## HUNDRETH ANNIVERSARY OF NORTON PARISH CHURCH

Large Concourse of People from City and Elsewhere Attend Celebration—Exciting Experience of Visitors in Crossing Temporary Bridge—The Speakers Interesting Addresses by Prominent Clergymen.

Kings County has the honor of having within its limits the two oldest churches in the province. The church at Kingston, erected in 1789, celebrated its centennial some years ago, and having been recently improved his fair to last another century. Next to this comes the parish church of Norton, near Bloomfield Station, which yesterday celebrated the hundredth anniversary of its erection.

The occasion brought together a large concourse of people, a good many of them from the city. The clergy present at the services were Bishop Richardson, Ven. Archdeacon Raymond, Canon Hamilton, Neales and Smithers, Rev. Dr. Campbell, Revs. G. F. Scovil, A. W. Daniel, C. A. S. Warnford, A. H. Crowfoot, F. Gaskill, A. C. Fenwick and H. Abbott.

There was a celebration of the Holy Communion in the morning conducted by the Bishop and the rector, Canon Hamilton.

An address appropriate to the occasion was given by the Rector of Sussex, Rev. Canon Neales. The visiting clergy and others were entertained at luncheon at the hospitable home of John Raymond.

parts of New Brunswick as well as of Nova Scotia, touching Norton as it passed.

The matter of the erection of the parish church which had been in abeyance for several years, was revived in 1868. In one of his letters at that time Bishop Inglis wrote, "The inhabitants of Norton are making preparations to build a small church, for which purpose their subscriptions already amount to £130."

Simon Baxter and his wife did not live to see the realization of their wishes as to the erection of the church at Norton, both of them died within a few weeks of each other in the early part of 1844. Their sons, Joseph, Ellis and Abraham were members of the first church corporation at Norton of which any record has been preserved. A meeting of this corporation was held April 23, 1810. There were present: Rev. Oliver Arnold, W. P. Knox, Joseph Baxter, Jesse Raymond, wardens; Horton Dickie, Elijah Baxter, James Crab, Jas. Craft, Samuel DeForest, Isaac K. Ketchum, Abraham Baxter and John C. Hayes, clerk of the vestry.

The following year the parish church at Norton was erected, the dimensions being 60x60. Another church was built at Hampton by the people of that place and of the adjacent parish of Kingston. Rev. Ellis Scovil, son of the first missionary at Kingston, took the oversight of the latter.

Owing to the incompleteness of the Norton edifice, services were conducted in the winter in private houses, but through the assistance of a grant of £100 from the good old society at home, the completion of the church was made possible. Rev. James Cookson, of Portsmouth, England, arrived in this city in June, 1819 to take charge of Hampton and Norton, and officiated in the missions for the first time on June 27th.

Being now well advanced in years Rev. Mr. Arnold surrendered his charge to a more youthful man, and severed his connection with the church after 29 years of faithful service, during which time he kept together the scattered flock despite the great distance he was obliged to travel.

Rev. Dr. Cookson ministered faithfully to the parishes of Norton and Hampton until 1829 when he resigned and returned to Portsmouth.

Rev. W. W. Walker succeeded him, for 55 years acting as rector of Hampton. He became a canon of the diocese and gave three sons to the ministry. Another son Dr. Thomas Walker, of St. John is an active layman of the church.

Through the representations of Isaac B. Raymond, the last survivor of the founders, the sum of £10 was received from the Diocesan Church Society to assist in enlarging and rendering the church more commodious. Closely identified with the history of the construction and welfare of the church at Norton was the late Isaac Raymond and descendants, all of whom were active in its advance.

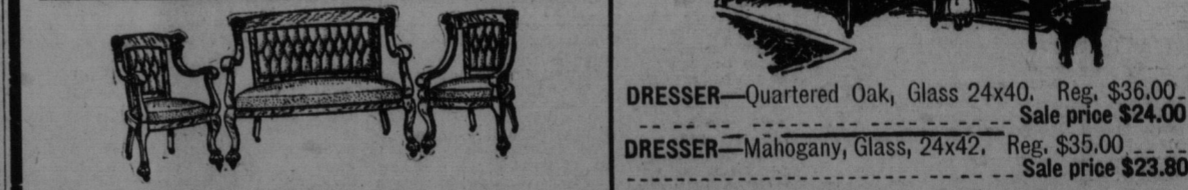

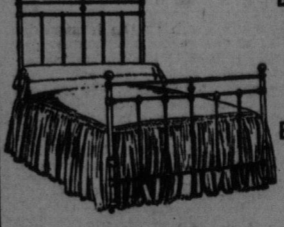
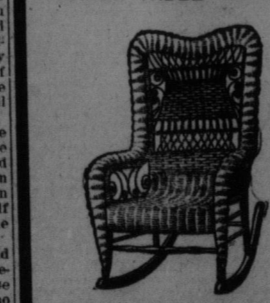

The action of the department of fisheries in allowing the fishermen to start taking lobsters earlier than usual has been much appreciated by the fishermen, and they believe the usual number of lobsters on the size and number of grounds wanted them in making the demand for a longer season this year.
