## RECEPTION OF THE PRINCESS ALEXANDRA.

FROM GRAVESEND TO LONDON.

The Princess was presented before starting with a time-table of the special train by which she was about to make her journey to London, printed on white satin, and bordered with gold, after a design by Mr. Owen Jones. Two copies only of this time-table, besides the one given to the Princess, were produced, and these were enclosed, with their crimson velvet mountings, in a splendid portfolio, for the service of the royal passengers. At four minutes only after the appointed time, the royal party left Gravesend in a train of twelve carriages, Mr. Cudworth, locomotive superintendent of the line, doing duty as engine-driver. The starting of the train was telegraphed to her Majesty the Queen at Windsor Castle, and to the Lord Mayor in London.

Arriving at the Bricklayers' Arms Station, London, which had been beautifully decorated, the Prince and Princess partook of luncheon, and between two and three o'clock the procession began:—

The Prince, with the beautiful young lady on his arm, appeared at the opening, and stood there for a few seconds bowing. The Princess curtsied and smiled very graciously, a deep blush suffusing her handsome features at this first unexpected ordeal of confronting a large concourse of gazers. They then turned and walked on to their carriage, the troops presenting arms and the bands playing.

The royal party occupied six carriages. In the fifth were the Prince Christian Frederick, brother of the Princess, who was born in 1843; the Princess Marie Dagmar, her sister, a young lady of sixteen; and her youngest sister, the Princess Thyra Amelia, a little girl of ten. In the last and sixth carriage were the Princess; her mother, the Princess Louise, originally of Hesse-Cassel, and now of Denmark; her father, Prince Christian, the hereditary Crown Prince of Denmark, by virtue of the law of succession, July, 1853; and the Prince of Wales. As the carriage containing the Prince and his fiancée emerged from the gate, a shout of welcome burst from the delighted mass of human beings that might have drowned in volume the thundering of a park of artillery.

The scene became almost painfully interesting—so enthusiastic and heartfelt the greetings showered upon the royal pair. It seemed as if the very bricks and mortar spoke, and life had been breathed into inanimate walls; the waving of handkerchiefs and the showering down of flowers were prodigious.

Along the whole route the welcome given was uniformly most generous and most cordial; and the Prince and Princess were ceaselessly engaged in bowing their glad acknowledgements. The Princess Dagmar, who was in the preceding carriage, was continually mistaken for her sister throughout the route, and evidently felt in a false position. The cheers that greeted her were however redoubled on the appearance of the Princess Alexandra. Flags floated from all the public buildings and from nearly all the private houses, spanning here and there the whole of the street, and occasionally bearing inscriptions, among which the word "welcome" with various accompaniments, everywhere predominated. Every conceivable banner might have been seen in a walk down Fleet-street; numbers of houses were festooned with flowers. To describe half the decorations would but weary our readers; we must therefore be content with the principal points. In Southwark an interesting feature of the

scene was the gatherings of school-children.

At the asylum for the deaf and dumb children of the poor at Old Kentroad arrangements had been made to enable the inmates of whom 220 were present, to view the procession. At another point of the route were 300 boys from Queen Elizabeth's Grammar-school, Horselydown, each wearing a wedding favour—a badge which seemed universally adopted by all classes. Again, at the Lock Burial-grounds seats were erected, in which nearly 800 children were assembled. Here, again, the children all wore wedding favours.

### THE DECORATIONS.

Along the whole distance from the corner of St. Paul's Churchyard to Farringdon-street, at stated distances, festoons of roses and other flowers hung across the road. The decorations which covered the front of the houses at St. Bride's corner, comprising the office of *Punch* and his opposite neighbor, commanded to a remarkable degree the approbation of beholders. Farther on, the handsome front of the "London" was beautifully garlanded with flowers, and a few yards further on, from over the Middle Temple gate were suspended a Royal Standard and the banner of the Crusaders. The lofty pile in the Strand occupied by Messrs. Smith displayed a profusion of banners, while the front of the premises occupied by Mr. Nutt, the foreign bookseller, presented the Danish inscription "*Velkommen Danske Rose*," which was almost as comprehensible to the Englishman as to his brother Dane, and which called up much attention, not only from the multitudinous passer by, but also from the royal party; and hence, stretching the eye past the Church of St. Mary, was visible a banner waving its broad folds, the inscription upon which was inspired doubtless by a true son of Cambria, and promising to its future Princess a welcome to the mountains of Wales. But a display far more costly than any of these was to be witnessed upon Temple-bar, which was scarcely recognisable in its new guise, and which it had taken the incessant efforts of four days and four nights to complete the transmutation upon. At the crown of the arch appeared a medallion of the Prince of Wales and the Princess Alexandra; at each corner were tripods sending forth balmy odours; over the footway were figures holding forth orange-blossoms; at the top appeared initial letters of the names of the Prince and Princess, together with other devices, the arms of England being constantly repeated, while the upper part of the front was superbly decorated, presenting the aspect of curtains of gold, the whole being beautifully set off with crimson fittings.

At Temple-bar the filing off of the civic part of the procession caused some confusion. A difficulty also occurred here with the gentlemen of the press, who, though armed with passes from the Chief Commissioners of Police, were denied further progress for a time by Captain Labalmondere, upon whom several reporters accordingly take revenge, one describing him as "got up in a wonderful dress reminding the spectator equally of a policeman in a pantomime, and the ex-emperor Soulouque." Captain Labalmondere is stated to have said that the Prince of Wales had complained of "having a lot of reporters about him." This accounts, perhaps, for the comparatively meagre report of the West-end part of the procession.

Temple-bar, as everybody knows, stands at the western extremity of Fleet-street, and separates the city of London from the city of Westminster. As one of the most conspicuous objects on the route of the procession, and as

offering peculiar facilities for an effective display, the civic authorities wisely resolved to decorate it in a manner worthy of so joyful an occasion. The result of their labours, if not exactly calculated to please all tastes, was, at all events, sufficiently striking and gorgeous. Under the superintendence of the City Architect, cunning workmen had succeeded in putting a new face upon an old friend, and in so altering his whole appearance as to make recognition exceedingly difficult. Who could have detected in the glittering mass of gold and crimson which bestrode Fleet-street, the dirty, grey, weather-beaten structure, with its heavy stonework, its timeworn statues, and its terrible reminiscences of human heads stuck upon spikes, which is so familiar to us all? The massive gates had been retained, and the general outline of the new creation called up a dim recollection of the ancient edifice as it came from the hands of Wren, but there the resemblance ended. From top to bottom all was changed. The lower parts were swathed in coloured cloth, decorated with fringes and tassels, so that not an inch of the masonry was visible. Above the centre of the middle arch were placed medallion portraits of the Prince and Princess in white stucco; but it would have required an active imagination, backed by no small amount of faith, to trace any likeness to the originals. Broad pieces of cloth of gold, stiff with metal, were drawn over the body of the structure, and so arranged on either side of the centre window as to represent the front of a pavilion. The heavy folds were adorned here and there with two hearts in crimson velvet, bound together with blue ribands and enclosed in a wreath of green leaves. Of course the well-known statues which have looked down with their stony eyes upon so many strange scenes were entirely concealed from view, but in their stead two gilt figures appeared in a sitting posture at the spot where the cloth of gold, parted and drawn aside, seemed to give admission to the interior of the tent. The united arms of England and Denmark, surmounted by a crown and surrounded by a golden wreath of bay-leaves, were displayed at the top of the pavilion. Higher up rose the pediment, its middle or flat portion filled in with cloth of a reddish purple hue, and enclosed in an elaborately carved cornice in white and gold. The device chosen for the cornice was the letter "A," which stands for both Albert and Alexandra, encircled by a wreath of flowers. On the summit of the pediment, with its head towering far above the roofs of the houses on either side, stood a white statue of Hymen, who, armed with his torch, seemed eager to celebrate the nuptial rite. At each angle of the building was a tripod containing incense, while over the posterns were white altars beautifully sculptured and angels holding bunches of orange blossoms.

### DR. COLENZO CONDEMNED BY A R. C. PRELATE.

Archbishop Cullen, in his late pastoral, thus referred to Bishop Colenso's unhappy book:—

A Protestant Bishop of the Anglican Church as by law established has publicly undertaken to teach the lawfulness of polygamy among Christians, encouraged to do so by the sanction of the highest Protestant dignitary of Dublin; and, proceeding still further, has impugned the Divine origin of the Books of Moses and the eternity of the pains of hell. Behold the abyss into which Protestantism leads its votaries, and the evils that follow in the wake of private judgment! And these spiritual evils, dearly beloved brethren, are much more deplorable than mere temporal calamities. When the Almighty punishes the world in His anger, when it is not the chastisement of a father seeking the amendment of his children, but the vengeance of an inexorable judge, it is no longer the famine that kills the body the pestilence or the sword He employs, but the famine of the word of life, the spirit of error, and false prophets—wolves in sheep's clothing—that become the instruments of His fury in desolating the moral world.

### DEFENCES OF CHARLESTON.

It is defended by over 1,000 guns, many of them of improved European fabric. Every island, point, river, creek, and swamp in proximity to Charleston is commanded by hostile cannon. Fort Moultrie is iron-cased on the harbour front, and the whole work is bomb-proof. The Confederates have two rams and one iron-cased battery, the latter mounting eight 100-pounder rifled cannon, for the defence of the harbour. The casemated tier of guns of Fort Sumter is clothed in iron armour. Parallel bars of railroad iron traverse this iron coating, perpendicularly, from the base to the upper line. The embrasures are protected by massive projections of the same material, presenting acute angles at every side. The Confederate batteries are fully garrisoned. The Confederate army now in Charleston and the fortifications thereof is about 35,000 strong, and this force is being rapidly augmented.

### MULTUM-IN-PARVO.

CHEAP GAS.—The *Morning News* gives a brief account of a new kind of gas obtained from chemically-prepared water, the light from which is said to be more brilliant than that obtained from coal gas. The apparatus may be seen in operation at the Gas-fitting Establishment of Lee and Company, Canterbury Street, and its cost is \$40 and upwards, according to the size required. The cost of this gas per thousand feet is less than half that charged by the city Gas Company. Lee and Company, who are the sole proprietors of these machines for this province and Nova Scotia, will, we are informed, warrant every one they sell, and will also supply the chemical preparation at a trifling cost.

WE have to record the death yesterday of Mr. Wm. Ansley, a worthy young man, who was a native of Nova Scotia, and who had been for some time past the active and reliable agent, in this province, of the International Steamship Company. He was much esteemed in this community.

HOLY WEEK.—The ceremonies of last week were performed with the usual solemnity and magnificence according to the Roman Ritual in the Cathedral. The office of the Tenebrae was attended on the evenings of Wednesday, Thursday and Friday by an immense concourse of people—indeed it might be said by the entire congregation. On Thursday there was a Pontifical High Mass, during which His Lordship the Bishop, assisted by the Clergy of the City and neighborhood, blessed the Holy Oils. At the Mass the Rev. John Quinn acted as Deacon, the Rev. Mr. Peterson as Sub Deacon, the Rev. Mr. Foley as Master of the Ceremonies, and the Very Rev. J. Quinn, V. G., as assistant Priest.

In the evening after the Tenebrae, the Vicar General preached on the Eucharist to a very large congregation. On Friday morning the Bishop said the Mass of the Precinctified, and in the afternoon the Rev. Mr. Peterson preached on the Passion to an immense multitude. On Easter Sunday the Bishop again Pontificated, when an impressive sermon was preached by the Rev. John Quinn on the Resurrection; and one of their most brilliant Masses was sung by the highly gifted Colman Family.—*Freeman.*

The singing of the Cathedral Choir during Passion week was, we hear, unusually excellent; and it at rick d on Easter Sunday numbers of persons from other communities. No wonder the singing in the other choirs in St. John should seem so inferior by comparison!

DR. SPINNEY'S LECTURE at the Institute was postponed on account of the weather to Friday evening next.

# THE AMERICAN WAR.

## By Telegraph.

BANGOR, April 7.

The Hilton Head correspondent of the *Tribune*, under date of March 31st, states that the rough weather was now the only obstacle to the immediate consummation of the aggressive plans of Hunter and Dupont. The sailing of the last iron-clad and fleet of transports for the point of attack, was looked for in the next three days.

The *Herald's* correspondent writing from Coles' Island, 9 miles from Charleston, on the 28th, states that a Federal regiment had landed and taken possession. A scouting party went towards Charleston, obtaining an excellent view of the forts. James' Island was heavily fortified.

The *Times'* Washington despatch says that it cannot be disguised that Federal relations with Great Britain were more precarious than since the Trent affair.

Morgan's cavalry met with a defeat in Tennessee. The Republicans carried Portland City Election.

## BY SPECIAL TELEGRAPH TO THE Evening Despatch.

WEDNESDAY, April 8.

Released prisoners from Richmond report a bread riot there. Three thousand women armed with clubs, guns, and stones, attacked Government and private stores. Jefferson Davis and other officials restored order with promised relief after the militia failed.

Major Ransom returned to Kansas city from a successful scouting expedition, killing 34 guerillas, hanging two leaders, breaking up 15 camps, burning 27 houses, capturing arms, &c.

Gen. Mitchell, with a cavalry force, dashed on a Confederate camp in Tennessee, a rendezvous for conscripts, killing 50, capturing 15, all with the arms, equipments, &c.

It is reported that the evacuation of Port Hudson has commenced.

A highly successful expedition to Pontchartroula, Louisiana, made extensive captures, including three cotton laden vessels.

## BY TELEGRAPH.

### THE LEGISLATURE

FREDERICTON, April 7.

Munro spoke in favor of the Railroad Bill. He agreed that the Railroad was of great military benefit, and referred to instances to show the great commercial importance of such. He did not believe that there was any prospect of the Northern route being selected. The selection, as he understood the Bill, was in the Executive. Even Capt. Robinson did not insist on the superiority of the Northern route for a military road. He went largely into figures to show the probable

result in the increase of trade, population, &c.

Johnson followed. This was no time to talk of a route. He reviewed the conduct of the Canadian Delegates. He argued that this was by a hundred per cent. the best proposition ever before made. He resumes his speech to-morrow.

Adjourned at 5.30.

FREDERICTON, April 8.

Dow introduced a bill to prohibit the sale to Indians of intoxicating liquors.

A bill relating to the Police Force in Portland, was agreed to.

A bill to provide for the referring of Railway Claims to arbitration, is again in Committee, and being discussed. The usual arguments in favor of it are being urged, viz., that the claimants should have some mode of relief, either through the award of arbitrators, or the courts, by process against the government. The members of the government oppose the bill. They say its passage would be a relief to the government, but an injustice to the Public Revenues.

In Legislative Council a bill was passed providing that certificates of Bankruptcy given in England shall not relieve Debtors in this province.
