The first instalment of the money to be paid to Evans & Elkin was set down as \$15,-000. Mr. Evans swore that he received only \$12,500 of this amount, and that he could not tell who got the rake-off of \$2,500. Mr. Pugsley in the House of Commons said that Mr. Evans arranged with Mr. Allen for the deduction of this and other amounts. The second instalment of \$15,000 gave only \$9,500 to Mr. Evans. The rest disappeared. Mr. Evans was most positive when under oath that he had not received more than the amounts he cited, \$12,500 and \$9,500. Moreover, he brought documents to corroborate his evidence Mr. Pugsley had nothing whatever to corroborate his statement in the House, and he was not under oath. In addition, Mr. Evans was a friend of his, and would have no object in manufacturing testimony against him. Mr. Pugsley was under grave charges, and was forced to make a defence of some kind. The defence consisted mainly of wild statements which can be refuted without difficulty.

The speech of Mr. Crocket, who took the evidence heard by the Commission, and showed the absolute falsity of statement after statement made by the Minister, was unanswerable. 

Red-bellied Snake: Porfectly inoffensive and useful.

Little Brown Snake: Common and generally distributed. Perfectly inorfensive and useful.

Riband Snake: Not very common. Avery beautiful, harmless creature, Feeds upon insects, small toads sulfrogs.

Common Garter Snake: In western Ontario, and not common anywhere quite harmless. Feeds on field mice and insects.

Common Garter Snake: Abundant and generally distributed. When attacked, it will sometimes show fight, but is incapable of inflicting any injury more than a scratch. Harmless and useful. (A brave animal.—Ph.)

Stiff Snake: Rare, Found near Lake St. Clair.
