The Prisoner Sentenced.
At 3 o'clock to-day Mrs. Oliver was brought to the Police Station. His Honor called her to her feet and reviewed the evidence that had been given before him. Yesterday morning he presented himself and his lucky ticket at the office of the firm expecting to draw the cash for the ticket. He was much disappointed to learn that the payment could not be made until the receipt of the official drawings, which will come by the Havana steamer on Wednesday next. After inquiries as to the best means of drawing the cash on his ticket he was informed that the firm had no office in Wall Street in the effort to find an obliging banker.
THE LARGEST PRIZE ON RECORD.
The drawing of April 22 contained the largest prize ever awarded by the Havana Lottery, and was looked upon as a very lucky one. The prize was \$200,000, \$100,000, \$50,000, and so on down to \$1,000. Mr. Peniston had drawn the largest prize ever drawn in America. Two years ago ticket 8444 drew a \$200,000 prize, but it was sold by a widow in Western New York for \$10,000, a soldier stationed on Governor's Island got \$20,000, and others received sums ranging from \$5,000 to \$10,000.
A STRAIGHT OF LUCK.
Mr. Peniston's prize when discounted according to the lottery rule, will amount to nearly \$400,000. He may be looked upon as an essentially lucky man, to hold the winning ticket in a lottery which closed at least 10,000 numbers. He will remain in this city until he has cashed his ticket.
Lottery dealers say that none of the tickets bearing numbers from one up to fifty ever come to the country. This is one of the exclusive property of ex-Queen Isabella of Spain, who has bought it every drawing for the last twenty years. Spanish grandees and Havana merchants buy the tickets, and the dealers in the hope that luck will change and draw one of these numbers having ever drawn a considerable sum.
