First Annual Meeting
OF THE
Toronto Magdalene Asylum.

The First Annual Meeting of the Friends and Subscribers to the Toronto Magdalene Asylum was held on Monday afternoon, the 20th of March, 1854, in the Hall of the Mechanics' Institute. There was a large attendance of ladies, and a number of the most influential gentlemen in the City were also present.

On the motion of J. H. HAGARTY, Esq.

JOHN ARNOLD, Esq., was called to the Chair.

The proceedings having been commenced with prayer, by the Rev. Mr. SANSON,

The CHAIRMAN explained the object of the meeting, which was to receive the First Annual Report of the Magdalene Asylum, and also to give an expression of opinion, as to whether the measure of success already vouchsafed was such as to warrant the Board's taking steps to place the Institution on a more permanent footing.

The Rev. Mr. SANSON then read the Report.

REPORT.

In presenting the First Annual Report of the Toronto Magdalene Asylum, your Board desire to acknowledge the manifest blessing from above which has followed their labours, but more especially those of the Committee of ladies, whose untiring zeal in procuring funds, in visiting the gaol, in going after the wanderers, and in conducting the internal affairs of the Institution cannot be too highly commended. Your Board deem it matter for gratitude to the originator of all good, and encouragement to the friends and supporters of the Asylum, that such an Institution has been established, that it has survived the critical period of its infancy, and that it gives tokens of attaining, under the Divine favor, a vigorous youth, and a full stature; and they are of opinion that, when local, moral, and pecuniary difficulties are duly considered, the wonder will be, not that so little, but that so much has been achieved.

It is not necessary in this place to enter upon an extended survey of those difficulties, but before proceeding to the details of the Report your Board beg leave to refer to one very serious

impediment, by which the ladies of the Committee are much hindered in their benevolent operations, viz. : the want of ample and suitable accommodation. This is proved to be an effectual barrier to all further progress,, confining the number of inmates to a mere fraction of those of their class without, and repelling the admission of applicants for refuge, of whom, at the present time, there are no less than six who have been unwillingly, but necessarily, denied that boon. But this result, though much to be deplored, is the least of the evils arising from the lack of accommodation, which completely prevents the separation of new from old inmates, and the classification of the whole, according to their respective shades of character and conduct.

It will readily, therefore, be perceived, that this hindrance, growing out of the insufficiency of room in the existing establishment, is one which must either stop the Asylum in its career of compassion and usefulness, or be at once removed out of the way, and thereby enable it to continue with increased celerity its arduous, yet beneficent course. That the injurious effects of this difficulty have not been overstated, will be immediately apparent, if it be considered that the admission of one new inmate, much more of several, under the present deficiency of apartments, generally jeopardizes, and occasionally destroys,

the salutary impressions and industrious habits which have been happily formed, after weeks and months of care, and toil, and instruction; while the absence of classification, by throwing young into the society of old offenders, and associating the better with the worse disposed, is obviously calculated rather to promote degeneracy than improvement.

What then, under these circumstances, is to be done? Your Board, with the full concurrence of the Committee suggest that an effort should be made, without delay, to erect a building, suitable in its dimensions and in its internal arrangements, to the design and purpose of the Asylum. For this object, we are not without hope of obtaining the gift of a convenient site; and it has been estimated that a sum of fifteen hundred pounds, or thereabout, would suffice for the erection. Your Board and the Committee are aware that this is not a very small sum to solicit from the benevolent; but when they look, on the one hand, at the dread evil to be nipped in the bud, and the great good to be sown and reaped by the agency of the Toronto Magdalene Asylum—and on the other hand at the increasing wealth of our city, and the sympathy and liberality which the Institution has already received from so many quarters—they are disposed to believe, that the project to suc-

ceed, beyond all our hopes and fears, requires only to be generally made known, and zealously urged and commended.

The Board and Committee, therefore, venture to suggest that special committees of ladies and gentlemen should be at once formed, to procure funds, to devise and carry out such measures as may promote the object in view, and to proceed, in due time, with the erection of the edifice. And, doubtless, with the blessing hitherto vouchsafed from the Source of All Good, we shall and must succeed. Your Board, having thus, in concurrence with the Committee, submitted those important matters and suggestions to the kind attention of the friends and supporters of the Institution, would now give a detailed, but brief statement of its affairs and fruits, for the comparatively short period of its existence. First, then, as to receipts:—

Here it may be observed, that the sum received for work done by the inmates is small but when it is remembered that at the commencement of the enterprize, and for several months, there were but two inmates in the Asylum, and moreover, that the full quantum of work can hardly be obtained or expected from those of their previous history, and present restrained situation, it will readily be conceded that the amount, though small, is not to be despised. Besides, labour and its profits is one of the secondary, not primary objects of the Asylum. On the other hand, the expenditure is remarkably small, less than one-half of the receipts. This, it must be added, is due to the number of donations in kind from merchants, trades-people, and others, in town, and the economical supervision of the establishment by the committee. But as this view of the outlay must depend very much upon that taken of the fruits of the Institution, your Board would now state the number of admissions and departures:—

Of these, two remain for ten days, undertaking, for that period, to pay their board, and provide for themselves by their own work. Your Board and Committee hope that, when all things are considered, these will not be thought to have been too dearly purchased, and that they will encourage the friends of the Institution to continue to it their cordial and liberal support. Let it be borne in mind that it has only been in operation about nine months, that it partook at first, very much of the character of an experiment, that the objects of its benevolence were, for a time prejudiced against it, as more rigorous in its discipline, and straitened in its fare, than a prison—so much so, as hardly to be induced to avail themselves of its advantages—let those and similar considerations be remembered, and every follower of Him who came to save sinners of every grade, will rejoice that the Toronto Magdalene Asylum has been established, that it has outlived the difficulties of its earliest days, and that there is every reasonable prospect of its continuing to do good and prosper for the time to come. Let us, therefore, thank God and take courage!

J. H. HAGARTY, Esq., moved the adoption of the Report.

The Hon. J. H. CAMERON seconded the motion; which, after some discussion, was put to the meeting, and carried.

The Rev. Dr. BURNS moved the second Resolution:—"That the success which has attended the operations of the Toronto Magdalene Asylum, though comparatively and in some respects necessarily humble, is not to be despised, but to be regarded as an earnest of better things to come,—as an encouragement to persevere in this cause, and especially as a ground for grateful and devout acknowledgment to the Giver of all good."

R. H. BRETT, Esq., seconded the Resolution; which was passed unanimously.

GEORGE BROWN, Esq., M.P.P., moved the next Resolution:—"That on account of the evils arising from the want of sufficient and suitable accommodation, it is necessary that efforts should be made for the erection of a convenient edifice, to be called the 'Toronto Magdalene Asylum;' that the Board be requested to take measures to collect funds for this purpose, from all friendly to the object; and that the Board be authorized to advertize for plans, specifications, and tenders, in good time."

After some discussion, Mr. HAGARTY moved the following Resolution, which he thought would meet the views of all the gentlemen who had spoken:—"Resolved,—That the Board to be now appointed be instructed to obtain plans and specifications for the erection of a suitable building, on an appropriate site, with estimates of the necessary outlay for a site and building, and any information which can be obtained, as to the practicability of obtaining a suitable building on lease, and to report to a meeting to be called two months from this date."

Dr. BURNS seconded the amended Resolution, which was passed unanimously.

R. H. BRETT, Esq., moved:—"That the thanks of this meeting are due to the Members of the Board, and the Committee of Ladies who have given their time and services to the Institution during the past year, and, in general, to all who have assisted, whether by their means or by their influence."

Mr. HOWARD seconded the Resolution, which was passed unanimously.

Mr. MARLING moved the appointment of the Office-bearers. [See third page.]

Mr. ALCORN seconded the nomination, which passed unanimously.

On the motion of Mr. CATHCART, a cordial vote of thanks was given to Mr. Arnold, for his conduct in the chair; and after prayer by the Rev. Dr. BURNS, the meeting separated.

Pursuant to arrangement, a Public Meeting of the friends of the Institution was held on Thursday, the 20th April, in the Mechanics' Institute, to receive the Report of the Board of Managers, relative to the proposed purchase of a site, and the erection of a building. JOHN ARNOLD, Esq., in the chair.

The meeting having been opened with prayer, by the Rev. Dr. BURNS, the CHAIRMAN read the following Report:—

REPORT OF THE BOARD.

The Managing Board of the Asylum, to whom was committed the duty of obtaining information relative to an appropriate site, and plans for a building to be erected thereon, for the Institution, beg to Report:—

That a building already erected,—advantageous as to size, internal arrangement, and locality, has been offered to them, at a reasonable price, rendering the erection of a building for the Institution, at the present time, in their opinion, unnecessary. The house thus placed at their disposal is a double tenement of brick, three stories high, situated in George Street, in rear of the Bank of Upper Canada. The ground has a frontage of fifty feet; but both houses are at present occupied by tenants whose lease will not expire for some time. The price of the property is fixed at £1,000, which the Board con-

sider to be a most favorable offer, when compared with the present rate of property. There is a small annual ground rent of £5 9s., which may be cancelled at any time, by the payment of the principal, of which the rent is regarded as the interest. In order to meet the estimated value of the property, the necessary expenditure required to put it in repair, and to provide for an indemnity to the tenants who would be required to vacate the premises before the expiration of their lease, a sum of not less than £1,500 would be required to be raised by subscription. The Board therefore recommend, that for this purpose the city be at once divided into sections, and that collectors be appointed to each section, to raise the amount at the earliest possible period.

On motion of Dr. BURNS, seconded by Mr. NASMITH, it was then Resolved,—

That the Report be adopted; and that subscriptions be taken up without delay, for carrying out the objects contemplated by the Board of Managers, in the purchase of the house, and to defray other necessary expenses; estimated, in all, to be about £1,500.

Mr. Alderman ALLAN intimated, that the Board would, at its next meeting, divide the city into sections, and appoint persons to take up subscriptions.

It was then resolved, on motion of the Rev. Mr. REID, seconded by R. H. BRETT, Esq.—

That the Board of Managers have power to add to their number, when they shall deem it necessary.

Mr. LESSLIE intimated to the meeting that the District Magistrates, in Quarter Session, had cordially supported the proposition made in a recent Report of the County Council, at the suggestion of the 'Ladies' Committee, that a Matron should be appointed, to take charge of the female prisoners in the Jail, and agreed to allow her a salary of £40 per annum.

The Chairman, Mr. ARNOLD, took occasion publicly to thank Mr. GEO. L. ALLEN, the Jailer, for his kind co-operation, in furthering the benevolent efforts of the Ladies, and in agreeing to be guided by their advice, in the appointment of the Matron for the Jail.

The meeting was then closed with prayer, by the Rev. Mr. SANSON.
