It does not appear that very serious bjections can be urged against increasing the rate of mileage, provided the long-term principle is adopted. There is no doubt that some of our large lumbering concerns bid in more lands at the Crown Lands sales than they require and that fact has given rise to the idea that the large operators desire to secure a monopoly for themselves. Increased mileage would operate against monopoly to a great extent, for few men would care to bid in tracts of land at considerable cost, unless they intended to make use of them. Practically, however, nobody suffers from the monopolies complained of, for the smaller opera tors find no real difficulty in obtaining all the lands they require and we find that the so-called monopolists and those who are supposed to suffer by them generally understand each other to their mutual advantage. It is now time that the Crown Lands Department gave some sign of moving in the matter of its land sales.
