Police Commissioner Waldo Aims Blow at the

New York, Aug.4.—Police Commissioner Rhinelander Waldo tonight gave out his first formal statement relative to the Rosenthal case. The commissioner recommended a thorough investigation of the charges made, relative to the alleged connection between the police and the gamblers. At the same time he aims a blow straight from the shoulder at the judiciary, declaring that gambling can exist only because the gamblers can obtain what amounts to protection from the courts, and asserting that gamblers do much of the corrupt election work of the political parties who place the judiciary on the bench.





These plants are modern in construction, but have already become too small to meet the demands of the business.
