

RULES AND REGULATIONS,

Adopted at the Formation of the

NOVA-SCOTIA BIBLE SOCIETY.

- If That this Society, highly approving the object of the British & Foreign Bible Society established in London, and taking a lively interest in its proceedings, do resolve to co-aperate with it by all the means in their power; and to this effect do form a Society, to be called The Bible Society of Nova-Scotia and its Dependencies:—The object of which shall be the same with that of the British and Foreign Bible Society, Viz: To encourage the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment, and to furnish copies of the same gratis to the indigent, and at reduced prices to those requiring them.
- That the business of this Society be conducted by a President, Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, Secretary, and Committee.
- 3. That, in order to give effect to the design of this Institution, benefactions and subscriptions be solicited, and books opened for the reception of names of benefactors and subscribers.
- That each person contributing annually One Pound, or a donation at one time of Ten Pounds, shall be considered a Member of this Society.

- 5. That this So year, be preceding
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Resolu That the

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- 5. That there shall be a General Meeting of the Members of this Society on the first Wednesday of November in each year, before which the accounts and proceedings of the preceding year shall be laid.
- 6. That Mr. M. G. BLACK* be requested to become the Depositary of the Bibles and Testaments which shall be received from the Parent Society in England, to be distributed in these Colonies.
- 7. That the whole of the subscriptions and donations, after deducting incidental expences, shall be remitted annually in aid of the funds of the British and Foreign Bible Society.
- 8. That each Member of this Society shall be entitled to purchase, under the direction of the Committee, Bibles and Testaments, at the reduced prices of the Society, which are as low as possible.
- That the Committee be authorised to meet for the purpose of conducting the business of the Society, as often as may be necessary.

AT a Meeting of the Committee on a subsequent day, it was—

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REPORT.

IN presenting to the numerous friends and supporters of the NovatScotia Bible Society, this first Annual Report, which has been by incidental circumstances, delayed beyond the Anniversary of its formation, the Committee cannot refrain in the first instance from expressing the high satisfaction they feel in being able to state, that it has, under the Divine Blessing, become, in a very short time after its establishment, extensive and prosperous.

The merits of the truly admirable Institution, which is the glory of the Mother Country, " The British and Foreign Bible Society," had long been appreciated and esteemed in Nova-Scotia, of which there had not been wanting in Halifax, and other parts of this Province, convincing testimonies by liberal contributions remitted in aid of its funds. sooner, therefore, was the establishment of a Bible Society proposed here, to assist and co-operate in this grand and important cause, than the proposal met with the most distinguished patronage and support. An object, in itself, at once so important and so benevolent, as that of sending the sa cred Scriptures into every part of the world, and thus diffusing the light of Divine Truth in its primitive purity and simplicity among all nations under Heaven, could not fail to unite the exertions, and engage the affections, of Christians of every denomination, who make this sacred volume the standard of their faith and practice-and it has done so; as in England, so in Nova-Scotia, Christians of every

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Church, forgetting lesser differences and distinctions, have assembled round the standard of the Bible, and have formed a bond of union in their efforts to make known, far and wide, its blessed truths, proclaiming "Glory to God in the highest, on earth peace, good will to men."

In directing your attention for a moment, (and they will not expatiate, for its excellence is too well known to need it.) to that noble Institution, to which we have the honour and satisfaction to form an Auxiliary, the Committee feel a degree of Christian confidence, which the importance and dignity of the subject naturally inspire; whether we contemplate this Society as connecting in one bond of sacred union, the pious and benevolent of every denomination, or as extending its cheering and benign influence over the whole human race, it appears equally great, beautiful and interesting.

The British and Foreign Bible Society is an Institution of vast and growing importance, it comprizes among its firmest friends and supporters, the exalted, the excellent, and the pions of the Empire, Princes of the Blood Royal, Nobles of the highest rank, Warriors and Statesmen, Presides of the first eminence for piety and learning, Clergy and Senators, and an almost innumerable host of every class of private individuals.

And it should not be omitted to observe, that the object of this Institution, its simple, sole, exclusive object, is to promote the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, and that in the purest form which the circumstances of Christendom will

The Committee of the Nova-Scotia Bible Society, while congratulating its friends upon the enjoyment of the exalted satisfaction, which must fill every good mind, in the reflection arising from co-operating in such a cause, must not omit, however, to detail its local operations in this Province.

By the liberality of subscribers and donors, they have been enabled to remit to the funds of the British and Foreign Bible Society, the sum of £1012 3 0.

There have been already received in return, from the Society:

845 Bibles.

675 Testaments.

and further large supplies have been shipped, which are now on their way to this Country; those received have been distributed in various parts of the Province.

The list of subscriptions subjoined, will shew the great support the Society has met with very generally throughout the Province; and the Committee confidently hope for a continuance of that support. Although much has been done, much yet remains to be done. The want of Bibles in this Country is found to be greater than had been imagined, and the pressing applications which have been received for them, while they cannot fail to be gratifying to every Christian, as testifying a regard for the sacred volume, make

the Committee very desirous of being afforded the means of answering, to the fullest extent, all the demands.

And in answering such demands, what an extensive prospect opens to the contemplation of the benevolent mind, and warms the heart of the Christian! what is the cause in which we are engaged? It is one which embraces the noblest of all objects, the diffusion of Divine Truth in its purest form; it is one which has for its end the most important of all views—the salvation of the whole human race: and to doubt that its means are adequate to its end, would be to call in question the veracity of the Holy Scriptures themselves, which, by the pen of the inspired Apostle, are declared "able to make us wise unto salvation."

Not doubting of the continuance of that support which has been so liberally afforded to the Nova-Scotia Bible Society in the commencement of its establishment, the Committee, first recommending it to the Divine Blessing, confidently commit its interests to the enlightened and pious of every Church. And they cannot better conclude this Report, than in the words of a justly celebrated Clergyman of the Church of England:

worthy of your affections, your contributions, and your exertions, than that which the Bible Society proposes,—transfer them all to that better object. When you have discovered in any human composition, a surer guide, a wiser counsellor, and a more effectual comforter than the Bible, then

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take that better composition to your heart, and circulate it instead of the Bible. But if, as will I am persuaded be the case, you should find no object of comparable value; if on every repeated perusal of the Bible, you should discover still more to admire in the majesty of its doctrines, the wisdom of its precepts, and the efficiency of its consolations, then let your zeal for its propagation, keep pace with your discoveries of its excellence, and testify your gratitude for such a possession, by co-operating with those, who, on so grand a scale, and with such prospects of success, are occupied in imparting it to others. Your attachment to the cause, and your exertions in its behalf, may expose you for a season to opposition and reproach: but these difficulties will be only of temporary duration.

We believe the cause in which we are engaged, and we do so with some of the brightest ernaments of Britain, both living and deceased, to be the cause of Righteousness; and we believe on the authority of the sure word of Prophecy, that "the work of it shall be peace, and the effect of it quietness and assurance for ever."

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APPENDIX.

Extract of a Letter from the Secretary of the Cumberland Auxiliary Bible Society, dated,

AMHERST, 18th May, 1814.

IN order to supply the Inhabitants of these Countries with the Scriptures, it is requested of the Society in Halifax, to send to this Society, one hundred copies of the Bible, octavo, and one hundred Bibles, duodecimo, and twenty copies of New-Testaments, in French, for sale and distribution among the people, according to circumstances.

We cannot help embracing this opportunity of congratulating the Nova-Scotia Bible Society, and the Province at . large, in being engaged in one of the most laudable designs that ever drew the attention, and called forth the exertions, of mankind in any age or country; and that too at a time when designs and practices of a very opposite tendency; when wars and rumours of wars prevail in almost every nation.-By the revolutions which, in our time, have taken place in various nations, both in regard to their political conditions and their views of religion in general, we perceive that the LORD has been evidently preparing a way for the propogation of his Word. He has in many instances placed men in more favourable circumstances for receiving the Bible, and attending to it, than they formerly were; and has loosened their attachment to long established, but erroneous, systems of religion. Even in those nations which have been long

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involved in the thickest clouds of Heathen darkness, there are many pleasing indications of an inclination to receive and read the Holy Scriptures.

These prognosticks are not to be disregarded. They are bright intimations of the fulfilment of Scripture, which says that "the Lord JESUS shall reign 'till he make all his enemies his footstool; 'till the knowledge of his salvation cover the earth as the waters cover the channel of the deep; 'till from the rising to the setting sun, incense be offered to him, and a pure offering." He is pleased to use means to effect these purposes; and his own word is the principal mean .-His people are honored with a part in this work, for though it is an immutable truth, that Paul may plant, and Apollos water, but it is God only that gives the increase; yet the Word is told, planted, or made known, in the world by human means; and of all the plans yet adopted by men since the days of the Apostles for disseminating the truths of the Christian religion, none can be more generally pleasing, or less exceptionable, than that of the Bible Society.

It is a plan in which all that profess the religion of Jesus may and can unite, notwithstanding the differences subsisting among them respecting certain parts of that religion.—And besides its being an incumbent duty, nothing can be more gratifying to the heart which has experienced the tranquilizing and refreshing influence of the Divine Word: to the mind which has been illuminated by it with the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ, that to assist in diffusing the savour of the Redeemer's name among those, whether of his own country or of a

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It is moreover a thing in which all that have the good of society at heart, may join with cheerfulness and alacrity; for the Bible is the only fountain of true morality and virtue: its themes enter into every relation of human life, and produce fruit to the praise and glory of God, and the peace and happiness of men.

Letter from John Tappan, Esq. to his Excellency, Sir John C. Sherbrooke.

BOSTON, FEBRUARY 24, 1815.

To his Excellency,

SIR JOHN C. SHERBROOKE, &c. &c. HALIFAX.

ABOUT a year since, the British Ship Falcon was sent into one of our ports, a prize to a private armed vessel, and on board of her were found eight boxes of Dutch Bibles, Testaments and Psalm books, destined to the Cape of Good Hope, from the British and Foreign Bible Society. I purchased them at the sale of the prize cargo, as agent of the Bible Society of Massachusetts, and for the purpose of having them restored to the parent society from which they were issued. At the annual meeting of our society the purchase was sanctioned, and the Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer were directed to present the invoice, amounting to upwards of 500l. sterling, to the British and Foreign Bible Society. During the war there has been no possibility

of accomplishing this most desirable object; and no reply has been received to our letters upon the subject, to the Corresponding Secretary, Joseph Tarn, Esq. It is now quite important that they should be speedily on their way to their original destination, as the herald of peace between the two countries, whose efforts it is hoped will now be, directed to diffusing the gospel through the world.

We have no prospect of a direct conveyance to the Cape of Good Hope, from this quarter. Books being a prohibited article in Great-Britain, no owner of a vessel can be induced to take them on board for that destination. Our only resort then appears to be a hope, that your Excellency will grant permission that they may be landed in Halifax, at our expence, and by your directions be forwarded to London from thence. They are entitled to a drawback of the duties, to the amount of 1201. sterling, if shipped within five or six weeks, and this sum so saved will be added to the funds of our society.

Having learnt that your Excellency would attend to an application, which had for its object the extension of religious truth, I have ventured to make this request, without any introduction, or apology. And having had the honour of transmitting the fund subscribed for replacing the Bibles captured, which were bound to Nova-Scotia, I beg leave to refer your Excellency to Mr. Black, of your city, through whom the correspondence was held, for any particulars which may be deemed necessary

HALIFAX, 7th April, 1815.

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I AM directed by his Excellency, Lt. General Sir John Coape Sherbrooke, to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 28th February, and in reply to acquaint you, that his Excellency, fully impressed with the pious and benevolent intentions expressed therein, has given orders that the Invoice of Bibles, Testaments, &c. which you mention, shall be received in this port, whenever the Bible Society of Massachusetts may be pleased to send them. And upon the receipt of these books here, Sir J. C. Sherbrooke will communicate to the parent society in England this very liberal act of the Massachusetts Bible Society, and at the same time take the pleasure of the British and Foreign Bible Society respecting the farther disposal of the books.

His Excellency desires me to express the sense he entertains of your exertions in this christian cause, and to assure you that he sincerely participates with you in the hope that the period is rapidly advancing, in which the sacred scriptures shall be read in every nation in the world,

Letter from his Honour Wm. Phillips, President of Mass. Bible Society to Sir John C. Sherbrooke.

Boston, May 31st, 1815.

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SIR.

THE letter of Lieut. Col. Addison of the 7th of April, acquainting us, by your directions, with the permission accorded to us of landing in Halifax a quantity of Bibles, in the possession of the Massachusetts Bible Society, was duly received.

It is the wish of the Society, that I should express to you the sense we entertain of this favour.

The period within which the drawback would have been legally recoverable having elapsed, and we having since received communications from the British and Foreign Bible Society, it is thought most convenient to ship the Bibles di-But, although it thus seems no longer rectly to England. necessary to avail ourselves of the permission you have granted, we should be very insensible, did we not beg your Excellency to accept our best thanks for your goodness, and for the very gratifying manner in which it was made known to us. It must be matter of the most sincere joy to every benevolent mind to see the cordiality with which christians of every rank and every country, unite their efforts for the diffusion of the scriptures. We may regard it as one of the most encouraging proofs of the advancemen t of piety, and the approach of that period, when "the kingdoms of this world shall become the kingdoms of our Lord and of his Christ."
