piece. In the center are the heads of a horse, a dog, a cat and two small birds, in colors. About the top are the words in red on a white background. "Be Kind to Animals." At the bottom are either the letters, S. P. C. A., or "Humane Society," according as the organization using them may be named. For the holiday season the button will have on the reverse side, "A Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year."

The idea is that humane societies everywhere and individuals will supply themselves with little badges and dispose of them to every person they can induce to purchase and wear them, receiving whatever the individual may choose to give. If it be only a cent, and then using the proceeds still farther to widen the movement, or for any humane work.

The Massachusetts Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, an interlocking organization with the American Humane Society, will distribute to many of the stores in the eight largest cities of the state large cards, in which are placed the "Be Kind to Animals" pins and besides the cards will be little tin banks. On the cards will be "Take a pin and put a contribution into the bank."
