THE MONTREAL INSTITUTION

For the Education of Young Ladies.

This Institution aims at affording a thorough and accurate acquaintance with the subjects of a Liberal Education.

The Course of Instruction will embrace the English, German, French, Italian and Latin Languages; Ancient and Modern History; Physical and Political Geography; with the Use of the Globes; Writing; Arithmetic, Algebra, Geometry; Vocal and Instrumental Music; Drawing and Painting.

In carrying out this Course of Education Mr. Reid will personally superintend the studies of even the youngest of the pupils, and will have the co-operation of Professors and Teachers of undoubted talent and success in teaching.

The pupils will be arranged into three Divisions—Senior Junior and Preparatory.

Pupils will be received into the Preparatory Division at various stages of progress, as there will be sub-divisions for the more perfect classification of them, according to their different capacities and attainments; and pupils will be promoted from one of these sub-divisions to another, as soon as they show themselves fit for such promotion. The design of these preparatory classes is to secure broad and solid foundations for the subjects prosecuted in the higher divisions.

Pupils will be received into the Junior and Senior Divisions when on examination they are judged fit to enter on the studies prescribed for these divisions.

The Text-Books have been selected with care from such as have attained a high character for efficiency as *class-books* in England; none of them are expensive.

The Class-Rooms are situated in one of the best localities in Montreal, and are in every way well suited for an Educational Establishment for the Upper Classes. The furniture and *Educational Appliances* are of the very best description.

Schemes of work are prepared for the different classes, so much being allotted to each successive week of the session, and this will from week to week be sub-divided into daily portions. The work of each term will be made as far as practicable to form a course complete in itself so far as it goes, and a syllabus will be issued at the commencement of each term. Thus each term, each week and each day, will be commenced with a certain definite well considered object clearly stated and kept in view; and to give system and continuity to the efforts of both pupils and teachers, in pursuing such a regular scheme, a proper set of books will be kept, and the result of each day's work will be regularly entered in the Day-Books of the several Divisions. Registers will also be kept of the pupils' Class Places, Attendance, &c.

The progress and skill of the pupils, in the several branches of knowledge and art in which they are engaged, will be tested and reported upon, from time to time. At the close of the Session the rank and comparative merit of the pupils will be determined by Special Examinations held for that purpose. These examinations will, as far as practicable, be conducted in writing.

Immediately after these annual examinations, parents and others interested in education will be invited to a Public Examination of the pupils, so as to show some of the results of the work of the session.

A GOLD MEDAL

will be awarded to the Dux of the Senior Division, and a SILVER MEDAL to the best scholar in each of the other divisions. The Prize and Honour List will be published.
